The whole Conference was very powerful & up lifting.. The first session was divided into 2 parts one for Clergy, one for Laity. The Laity session was run 100% by Laity. TEACHING YOUR KIDS ABOUT INDEPENDENCE DAY

The meaning of Independence Day

Kids love Independence Day with all the fireworks, picnics, fun and games. In addition to all the festivities, it's also important for parents to teach their kids about the history and meaning of Independence Day.

Brush up on your American history

Before you start talking to your kids about Independence Day, brush up on your history. Considered America's birthday, Independence Day marks the anniversary of the day the Declaration of Independence was adopted by the Continental Congress — July 4, 1776. That means that this year — 2017 — marks America's 241st birthday. The first Independence Day wasn't celebrated on the 4th of July but rather four days later on July 8, 1776 in Philadelphia.

So did our Founding Fathers plan on Independence Day becoming such a big celebration? Well at least one of them did. John Adams said of Independence Day, "I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. **It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty.** It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward for evermore."

Ask your kids what they know

Maybe your kids know more about Independence Day than you think. They may have already learned in school about why we celebrate on 4th of July. Ask them about the meaning of Independence Day and help them fill in the blanks. Talk about the Boston Tea Party and why it happened (the colonies were opposing taxation by England and King George II without representation). Discuss the Revolutionary War, the First Continental Congress and the Declaration of Independence.

Quiz your kids about the important figures of the time including Samuel Adams, Benjamin Franklin, John Hancock, Patrick Henry, Thomas Jefferson, Paul Revere and George Washington. [TheAmericanRevolution.org](#) has a great list of the important people of the American Revolution and plenty of other information about this time period. On Independence Day, read to your kids from books about the

American Revolution. Also read popular Independence Day quotes and poems together.

Teach them about the flag

Young kids can learn about Independence Day by coloring the different patriotic symbols such as the American flag, the Liberty Bell, Uncle Sam and more. Print coloring pages and other printables for Independence Day.

Read the Declaration of Independence

With older kids, read the Declaration of Independence together and talk about what it means. Create a special declaration for your own family — a set of rules, standards and ideals to live by. Print it out and have everyone in the family sign it.

Learn and sing patriotic songs

Teach your kids the words to the national anthem — "The Star-Spangled Banner" — and sing it together. Other patriotic songs that are suitable for Independence Day include "America the Beautiful," "God Bless America," "I'm a Yankee Doodle Dandy," "This Land is Your Land" and "You're a Grand Old Flag."



Watch movies about Independence Day

On 4th of July, sit down with your kids and watch a movie about Independence Day — and we don't mean the Will Smith movie of the same name. *The Patriot*, *1776*, *Revolution*, *Drums Along the Mohawk* and *Last of the Mohicans* are great choices. For little ones, *Ben and Me* is an appropriate option.

Take a trip to a historical landmark

If you are fortunate enough to live near one of country's great historical landmarks, plan a visit — even if not on Independence Day. Don't live close by? Don't worry, you can take a virtual trip online. The internet offers pictures, videos and information about a variety of historical landmarks and places from the Revolutionary War. This offers a terrific opportunity to teach young kids about how to research on the internet. Learn about the freedoms we were fighting for and what life was like before the American Revolution.

Even when teaching your kids about the historical aspects of Independence Day, keep things lighthearted and fun. In addition to all the learning activities, create 4th of July crafts, sample red, white and blue foods and play Fourth of July games on Independence Day.

FOUND MONEY: CHAPEL HILL'S SCRIP PROGRAM

Certainly most of us are aware of the term "found money". Found money is money that has been misplaced or forgotten, or actually found such as on the street or in the pocket of an old pair of pants or jacket pocket.

Many of us have run across an old wallet or handbag, during the cleaning of dressers or closets and, lo and behold, when we inspect them, we may find some change or folded bills that have been overlooked, misplaced or forgotten when we put said wallet or handbag out of active use. Sometimes, even old passbook savings accounts are "uncovered" and show us the way to some dollars we had completely forgotten about. Or maybe, when taking clothes from the washer or dryer, some money is found in the pockets.

