GENERAL MEETING

MON., FEB. 15, 7:30 PM in the Garden Center, 3105 Grant in Memorial Park. vigorous debate is now underway in Congress over whether or not to open the coastal plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge to oil and gas development. What's at stake? Join us Feb 15 for an Arctic Refuge double feature. Two videotapes -- ARCTIC REFUGE: TREASURE OF THE NORTH, produced by the Northern Alaska Environmental Center, and ARCTIC REFUGE: A WILDERNESS IN PERIL by The Wilderness Society -- will introduce us to the land that has been called "America's Serengeti" and the implications of oil and gas development for it. Protection of the Arctic Coastal Plain is one of National Audubon's top conservation priorities. Come find out why.

FT. HANCOCK RESERVOIR/RIO GRANDE LEVEE SAT., FEB. 6. Meet at Feather Lake, 9500 North Loop, at 7:30 AM. Bring lunch, as we'll return about 2 PM. Previously seen were Swamp Sparrows, Common Mergansers, Herring Gulls. Leader: Bob Johnson (751-0125 h, 757-1876 recorder).

MT. RILEY/KILBOURNE HOLE SUN., FEB. 14. Meet at Crossroads Pond, Doniphan and Country Club Rd., 7:30 AM. A trip to the desert w. of Santa Teresa. Bring lunch. In the past, Long-eared Owls have been seen here. Leader: Tom Baker (877-3365 h, 566-9461 w).

HOLLOMAN LAKE/ALAMOGORDO ZOO SUN., FEB. 21. Meet at K-Mart parking lot, 9484 Dyer, 7 AM. This is a full day trip so bring lunch and snacks. In years past, Hooded Mergansers, a Tundra Swan and many water birds were seen. Leader: Art Arteaga (595-8772).

HUECO TANKS STATE PARK SAT., FEB. 27. Meet at Avila's restaurant, 10600 Montana at Yarbrough, at 7:30 AM. This is a morning trip, but will also. Should see : Scrub Jays, Phainopeplas, Crissal Thrashers, Great Horned Owls. Leader: John Sproul (545-5157 h, 541-6126 w).

NORTHEAST OXIDATION PONDS
SUN., MAR. 6. Meet at Furrows, 4801 Fred
Wilson Rd., 2:30 PM. Spring migration will
have begun, but many of our winter visitors
will still be here. A good time to see
them is late afternoon. This trip always
produces many ducks and often a wader
that is uncommon to this area. Leader:

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS

HUECO TANKS: Twenty people in 5 parties covered the Hueco Tanks CBC area on Dec 19. It was partly cloudy with a light breeze. Temperatures ranged from 39 to 52 degrees. Sixty-five species and 3,138 individuals were seen. Unusual sightings included an immature Herring Gull and a Snowy Plover. A large number of Lark Buntings was seen. /Joyce Davis/

EL PASO: Our El Paso CBC held on Jan 3 was partially successful. We reported a new high in species--110, but only 11,837 individuals were seen. This is about 50% of the last 5 year average. We had 30 counters in the field and 9 feeder counters. Unusual sightings were: a Great Egret, 2 Horned Grebes, a Blue-winged Teal, 1 Hooded & 2 Red-breasted mergansers, 11 Mountain Chickadees, 1 N. Cardinal, 1 N. Oriole, a Black-headed and an Evening grosbeak, and 12 Red Crossbills. /Bob Johnson/

FEATHER LAKE UPDATE

Ducks at Feather Lake came through the snows in good condition, and the lake had a temporary gain of about 4 inches of water. Duck population is at its peak; approximately a thousand ducks are on the lake. Green-winged Teal, Mallards and N. Pintails are the most numerous species. They have been joined on occasion by a few Snow Geese and Canada Geese. A flock of Greater Yellowlegs has enjoyed the shallows all winter. A Great Egret and a Great Blue Heron have overwintered also.

The Sanctuary will be open (until the end of April) on Sun. afternoons, 3:30 PM to

sundown, and the first and third Sat. of each month, 8 AM to 11 AM. It will not be open Easter weekend or in case of inclement weather.

