Corvettes of Durham has a great team of Executives, Directors and their Committees that ensure we all enjoy our Vettes and our time together. Thank you all for your commitment as well.



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
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Corvettes of Durham 2017 Membership Renewal Important Notice

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
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
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















Tail of the Dragon, Corvette Assembly and Corvette Museum Trip

Hello COD members! I know we're strangers to most of you because we never make it to any events but we are COD members going on 4 years now. Wednesday is just a bad day of the week for us and shows are not so much our thing. We like to drive though.

In July Lisa and I set out on a road trip in our 2002 Electron Blue Convertible. Our primary destination was Walden Lodge in Tennessee for a weekend party with friends who were gathering from all around the US and even one who flew in from Manchester, England. But that is not what I am here to tell you about.

I'm here to tell you about the drive experience. We headed out across the 407, picked up the QEW and crossed the Rainbow Bridge into Buffalo. From there we headed west on I-90 to Erie, PA and then south on I-79. Most of this so far is pretty boring driving. Mostly straight though there is lots of rural scenery and elevation changes on 79. We took that down to Pittsburgh where we stopped and met a friend of mine and his wife for lunch before heading out again.

Now I-79 does start to get more interesting as you near Pittsburgh and even more so as you go south of Pittsburgh. Once south of Pittsburgh the drive becomes much more interesting. There are some terrific views of the Mountains and for driving, the speed limit is 70 MPH and 80 does not seem to draw any attention from the Troopers. The road becomes very windy through mountains and passes and is a very satisfying ride in a convertible Corvette.

Someways south of Pittsburgh we picked up WV-119. This road was a ton of fun to drive! Amazing scenery! At times low in the valley looking up at the Mountains around you and at other times atop a mountain pass where you could suddenly see for miles to your left or right. This is also a very twisty road and the speed limit is frequently 70 and that just makes it a really fun drive! Continuing south (my memory is a bit weak here) we picked up WV-20 and made our way to Princeton, WV. We drove over 1,000km that first day. What is in Princeton you ask? Not much! But there was a Hampton Inn that I had reserved a room in. The reason we ended here was that it was the closest hotel to our day 2 objective, The Back of the Dragon!

The Back of the Dragon is formally known as VA-16 and connects North Tazewell to Marion, VA. It is a 32 mile stretch if narrow 2 lane road that crosses a 3 mountain range. The road is twisty and curvy and the scenery is absolutely beautiful! If I recall correctly there are 418 turns. The road climbs up and down the mountains with a series of switchback hairpin turns, many of which are often completely blind! Unfortunately for us a light rain was falling this day and we could not "push the limits" of the car much. But it was still a fun drive. Lisa was amazed at the massive Rhododendrons that lined the

road in the mountains. We had a nice lunch of Virginia Barbecue in Marion and then headed out to the next stop on our trip.

It was a long drive from "The Back of the Dragon" to our next stop which was Tapoco Lodge in North Carolina. A lot of it on I-81 which is about as interesting as the 401 from Oshawa to Cornwall. It took most of the day and we got caught in some terrible traffic when we left the highway passing through Sevierville and Pigeon Forge. Pigeon Forge is a huge tourist "trap". There is tons of shopping and tons of attractions. Finally got out of that traffic and got onto the Foothills parkway. A lower speed limit here but some really tremendous views and lots of places to pull over for a scenic outlook. Here is the good part. At Tallassee you arrive at US-129, The Tail of the Dragon! One of the most popular destinations for motorcycle and sports car enthusiasts. 11 miles and 318 turns! The rain had stopped by now and the roads were drier but still a bit damp. But at 6 PM we had that road almost to ourselves. Not being too sure of what we were in for I took it a bit easy on the south bound trip. As I mentioned our hotel for the night was at Historic Tapoco Lodge just over the border from TN to NC and also the south end of "the Tail."