Found money is money that we have lost track of or for some reason we have been made unaware of it and therefore have not placed it in our budget. And most of us have found some kind of money in parking lots or on the street. Found money is always a very nice surprise, no matter the amount, and usually makes us smile and gives a lift to our spirits. Found money is money that we really did not have to spend a lot of effort in obtaining.

Well, there are some large amounts of "found money" just laying around Henderson and Evansville, waiting to be put to use in the ministries of Chapel Hill. Those amounts can be "found" by any one of us by simply using the Scrip Card program. Scrip Cards are like gift cards that one buys for their own use; the bonus is that the participating merchants of the program then rebate a percentage of the amount spent back to Chapel Hill. It is not as if one has to spend \$102.50 for a Walmart card and then Walmart sends \$2.50 to Chapel Hill and the card purchaser gets \$100.00 worth of goods from Walmart. NO, NO! When someone buys a Wal Mart card with \$100.00 value, the purchaser receives full value in goods from Wal Mat and they will then rebate Chapel Hill \$2.50. It is fairly safe to say that there is most likely not ONE person or family that does not spend \$100.00 per month at Wal Mart. No one is asking you to wreck your budget or spend more money than normal so that Chapel Hill might be the beneficiary of your spending. However, if you know you are going to spend money at Wal Mart and you receive full value for your dollar and Chapel Hill gets a monetary rebate, why would a member of Chapel Hill not want to take advantage of the program?

Let it be known that we are not promoting Walmart; there are many, many other local merchants that participate in the Scrip Program. These run the gamut from auto parts and supplies, to gasoline, clothing & shoes, building products, groceries and fine dining, hunting and fishing supplies and apparel, hotel rooms and car rentals. The list is amazingly long and represents just about everything we spend our money for in today's world. A full list of participants is listed, with their corresponding rebate %'s, available at the Scrip website: shopwithscrip.com. Please go there, register your family and enter Chapel Hill's enrollment code: **CD24A19C362L8**. Then look at the participating merchants, find the ones where you are spending money anyway and order some scrip cards for your use or for gifts to others. It is amazing the products and merchants just waiting to rebate "found money" to Chapel Hill.

We have our own Scrip store at Chapel Hill with some local merchant cards available for your purchase before and after the 9:30 service each Sunday. Please take note of the ones "in Stock" and plan a purchase of a corresponding Scrip card for your known purchases in the upcoming week. Also, please check out the full program online and with a little planning, the "found money" coming to Chapel Hill will help support our ministries.

Usually, this column requests, in some form or fashion, that church members begin or continue to give money to Chapel Hill. This month, we are simply attempting to make members aware of how they may "contribute" to the church without increasing their budget. Please use the Scrip program and help us collect "found money".

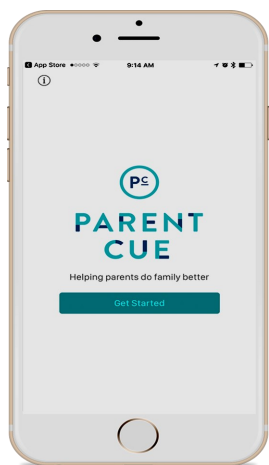

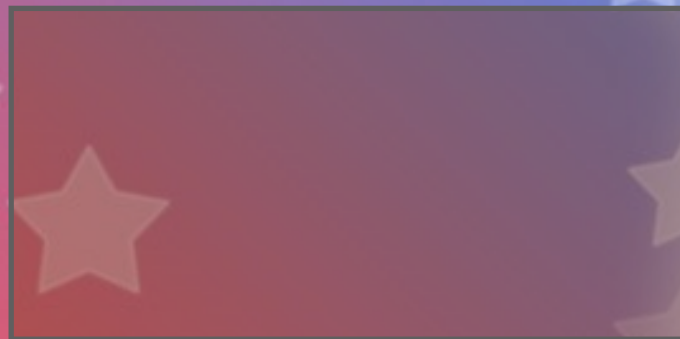