In addition to chapter workdays Dec 6 and Jan 16, recent weeks have seen plenty of other volunteer activity at Feather Lake. Amy Brasfield, home on break from the Audubon Expedition Institute, has helped with planting seeds and pole cuttings of native riparian species. Also, on Jan 9 and 16, the Boy Scouts of Troop 44 in El Paso worked on a variety of sanctuary projects: construction of a blind, planting willow pole cuttings, removing tumbleweeds, clearing trash and removing saltcedar seedlings that are competing with the cottonwood and willow seedlings now growing around the basin. The work of the scouts was orchestrated by Brent White as his Eagle Scout service project. Many thanks to Amy, to Brent and to all the scouts of Troop 44 for making some very valuable contributions to our sanctuary.

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TEXAS BREEDING BIRD ATLAS PROJECT

Want to add a new and rewarding twist to your birding this year? Volunteer to cover a survey area for the Texas Breeding Bird Atlas Project (TBBAP). This ambitious 5-year effort to document current breeding-bird distributions in our state is now entering its 2nd year. Particularly in far West Texas, its success depends on getting enough folks in the field to provide adequate coverage.

Each survey area coincides with a U.S. Geological Survey 7.5-minute topographic map, or quadrangle. In this part of the state, there are many ornithologically interesting quadrangles just begging for observers to cover them. The field work is fun — it's birding with an added dimension. While observing birds in your survey area, you look for and record different clues that give evidence of breeding. Gathering such data is just as important for the common birds of your survey area as for the rare ones.

Though the peak of the breeding season is several months away, now isn't too soon to get started. Many raptors nest early. Golden Eagles, for example, will begin soon. Some Great Horned Owls may be on their nests already. Also, a

little planning and reconnaissance now will help you cover your area more effectively later.

EL PASO-LAS CRUCES RARE BIRDS COMMITTEE

The bird-record files of the El Paso-Las Cruces Rare Birds Committee (RBC) continue to grow. The RBC reviewed documentation for 122 local bird records in 1987. Among the most noteworthy: Surf

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Scoters from Mountain Shadows Lake (Dec 1986), a Piping Plover from the Ft.
Bliss sewage ponds (Aug 1987), a Mountain Plover from the AG Sod Farm (Mar 1987), a Black-legged Kittiwake from Burn Lake in Las Cruces (Dec 1986), a Least Tern from Feather Lake (Jun 1987), Ruddy Ground-Doves from the Owen yard (Oct 1987), a N. Saw-whet Owl from the Tennis West area (Aug 1987), a Broadbilled Hummingbird from Las Cruces (Jul 1987) and a Blackpoll Warbler from El Paso's upper valley residential area (Oct 1987).

The RBC files, including both written details and photographic documentation of rare-bird sightings, are maintained at the UTEP Centennial Museum in El Paso and the NMSU library in Las Cruces.

Next time you see an unusual bird, the RBC encourages you to write down the details of your sighting (or get a photograph) and submit them for the files. You'll be adding to a valuable data base on El Paso-Las Cruces area birds, much to the delight of present and future students of this area's birdlife.

Two Horned Grebes were seen at A 1/2 (NK*E). An Am. Bittern was spotted at FL 11/21 (JS). Great Egrets were seen several times at FL between 41/21 & 1/9 (JS) and at A 1/2 (NK *E), S 12/6 (BJ). Cattle Egrets were at FL 11/29, 12/6 (JS). Green-backed Herons were seen at FL 11/21, 11/28, 12/20, 1/6 (JS), CP 11/27, 12/12 (JS),(*E). Blackcrowned Night-Herons were seen at FL 11/29 (JS) and at Cement Lake 12/30 (JD). Two imm. Snow Geese were seen at FL 11/21, 11/28 (JS), S 12/6 (BJ), and a flock of 30, including 1 of the blue phase, was at Sunland Park Race Track (*E). A Canada Goose was found at FL 1/9 (JS). Four Wood Ducks were seen at Los Nogales 12/3 (BJ) and 2 males were at Vista Hills Golf Course 1/2 (DC) and 1/6 (JS). A Blue-winged Teal was seen at A 1/2 (SD*E). A female Common Goldeneye and a female Hooded Merganser were found at CP 11/27, 12/12 (JS), 12/8 (BJ,DT), (BJ*E). A Red-breasted Merganser was reported at A 1/2 (NK*E), and a Common Merganser wás at FH 1/7 (BJ,RW). Several Buffleheads were seen at FB 12/20 (BJ), MtS 12/20 (JS), CP 1/2 (BJ*E), 1/9 (JD). A Sharp-shinned Hawk was spotted at FL 11/21 (JS). A Golden Eagle was seen in Hueco Mts. 12/19 (JG*H). A

Merlin was found south of S 1/17(LJ).