A few words about Tapoco Lodge. First, the history. It was built by and for the executives of Alcoa as a place to stay while they were building the Cheoah Dam on the Little Tennessee River. This dam in particular is famous because it is the dam which Harrison Ford is standing atop of in a scene from the movie "The Fugitive." The Lodge is a beautiful place to stay. The main lodge houses a gift shop, check-in desk and a library. Around the back and in the walkout basement there is a restaurant looking over the river. There is also a patio out there with lots of chairs and fire pits where you can enjoy a beautiful evening. The accommodations are a series of multi-unit cabins that although rustic looking are very comfortable and clean. It was the nicest place we stayed on this trip and as you might expect it was a bit expensive. Well you do only live once! One final word about the lodge. Cell service is non-existent (One of the US carriers apparently work in that area) as this is pretty remote and the lodge does not offer WiFi. They do have a public computer in the library if you need to check email or look something up.

Now it was not horrendously expensive, just pretty pricey. But the accommodations were very nice so we didn't feel too bad about splurging a bit.

You may recall that there had been a lot of reports of flooding and roads washed out in the area in June/July. Fortunately, we did not encounter any issues like that though the night at Tapoco yet another large Thunderstorm did roll through.

Day 3 was one of the days I was really looking forward to. It was now bright, hot and sunny again. We left Tapoco Lodge heading up the twisty section of US-129 beside the dam site to Deals Gap. Just a short hop. From there we followed a route to the south first that took us along NC-28 which follows the river to the east before crossing it south. Again this is wonderful mountain area so the roads are twisty, curvy and elevations change all the time and often quickly! 28 loops back and picks up the lower part of US-129 (not part of the tail) and swings back up by Tapoco again.

We pulled into Deals Gap where there are the obligatory souvenir shops and we picked up the obligatory souvenirs to prove we'd been there. On the West side there is the "official" Tail Of The Dragon shop. To the east side is the Deals Gap Motorcycle resort. We got in the car and got ready to make our "hot run" northbound on the Tail. At the end of the driveway a pedestrian crossed the road so I had to wait a moment. Unfortunately, that cleared the way for 7 sportbikes to pull out across the road ahead of me. I thought about waiting for clearer road but also thought sportbikes would be quite fast and would not hold me up....I was wrong!

On the Tail of the Dragon there are many places one can "pull over" to allow a faster vehicle to pass. This is the only way to safely overtake on the Tail. The road is otherwise too tight and almost no sections are straight enough to give you visibility. One by one I caught up to those sport bikes and one by one they allowed me to pass. I cleared all of them by the end of the run. We took a dashcam video of the run and it is available on YouTube if you are interested. The link is https://youtu.be/5enx2p0SEUo.

All along "The Tail" there are photographers set up who take pictures of your car as you drive the road. They have their website displayed and by the end of the day you can see the photos they took and if desired purchase them. We found a few we liked and did purchase the electronic version of the photos. I had one blown up to 24 x 36 and it hangs framed in my office now. Here are a few of the pictures we got from the roadside photographers. The ride was a lot of fun and we had a terrific time. I highly recommend planning a trip to drive this road and experience the kind of driving the Chevrolet engineers built these beasts for!

Following our run on "The Tail" we headed to Walden Lodge for our weekend party and had a great time. Sunday after checkout we started heading west and made our way to Nashville, TN. We had lunch downtown before heading north to our hotel. This was very out of the way and there was really nothing to do on Sunday night! But it was very close to our next planned stop on the Monday morning.

Monday we made a short drive north to Bowling Green, KY! We had repurchased tickets for the Bowling Green Assembly plant tour! I was very excited about this day! When we got there I couldn't resist parking my Vette beside a blue C7 that was in the parking lot. The factory tour was quite interesting and I stayed close to our tour guide who was very knowledgeable so I could ask questions. You don't get as close to the actually assembly line as I'd hoped but of course this is a safety consideration. I would have liked a view of the frames being welded but that was in a caged area in the distance which we never got close to. Still a worthwhile place to visit if you are a Corvette enthusiast. Once the tour ended we grabbed lunch and headed home...no of course we didn't! Jan and David wouldn't speak to us again if we didn't go to the Corvette Museum which we did!






