

Zone Ruling Win Goes to **Final Vote** Oct. 17; **Lillian Voters Urged to Attend**

Public hearing local ordinances to help prevent higher density was unanimously approved by the Planning Commission on September 7, thanks to the efforts of Lillian activists.

Baldwin County Planning Commission heard our voices and unanimously recommended approval to the Baldwin County Commissioners for final vote. The two most important items we presented for consideration were establishing a new zoning category, RSF-1.5, 0.5 acre minimum lot size for Lillian and Unincorporated Elberta, excluding activity nodes, and reducing manufactured homes maximum from 4 per acre to 3 per acre.

There were many other significant provisions that were also recommended for approval.

Restoring these gifts of Perdido Bay drew more than 50 to the first

public input meeting about a new effort to clean up the ailing Perdido Bay.

"What a jewel we have over here in Lillian," Ashley said Campbell, Baldwin County Natural Resources Planner.

"Ya'll live here. Ya'll love it. Ya'll can protect it."

Campbell is among a team of area environmentalists who has been working over the past year to launch the new Western Perdido Bay Wa-

tershed Action Committee. A threemember committee of locals - Lucy Smith, Lani Cameron and Mike Cleveland - has been working with the Mobile Bay National Estuary Program to commission a study analyzing the condition of the bay and how to restore it.

"We were very excited about the

turnout," Cameron said. "Clearly, the people of our community care about our bay."

Two Lillian neighbors who came out for the Aug. 28 meeting say they hope Perdido Bay can be made clean again so younger generations can en-

"It used to feel refreshing and good when you got in the water and now it just doesn't," she said.

She doesn't swim in Perdido Bay anymore.

"That's a major concern getting the water back to a healthy spot my grand-

children can enjoy," she said.

Ron Robson is thinking about the generations to come too. He sees more and more young couples with children living in Spanish Cove.

"I don't know if it can happen in my lifetime, but I hope we can restore the bay for our grandchildren and their children," said

The MBNEP awarded the new Western Per-Bay dido group \$250,000 of its \$4.3 million grant to commission a study analyzing the ecological

health of the bay and to design ways to restore it. The report, being conducted by engineering firms 5020 Engineering of Foley and Geosyntec, a multi-state corporation, will lay out a strategy for conserving and restoring coastal plants





and animals critical to Perdido Bay's ecosystems that are most threatened by environmental change specifically caused by people. It will focus on freshwater, wetlands, streams, rivers, marshes and flats. These are the types of waterways identified by environmentalists as most at risk from activities like dredging and filling, fragmentation, and sedimentation - all related to urbanization, according to the list of qualifications for the West Perdido Watershed Management.

At the meeting, environmental leaders invited members of the community to rate the importance of six facets of Perdido Bay restoration that concern them most. Those attending placed stickers on pages on the wall to represent their priorities. Here is the way the results break down:

1. Water quality - The coastal community wants water that is drinkable, swimmable, and able to support aquatic and marine life.

2. Fish and wildlife- Fishery resources are val-

ued as an industry, a primary recreational pastime, and a staple of the diets of residents and visitors.

- 3. Beaches and shorelines They provide critical edge habitat for aquatic and terrestrial animals and recreational opportunities for people who live here as well as visitors.
- 4. Environmental health and resilience- The coastal community relies upon coordinated actions to reduce vulnerability to and recover from the range of hazards we face, natural and otherwise.
- 5. Access- Having access to coastal waters and natural resources is something about which people care deeply.
- 6. Heritage and culture Preserving heritage and culture is important to ensure the bountiful waters that have provided such pleasure through our lifetimes will still be available to our grandchildren.

The next community meeting will be at the Lillian Community Club Hall, Lillian, at 6:00 p.m. Oct. 23.

She commented that volunteering at the Library would be a great experience for anyone who is looking for an excuse to get out of the house and get involved in the community. The two-hour shifts are easy, and some don't require standing. Computer expertise isn't necessary, either.

The Library is more than just a hub of information with lots of books and computers. It is also a place where people can gather to explore subjects of interest and interact with each other.

To this end, Betty and the board would love to expand the Library's programming and consider adding programs like a children's or other special interest program. If this concept intrigues you, Betty would love to talk with you about it.



Baldwin County Council on Aging offers Vial of Life Program. During medical emergencies it can be difficult to answer all the questions that first responders may be asking.

The Baldwin County Council on Aging offers a FREE service called the Vial of Life Program that may be particularly helpful for those with a complex medical history. Through the Vial of Life program, first responders will have all critical and essential information at their fingertips. A red Vial of Life decal is placed on the front door of the residence making it visible to first responders.

