Diocesan Statement on Call to Prayer for Justice and Address of Systemic Racism June 2, 2020

I join with civic and religious leaders across the United States to pray for peace and healing as our nation faces yet another crisis of racism, violence, and distrust. Yet again we are appalled at the violent death of an unarmed Black man at the hands of police. This has happened all too often in our land; a land that we declare is grounded in justice for all. I extend my prayers and concern for the family and community of Mr. George Floyd and for the repose of his soul. The violence that led to his death was filmed for all to see and sadly looks all too familiar. As noted by Archbishop José H. Gomez, the president of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, Mr. Floyd's death was "senseless and brutal."

I implore all to heed the calls for an end to the violence that has followed this tragedy. Peaceful demonstrators and protestors have a proper and positive place in our society. It is urgent that our communities' leaders listen and commit themselves to concrete actions to right the injustices that racism breeds; the most noteworthy among these being violence toward people of color. The violence in American cities in recent days is self-destructive and self-defeating. No good can come from violence and destruction. I add my voice to the voices of law enforcement professionals calling for justice. They are rightly ashamed and saddened by recent events. I believe that the vast majority of police men and women desire to serve and protect, and are to be commended for their generous service. Let us as communities and as a nation now listen to the cries of those burdened every day by the sinful effects of racism. Together we can still build a more just society that will assure life, liberty, and equality for all.

About Weekend and Daily Mass Participation: Just to give an idea about the size of congregations at mass so far. We are limited to 33% capacity, and we have been coming in safely under the limits (we do have the parish hall TV screen overflow open area, too). Of course, the Sunday Obligation is relaxed. There is no obligation to attend. So Live- Stream Mass, Spiritual Communion and Personal At Home Prayer and Study of the Word is a first and safest option. Since we began in-person masses a week ago Wednesday (May 20), the daily mass attendance has looked like this: Wednesday and Friday mornings 8:00 am & 9:00 am about 15 persons each turned out. Evenings on Tuesday and Wednesday 6:00 pm about 5-10 persons. Thursday morning 8:00 am about 6-7 persons. For Weekend masses the evenings Saturday 4:30 & 6:00 pm were the lightest attendance coming in at about 20-25 persons and Sunday mornings 8:00 & 10:00 am were about 30 persons. Face coverings are required, and we keep safe distance and safe seating and maintain all the sanitizing procedures to stay well!

June 7, 2020 Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity Jn 3:16-18

Dear St. Pius X and St. Anthony Church,

Happy Trinity Sunday! We are really in the middle of a Trinity of Sundays! This tri-celebration began with Pentecost and its commissioning service of us all to be evangelists. Since the Holy Spirit came upon us to animate us to be evangelists, we go now to share what we have been given: true life in Christ! We each will evangelize in his/her own unique way, based on the particular gifts of the Holy Spirit, that God gave us. The message of Pentecost is 'Go, make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all I commanded...." (Matthew 28:19-20). I get the 'Go' part, easily enough. And the physical part of baptism is easy enough: prayer and water. But I may come up short on the 'teach' part. What exactly is to be taught? That is where part two and part three of these special series of 3 Sundays comes in. Today and next Sunday we receive the 'download' of content to teach (The Mystery of God's Life in the Trinity itself, and the Mystery of God's Life in Us through Jesus' Body & Blood). With Trinity Sunday, we learn about who God is (Three Divine Persons, Yet One God), and next Sunday with Corpus Christi, we learn about who we are as 'disciples of Jesus' living in His Name. We have two big Sundays of teaching to digest (& digest especially next Sunday as we take in Jesus' own body & blood).

How about the Trinity? I like to begin by saying the Divine Trinity is Pure Revelation. Such understanding of who God is and all the questions about God's being and attributes is more than we could ever humanly propose and explain by our own effort without God's intervention. And how God relates interiorly unto Himself certainly has to be revealed to us. While we humans may be able to vaguely sense or intuitively suppose the existence of a God through just observing creation and reflecting upon the design of ordered nature, it is an entirely 'new level' and leap to know God's identity as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The name/title of persons and their relations or processions required God Himself teaching it to us. And Jesus performs this detailed teaching. The letter to the Romans refers to a natural sense of knowing God in a general way, when it says, "Ever since the creation of the world, God's invisible attributes of eternal power and divinity have been able to be understood and perceived in what he has made" (Romans 1:20). But the more specific attributes and relations of God as three-inone needed Jesus Himself to teach us. This next step of Jesus filling in the gap between our intuitive sense of a higher power, and actually naming & our being claimed by this 'power' happens when Jesus comes. Ephesians 1:9 refers to this process of revelation saying "he has made known to us the mystery of his will" (also Eph 3:3). Jesus Himself refers to his teaching revelation when he says in John 17:6 "I revealed Your name to those whom you gave me out of the world" and John 17:26, "I made known to them your Name...." Following Jesus, the Holy Spirit continued the unfolding revelation of God's Identity as Jesus said, "the Holy Spirit that the Father will send in my name—he will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you" (John 14:26). So, I humbly admit that the Trinity is God's teaching of us!

