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FRENCHY'S CAFE SPANS 33 YEARS

ay "Frenchy's Café" to anyone who lived in Gothenburg between the years of 1927 and 1960 and the name conjures up memories of good food and fun times.

For the owners, Armand and Marie Clouatre, the business thrust them into a lifestyle of public service where they earned the friendship and respect of many people over the years.

rmand, of French-Canadian heritage, first started his career in the

restaurant
business soon after
he graduated from
Farnam High School
going to work at the
Dinty Moore Hamburger Castle in
Ogallala where he
was called

"Frenchy" because they couldn't remember his name.

Over the span of 33 years, Frenchy's Café



three locations, all within 200 feet of each other, in

the 800 block of Lake Avenue. The first site was in the small stucco building which now

houses Lake Avenue Coffee Shop. The little café sold sandwiches of all kinds, along with homemade pies, coffee, hot chocolate, soft drinks and candy. But the item in biggest demand was the hamburger. Marie noted that people would buy them by the sackful because they were something new. They would sell over 2,500 each weekend at five cents apiece.

Around 1940 they opened the second Frenchy's Café right across the street from their former business. The new location



was quite a bit larger and sported a very modern décor with a juke box as the focal point situated at the end of a long line of red and white cloth-covered tables.

Around the same time Armand and Marie opened the third Frenchy's, Armand's parents bought the Platte Hotel and Café. The elder Clouatres ran the hotel while Armand and Marie took on yet another venture with a coffee shop in the front and a full dining room in the back. Marie would run back and forth across the alley between the two cafes, trying to keep them both going.

1923—CITY HALL LANDMARK COMES DOWN

the structure which we have
come to refer to as the "City
Hall".

In 1887 this building was no doubt pointed to with pride by

the good citizens of
Gothenburg
as an architectural
achievement.
It was built at
that time for a
school build-

ing, and occupied the center of the block between 14th and 15th Streets on the west side of Lake Avenue.

In 1892 the Columbia school was constructed to replace the existing school on Winchell Street. The school building was cut into two sections and the "City Hall" came into being. One half was moved to West 9th Street for city hall purposes, and the other to East 9th Street to be used as the post office. The half used as a post office was used for innumerable purposes and before long was also torn down and a modern two-story brick

Odd Fellows home built in its stead.

The "City Hall" had many uses. The upper floor was in the nature of a hall and it was here that most of the large social gatherings in Gothenburg were held. The lower floor housed the fire apparatus for several years

and the fire bell was housed in its belfry

until the larger bell and tower were installed. The second

story was pressed into service as a school room for two years previous to the building of the high school. The fire department

had quarters there after this period with meeting rooms for the hose teams. But now the proud structure was to pass

into oblivi-

on. For some time it was

a fire hazard and the City Council ordered it dismantled, the lumber was to be made available for construction of a storage house for city machinery.

Frenchy's Waitresses

Although they hired others to do the requiring Marie to type a new one cooking, Armand and Marie put in their share of time in the kitchens.

In addition to the all the baking, Marie washed and ironed all the white linen tablecloths for the tables.

She was adept

at making doz-

en's of cinnamon rolls while cooking pancakes and eggs.

The menu changed from day to day

each day. One time she hit an "N" instead of the "B: and the menu said

> they were having "Naked Chicken" instead of "Baked Chicken".

The hours were long and Marie remembered falling asleep standing up waiting for Ar-

mand to check the register out at the end of the day. Often they wouldn't close until 2 a.m. on a Saturday night

and then finally get home about 4 a.m., only to get up at 7 o'clock to go to church on Sunday.

The couple retired around 1960 and sold the café to Lucille Anderson. It changed hands again and in 1965 a kitchen fire destroyed it on a Sunday afternoon. It was never rebuilt and the space now serves as a parking lot for Heibner Chiropractic.

The restaurant business provided a comfortable livelihood for the Clouatre's and their family; Jean, Dennis and Terry. They are remembered for their good food and hardwork ethic.

GOTHENBURG'S HONOR GUARD

Oct 1946—Ground Broken for Large Locker Plant: Ground was broken for a brand

new business in Gothenburg. Oscar Peterson and his son, Blaine Peterson, will be associated in a new and modern cold storage plant. There was a complete animal processing plant; including slaughter, ageing, cutting and a complete curing facility. Brick and glass block was to be used for the front or west side of the building. The plant will include 1000 storage lockers and plans include handling of meat on a wholesale basis for the benefit of locker patrons. In 1949, a small meat market and limited grocery space was installed. About 1954 the building to the



south was purchased and a full grocery store was put into place. This business was located where Dollar General now resides. In 1972 the Safeway Store at 404 9th Street was purchased and the grocery store moved to that location. In 1974, Blaine's son, Steve joined the enterprise. It continues to serve Gothenburg and the surrounding area.

June 10, 1936—July 4th is the completion date set by Col. E. C. Stickelman on his new and up-to-the-minute sale pavilion. The building, 78x68 feet, will seat about 1500, and everything will be the last word in convenience for conducting the sales. The barn continued to be used for sales until it's untimely demise by fire in 2013 while under the ownership of Wendell and Kathy Brott.





Dec. 2, 1936—Col. Bill Holik announces his first sale in his new livestock pavilion for Wednesday, Dec. 9. The new pavilion is located on Hwy. 30 just west of the tail race, and includes a lunch room. Located on the railroad, stock can be loaded into cars directly from the yards.
