Plant of the Month

Pyracantha, Firethorn

Pyracantha crenatoserrata

Plant Form: Evergreen shrub

Water use: Low

Mature Size: 15' tall x 10' wide

Exposure: Full Sun

Bloom time: March – May

Native to: China

Hardiness: Cold to 10 degrees F

The Pyrancantha holds landscape interest throughout the year with its generous clusters of white flowers in spring and colorful bunches of large, long lasting berries in winter, just in time for holiday decorations. Many varieties are available to suit all tastes and applications from prostrate ground covers to erect shrubs that accept espalier training. All varieties grow fast and vigorously with glossy green leaves, thorns, and fruit that varies in color, size, season, and duration. If berry color is important, cut the plants when they have fruit. Flowers and berries are produced only on growth that is at least one year old, so when pruning, leave some of the growth made each year so that you will have flowers and berries. Use as espaliers on walls or fences, as barrier plantings, screens, or hedgerows.

Winterizing your Garden

Continue to plant trees & shrubs.

Continue to plant spring blooming bulbs this month as weather and soil conditions permit.

Before temperatures fall below freezing, disconnect outside water hoses, drain and store indoors.

Once night time temperatures drop to below freezing for a few consecutive days, turn off your irrigation system and drain the valves.

Regularly rake lawns to keep falling leaves and twigs from suffocating grass. Fertilize lawns for a final time early this month with an organic lawn fertilizer slowrelease high in nitrogen; it will help lawns retain green color longer in winter and color up faster in early spring. Avoid walking on frozen turf; it breaks grass blades.

Continue to add grass clippings, leaves and dried plant material to your compost pile; turn regularly to speed decomposition.

Continue to water newly planted trees and shrubs, especially evergreens, until ground freezes.

Add 2 to 4 inches of an organic soil building conditioner to garden beds once the ground has completely frozen.

Wait until trees and shrubs drop their leaves or undergo color change before digging and moving them to new sites.

Empty ceramic, cement and terra cotta containers, clean and store in a frost-free space.

What's In My Garden?

Gopher Snake *Pituophis*



Members of the **Colubridae Family**, the common, large, gopher snake is usually between 36 and 96 inches long. Gopher snakes range in color from cream-yellow to greengray to tan, with large black, brown or reddish blotches on their back and smaller ones along their sides. Most specimens have a dark line between the eyes and another from behind the eyes to the angle of the jaw. Sometimes striped individuals, with or without blotches, are found.

Range; Throughout all 4 deserts of the American Southwest and beyond, up to 8000 feet.

Habitat; Found in a wide variety of habitats including desert flats, coastal dunes and coniferous forests, but preferring grasslands and open brush areas.

Behavior; Slow-moving, the gopher snake investigates burrows, rocky crevices and even climbs trees in search of prey. Adult snakes hunt small rodents, young rabbits, lizards, birds and occasionally other snakes, usually by their sense of smell. Prey is killed by constriction and suffocation. In Winter, gopher snakes hibernate, retreating to communal dens, sometimes sharing the lair with rattlesnakes, whipsnakes or racers. But in the breeding season, males vigorously defend their territories against all competing males.