A second Vial of Life decal is placed on a Ziploc bag, containing complete medical information. The bag is then placed on the refrigerator door for easy access and viewing. Information First Responders need to know: • What is your name? • What medications are you currently taking? • What illnesses do you have? • Who is your emergency contact? • What is your normal blood pressure? • Are you wearing any hearing or seeing devices? • Additionally, hospital staff will need information related to insurance coverage. 

Surprising How Much We Don't Know

Do most of us think that Earth is the most important orb in the sky, strutting along in the universe like a proud peacock?

You might have changed your tune if you saw the photo taken by a European Space Agency craft from the surface of Mars. Our planet, located 186 million miles from Mars, ap-

peared as a small white dot in black space with our moon a blur next to it.

Our closest planet is Venus, located 162 million miles from Earth. It is considered Earth's twin because of its proximity, close in size, weight about the same and is made of the same stuff as our planet. Unfortunately, that is where the similarities stop. Venus lacks the ocean water and life that Earth has and the atmosphere is 100 percent thicker which holds in the heat of the sun to unbearable degrees. Because of this heavy atmosphere the second planet from the sun is even hotter than the planet closest to the sun, Mercury. Being in third place, in Earth's case, seems to be the best placement.

Our sun won't last forever but it may have about eight or so billion years of life left to go. A star explodes into a supernova at its death knell because of changes in its core. Then its light goes out forever.

Did you know the planet names come from Greek and Roman gods of mythology? Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Neptune and our dwarf planet, Pluto are Roman. 



Gearhead Shifts the Crowd at The Front Porch

They may be a bunch of Gearheads, but they sure know the mechanics of git-down blues rock n' roll.

This band was born in the dim oil-stained nest of Advantage Auto near Elberta about seven years ago. It's a place where guys do guy things with hoists and wrenches and drumsticks and guitar picks.

Founder Keith Richardson is the only band member who still works on cars, but the band still practices in a big rehearsal room behind the shop.

"I guess you could call it a garage band," says Elberta native Keith Richardson, Gearheads founder and drum-

It was a quiet night at Johnny B's - until the Gearheads took the stage. What let loose was a barrage of hard-hitting electric bayou blues that reverberated rhythms and riffs pounding through the pulse. And the feet. It is really hard to keep the cheeks in the seat.

Lead guitarists Baum takes center stage.

He casts his own twist on masters of Memphis soul, Southern rock and bayou blues for a trifecta of electric guitar ecstasy.

Through a menu of music by blues guitar greats like Stevie Ray Vaughan, Savoy Brown, Eric Clapton, and Irish guitarist Gary Moore, Baum leads us on an emotional journey from happy screaming guitar to sorrowful wailing slides.

Baum tosses in some pop rock staples for a nugget of familiarity, infusing the well-worn tunes with blues undertones that will not quit. Long Tall Woman grips the crowd

with a roller coaster of rifts and sliding tones. Artful volume fluctuations and rhythm syncopations keep the crowd on the edge of their seats - if they can stay in them at all. A striking lift of intensity and crescendo caps his take on Billy Joel's *I Might Be Crazy* and the Doobie Brother's *China* Grove lands with joy and passion, also spotlighting the drumming skills of Gearheads founder Keith Richardson.

"I've forgotten how to play more songs than I know," Baum said.

A retired auto parts dealer, Baum picked up a guitar when he was kid and started to strum tunes. His brother, a classically trained concert pianist who unsuccessfully took years of guitar lessons, was aghast.

"How do you do that?" His brother would ask.

Baum doesn't know. All he knows is he never took a lesson. He doesn't know how to read music on the page.

"I play from the heart," he said. "I play by ear. You can sav it's a gift."

Baum grew up to the soundtrack of his dad's Chet Atkins records, along with soul and rock albums.

"But when I first heard the blues, the blues hooked me," he said. "I've been a blues addict most of my life."

That blues addiction was "always a hobby; I always had a day job," Baum said.

But it landed him in Memphis and Atlanta where he rose through the ranks of aspiring guitar pickers from an Elvis tribute band to blasting blues rifts in the best clubs in Atlanta.

Richardson too is a self-taught musician. As a boy

growing up on the same place Advantage Auto is now, he was always in trouble for "beating stuff all around the house."

His parents bought him his first toy drums and later he saved his pennies to buy a professional set. He drummed to records until he thumped his way into popular local bands like the Dakotas and infiltrated



area nightspots like Murphy's, where disc jockeys recorded weekly local radio shows.

Richardson's tempos shine in Gearheads' renditions of Evil Ways, Two Tickets to Paradise, and China Grove

"I played in so many different bands and clubs I can't begin to remember them all," he says.

He does remember that Gearheads plays at Johnny B's Front Porch one Saturday each month and can be seen regularly at Doc Holiday's in Foley.


