August 30, 2020 Mt 16:21-27

Dear St. Pius X and St. Anthony Church,

Don't we all love those old toys we had when we were little kids? What was your favorite? My favorite may have been the Fisher Price Farm set, that had the air sound on the barn door hinge. As soon as you opened the door, an automatic cow 'moooo' sounded every time. I always thought the cows were saying, "Close that door back, give us some privacy we are in here milking!" But I remember when the barn fell apart (as all kid's toy eventually do), we salvaged that little box that made the sound to keep the cows' voice around! Imagine what would an intact Fisher Price Farm Set would go for on EBay today? I don't want to look (like all those collector's baseball cards that are not telling where) and be reminded of what we lost!

But about children's toys, I am thinking of another classic one today because of our gospel reading. It was the 'shape-sorter work table'. I think it taught a greatest life lesson. There were circles, squares, triangles and stars that you had to fit through the table-top plane to make them disappear below. But each shape had its place and it would only fit through that opening! Don't try to push the stars through the circle, or the triangle through the square.

Well, Peter is learning that lesson all over again today as he tries to push Jesus through an opening that is not going to fit. Peter doesn't want Jesus to go through the cross! But the Father's will is the Cross. Jesus has to go through the cross to save us. When Peter hears that Jesus is looking at 'rejection, suffering and death', Peter suggests that He sidestep that part. Peter wants Jesus to go through an easy wide circle opening, not the hard 'cross' opening. But Jesus reminds Peter to get back into shape (or formation). Matt 16:22 says "Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him, "God forbid, Lord! No such thing shall ever happen to you." And Jesus' strong response in verse 23 is "Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle to me. You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do." Jesus is saying, "Peter get back in line, get behind me." Peter was stepping out around Jesus tempting Him with a 'work around' to avoid the Father's Will. But, Jesus says 'that doesn't fit'! You may try to force a star through the circle but you are going to destroy & shave off the star's points (gain the world but lose your soul). When we try to forcefully smash another shape through a God-fitted opening that doesn't coincide (then it doesn't go inside!) We can understand Peter's motive. Who doesn't want to avoid the pain and cross of life? But we can't force our will through God's opening to eternal life. We have to go through life and death in Christ as God shapes it for each of us.

Jesus' call to discipleship humbles us. Matt 16:24 says "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me"). To Follow Him, means that we are not in the lead. We follow. We have to sacrifice our desires and ambitions. We do as Jesus wills, not as we want. Serving Christ means accepting or doing what we may not like. But following Christ means eternal life: not just a good feeling, or not just a good day but holistically a good life! Today's gospel reminds us how easily we can fall into selfish thinking and pleasure seeking. Last week Peter was raised 'high' by Jesus when Peter recognized Jesus' divinity as Savior! At that same moment, Jesus warned Peter that he did not come to that realization by his own invention or initiative. Jesus told him, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah. For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my heavenly Father. Matt 16:17). Jesus was saying, "Peter, be on guard. Never forget that it is not your accomplishment, but a grace of the Father that you have that position". But I guess those accolades of being called 'Rock' and 'Foundation' went to his head, made him the 'block' of today ('You are an obstacle' Matt 16:23) Peter doesn't defer to the Father, and claiming his achievement as his own, he thinks he can now tell Jesus how to run his life and ministry. And Peter runs it to ground (the higher they rise, the harder they fall). Peter receives the strongest rebuke of Jesus (even in Jesus' vehemence denouncing the Pharisees in Matt chapter 23, He doesn't call them 'Satan'!)

But like St. Paul, Peter gains an understanding of a 'deeper mercy' through this fall from grace. Jesus will embrace Peter and bring him back in line with true discipleship again. Humility is what Jesus prescribes for His followers (and that they FOLLOW). Jesus says, "Whoever wishes to come after me *must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me*" (Matt 16:24).

St. Camillus de Lellis (born 5-25-1550 died 7-14-1614) was a Roman Catholic priest from Italy who founded the Camillians, a religious order dedicated to the care of the sick. De Lellis is the patron saint of the sick, hospitals, nurses and physicians.

Camillus was born at Bucchianico (eastern coast of Italy near Chieti). His mother, Camilla Compelli de Laureto, was almost fifty when she gave birth to him. His father was a professional soldier and served in the French army for many years, which kept him away from home a lot. Camillus had a tempestuous spirit like his father, and his mother struggled to discipline him in his father's absence. She died when he was 12 years old. Some extended family took custody of him, yet they neglected him and he sought to escape them. He joined the Venetian army at 16 years old and fought in wars against the Turks. His troop regiment was released from service in 1575 and he wandered around for a while wasting his resources in gambling and socializing. He eventually found work as a laborer assisting a Capuchin friary at Manfredonia. Though he still could live a rough and tumble lifestyle, he was plagued with a recurrent wound and leg sores from injuries incurred in wars. Over time, the influence of the friars struck his heart and he began to experience moral and spiritual conversion. He entered the novitiate of the Capuchins, but was denied full profession of vows due to his incurable wound. He then moved to Rome where he entered San Giacomo Hospital, which cared for incurable cases. He eventually became a caregiver at the hospital, and later even became its Superintendent. Through these moves, he continued to practice a devout faith and followed a strictly ascetic life. He was known to wear a 'hairshirt' and conduct extreme penances. His spiritual director and confessor was the popular local priest, Philip Neri, who was himself to later organize the Congregation of the Oratory.

After observing how the poor with illnesses were often neglected, he gathered a group of like-minded men to serve as religious brothers focusing on the care of poor patients. This group became a religious community for the purpose of tending to the sick and caring for the suffering in the streets abandoned by others. De Lellis established this Order of Clerks Regular, Ministers of the Infirm (abbreviated as M.I.), better known as the Camillians. Philip Neri, helped Camillus find a donor to support his seminary study and become ordained a priest himself in 1584. He organized medical care for wounded soldiers and they wore bright red crosses on their clothes to mark the motivation of their sacrificial service on the battlefield. A large red cross on their cassocks today remains a symbol of the Congregation as the original Red Cross (before there was an international Red Cross). Members of his Caregiving Order devoted themselves to victims of periodic outbreaks of Bubonic plague. The people of Rome credited de Lellis with sparing the city of a great plague and remedying the famine threatening to follow the outbreak. Camillis' work with this plague earned him the title of a "Saint of Rome".

St. Camillus worked to his last day heroically serving the sick. Even though he was often in pain and afflicted with his incurable leg wounds, he would not allow anyone to wait on him. It is reported that he would crawl to visit the sick when unable to stand or walk. He was blessed with gifts of extraordinary healing. He died in 1614 while conducting an inspection tour of all the hospitals of the Order in Italy. He was entombed at the Church of St. Mary Magdalene, and became a frequent intercessor for the sick. St. Camillus, pray for us!