QUAIL - WOODPECKERS

A rare Snowy Plover was seen and photographed at MtS 12/19 (A&MG*H), 12/20 (JS). Several Greater Yellowlegs stayed around FL 11/21 - 1/16 (JS). A Spotted Sandpiper was found at FH 1/17 (LJ). A Common Snipe was spotted at FL 11/28, 11/29 (JS). A vagrant flock of 8 Bonaparte's Gulls was seen at S 1/17 (LJ). Ringed-billed Gulls were found at FB 12/20 (BJ) and FH 1/17 (LJ). An imm. Herring Gull was seen at MtS 12/19 (A&MG*H), 3 ad., 1 imm. at FH 1/7 (BJ,RW) and 1 imm. at FH 1/17 (LJ). Great Horned Owls were heard at H 12/19 (JS*H) and e. FM 1/2 (JS*E). Several people saw the VIOLET-CROWNED HUMMINGBIRD - the 1st documented record in Texas - on Donnybrook between 12/1 and 12/12. Female Anna's Hummingbirds were still coming to feeders at Donnybrook, MtP, and an e. El Paso yard (H&EM, JB, AB). Male Rufous Hummingbirds came to feeders at Shaver Dr. 11/22 (AB), and during Dec at Donnybrook (H&EM) and Berwick Rd. (LG).

FLYCATCHERS - VIREOS

An imm. male Vermilion Flycatcher was found at RP 12/12 (JS). Scrub Jays were seen at FB 11/27 (DT), MtP 12/1 (JB), H 12/19 (JS*H). An Am. Crow was spotted at FL 1/9 (JS). Mountain Chickadees were found at RP and L 12/12 (JS), EPCC 12/3 (DT), and in Juarez 1/2 (TB*E). Redbreasted Nuthatches were seen at EPCC 12/3 (DT) and on L 12/12 (JS). A Brown Creeper was spotted at D 11/27 (JS). A Black-tailed Gnatcatcher was found north of Fabens 1/17 (LJ). Fourteen W. Bluebirds were seen daily 1/13 - 1/20 at Hawkins and Darlina (AB). A Hermit Thrush was seen at OW 11/27 (JS). Curve-billed Thrashers were found at OW 11/27 (JS) and MtP 12/1 (JB). A Phainopepla was seen in MtP 12/1 (JB) and near RP 12/12 (JS). A

male N. Cardinal has been visiting a n.e. yard since 12/13 (BJ).

WARBLERS - WEAVER FINCHES A very late Orange-crowned Warbler was spotted at EPCC 12/3 (DT). Green-tailed Towhees were seen at D 11/27 (JS), H 12/19 (TB*H), w. FM 1/2 (JS*E). Rufous-sided Towhees were reported from a n.e. yard 11/28 (RW), MtP 12/1 (JB), H 12/19 (*H), upper valley 12/12 and w. FM 1/2 (JS*E). Eight Black-chinned Sparrows were found in W. Cottonwood Spring Canyon 1/2 (JS*E). Vesper Sparrows were seen at OW 11/27, DL and RP 12/12 (JS). A Sage Sparrow was seen in H area 12/19 (BJ*H). Numerous Lark Buntings were reported from FL 11/28, 12/20, 1/6 (JS), MtS 12/20 (JS), H 12/19 (TB*H), and El Paso area 1/2 (BJ*E). Two White-throated Sparrows were found at D 11/27 (JS). A Golden-crowned Sparrow was reported north of DL 12/6 (LJ). Yellow-headed Blackbirds were seen along Border Hwy. 12/6 (JS). A late N. Oriole was seen in a n.e. El Paso yard 1/2 (JG*E). Red Crossbills were seen on L 12/12 (JS) and on 1/2 (BJ \pm E), also near Radford School 1/2 (KB*E). A Pine Siskin was reported at DL 12/12 (JS). Lesser Goldfinches were found at RP 12/12 (JS) and Three Hills addition 1/2 (JS*E). Two Am. Goldfinches were spotted at AG 11/27 (JS). An Evening Grosbeak was in MP 1/2 (JC*E).