Yet, Trinity Sunday begs us to think about how we describe God! Who is God? Okay a 'mystery'. But we can't stop and avoid even an attempt to describe God juts because God is a 'Mystery'. A lot of people do! Like it is a dead end or something, they just give up when the word 'mystery' comes up. But, the word 'mystery' is an invitation (like a great mystery novel waiting for you to enjoy!)To call God a 'mystery' compliments the immensity and omnipotence of God. We need to get into God, to seek and explore. I remind myself all the time, "We all live with mystery all day long, every day!" In fact a mystery maybe as perplexing as God's identity amounts to why we have these three specific scripture readings in today's mass! Do any of the them directly add to a clearer definition the Trinity? Well, in a way they do show us going in the direction of a more and more specific description of God as God reveals more of the divine identity (Name) to us. The first reading has Moses hear from God Himself about more personal qualities of in the divine identity. Exodus 34:6 states that the LORD, is "a God gracious and merciful, slow to anger and abounding in love and fidelity." This is certainly a development over the initial non-title God gave to Moses back at the burning bush of Exodus 3:14 where all Moses learned about God is to call Him, "I am who I am". So over time, we see an ever fuller and fuller development and understanding of God's identity and God's purpose. For example, as we get to the Gospel Revelation (today's reading) we hear that God the Father, sent the Son into the world that every believing soul might live eternally, and that the world might be saved in Him (John 3:16). Again, with ever more time and more progressive revelation, we come to know from Jesus, the Identity of God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, a divine community of purpose. I look forward to next Sunday's part three of this trinity of Sundays to hear how we fit in to this ongoing work of divine revelation!

Another Saint for a Time of Plague: St. Thecla, Friend of Paul St. Thecla's feast (like St Christopher's and others) was removed from the Roman Catholic Liturgical Calendar in the reforms of Vatican II (1969). Yet, Thecla was a contemporary of St Paul (active through the 40's-60's AD) and entered the field of evangelization alongside him. She was born to a rich family in Iconium, a town in Asia Minor. She was expected to marry and marry into a politically connected family. In fact, her mother had a rising powerful, young man picked out for her. However, nearing the marriage date, she happened to overhear Paul preach in a neighboring house three consecutive nights about the gospel of Jesus. Thecla decided not to marry and instead to devote her life to Jesus Christ. Her fiancé Thamyris was furious and complained to the local governor that Paul was a bad influence. Because Thamyris was so prominent, Paul was arrested and imprisoned. Late at night Thecla secretly went to the prison, bribed the guards, and stayed to hear Paul's teaching. When her family found her, they turned her and Paul over to the authorities. Paul was driven from the city and Thecla was sentenced to death. Her mother was so angry at her daughter's disobedience that she wouldn't intervene. Thecla was tortured, but she survived by God's intervention and she escaped to Antioch. She soon met Paul and helped him preach and conduct his missionary work.

But again a powerful person, a city governor, made advances toward Thecla proposing marriage. When she declined his gestures, he denounced her to the authorities. She was arrested and sentenced to die in the arena (made sport of exposed to the lion's cage). But the wild beasts wouldn't harm her. After a further attempt to drown her, she managed to be revived on the shore and local government officials were so frightened that they let her go. She retreated to a rocky desert cave in the secluded mountains of Syria to offer prayer and penance. Many came to visit her and seek counsel and healing. She became the envy of local doctors because of her popularity as a healer, yet they could not chase her away. She remained in her prayer cave safely. Known as Thecla's cave (in the Maaloula area of Syria, 50 miles NE of Damascus), there is a convent of nuns residing there and in her cave is a still running spring that provided fresh water to Thecla (and healings!)

There is a famous painting of Giovanni Battista Tiepolo, called, 'St. Thecla Liberating the City of Este from the Plague', we see her recollected in prayer, face toward heaven, as all around her, at the base of the beautiful Euganean Hills where Este is located (near Padua Italy), are scenes of terror. Beds of the sick in agony, being attended to by worried and frantic family, the bodies of the deceased being collected in masses for burial, and seemingly starving children clinging to parents bent over and weighed down with grief. All frightening and horrific scenes, yet in the midst of them all is Thecla face to heaven interceding and exuding serenity that god will intervene and provide succor and remedy. Her trust and tranquility brought calm and faith to the city and many were spared and healed through her intercessory prayer and ministry.