On arrival the lobby was full of C7's waiting for purchasers who chose "Museum Delivery" option. At the front of the two rows was a convertible in blue which I almost ruined by drooling! Going to have to make that happen some day for me!

We made our way around the museum. Lots and lots of interesting displays which I understand some of are ever-changing. The day we were there one of the most interesting sections was a display of prototype Vettes through the years. One was clearly close to if not the final inspiration for the C5 after a few refinements. There is a display which I suspect will be permanent now dedicated to the sinkhole incident. It was quite interesting though some of the "technical" bits of it like certain videos on demand did not seem to be working. The dome was one of my favorite parts with Vettes all through the ages on display together. It was somewhat heartbreaking to see some of the Vettes from the sinkhole which will never be repaired because they were too badly damaged.

By the end of the day we were pretty tired and still had a lot of miles to put on. We had to get to Dayton where our next hotel stay was planned. But this was virtually the end of the trip. After this night (and dinner at P.F. Chang's) our only order of business the next morning was to drive home. We headed north on I-75 towards Detroit. Not very interesting but we were fortunate that all the construction seemed to be on the southbound side. We sailed along north bound feeling very grateful we were not in the miles and miles of bumper-to-bumper traffic going the other way.

Made the crossing into Windsor and picked up the 401. Sadly, this time we found ourselves in some pretty lengthy construction delays heading towards London. Once it opened up for good it was clear sailing We got home around dinner time and after 6 days and 3,453.7km driven we were glad to be home. It was a great week to drive a Corvette!

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



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From your National Corvette Museum Ambassadors.....



The National Corvette Museum is constantly changing its exhibits. A special display of fourteen cars in the Museum's Exhibit Hall highlight some of the models that are now history. The display will feature the following, which is a shortened version of the article in the Oct/Nov/Dec America's Sportscar:

1940 Cavern Green Cadillac LaSalle. The LaSalle was manufactured from 1927 through 1940. The LaSalle was second only to the Cadillac.

1955 Chevrolet 3300 Pick-up Truck. From 1947 until 1955, Chevrolet Trucks were No. 1 in sales in the U.S.A. the styling for these truck was the inspiration for both the SSR and HHR.

1954 Cadillac Eldorado (my favourite). The Eldorado was manufactured from 1952 until 2002 - fifty years - and then there were none. (sniff)

1956 Chevrolet Bel Air Nomad. The Nomad, a station wagon, had a unique trim package. It was introduced at Motorama 1954 as a "Dream Car".

1964 Pontiac GTO. One of the original muscle cars the GTO was manufactured from 1964 until 1974. It was selected as Motor Trend's Car of the Year 1968.

1967 Chevelle. The Chevelle was produced from 1964 through 1978 as a cope, sedan, convertible, station wagon and an El Camino. Its successors are the Malibu and Camaro.

1969 Pontiac Firebird. It was built from 1967 to 2002, and on the same platform as the Camaro. It was originally intended to be a two seat sports car based on the original Banshee but GM thought it would directly compete with the Corvette and turned it into a "Pony Car".

1970 Cutlass Rallye 350. It was intended to be competition for the "junior Muscle Cars". Only 3,547 and all yellow, they were only offered one year. 1987 Monte Carlo. The Monte Carlo was a six generation two-door "personal luxury car" built from 1970 through to 2007 (we have two - and still drive both). Production was halted from 1989 to 1994. The Monte Carlo was a casualty of changing times.

1987 Buick Grand National. Named for the NASCAR Winston Cup Grand National Series, it was built between 1981 and 1987. Due to its all black appearance and released during the popularity of the Star Wars movies it earned the title "Darth Vader's Car".

2005 Cadillac XLR. Built in Bowling Green with the Corvette the XLR was produced from 2004 -2009. It was the second Cadillac Roadster, (the other was the Allante). Only 15,460 were sold during its nine year run.



The National Corvette Museum constantly has changing exhibits. Every Corvette owner should try and get their once but if you can't, check out the National Corvette Museum website and wander the halls of the NCM on your personal computer. There are lots of things of interest.

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

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
