Jeff Smith, science director of HawkWatch International headquartered in Salt Lake City, Utah, is the featured speaker at the El Paso /Trans-Pecos Audubon chapter meeting on Monday, September 19, at 7:00 PM at the UTEP Centennial Museum. The meeting is open to the public, and everyone interested in the present status of raptor ecology and conservation is welcome to attend this special event.

Dr. Smith will discuss the current results of HawkWatch International's long-term monitoring and protection program for hawks, eagles, and other birds of prey. He will also show some amazing photos of raptors and recount personal stories of his decade-long work with these powerful birds!

Dr. Smith has expressed an interest in visiting the Wyler Tramway Hawkwatch site during his upcoming stay in El Paso. He has been a key resource to John Kiseda, coordinator, in analyzing raptor migration trends in the Franklin Mountains.

Hawkwatch International is a founding partner of the largest network of long-term, standardized raptor migration monitoring projects coordinated by a single organization anywhere in the world!

AT FEATHER LAKE


Feather Lake was mostly dry in June and July, save for brief intermittent flooding of the central area with irrigation water. These conditions brought a nice crop of curltop smartweed and barnyard grass, with lesser amounts of chufa, Mexican sprangletop and other early-successional plants. They should provide welcome food resources for waterfowl this fall and winter. If we have water, that is. Cottonwood, willow and, more ominously, saltcedar seedlings are also appearing in many areas.

After several unsuccessful attempts in recent years, 2 of the semi-wild Canada Geese that frequent the lake nested successfully this year, raising 4 young. The family of 6 has been in residence all summer.

Our next workday will be **Sun.**, **Sept. 25**, starting at **2 p.m**. We'll be preparing for the annual re-opening of Feather Lake to the public, which takes place Sat., Oct. 1. Want to help staff Feather Lake one or more days this fall when it is open? Please contact John Sproul (747-8663, jsproul@utep.edu).

Finally, mark your calendars for our annual pot-luck picnic at the lake. It takes place Sat., Oct. 8. Look for details in the next Roadrunner.

Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave. Starting Oct. 1, it will be open 8 a.m. to noon on Saturday mornings and 2 p.m. to dusk on Sunday afternoons. Admission is free.






SHOREBIRD MIGRATION

WATER CANYON

HAWK WATCH

An overnight trip to the Monzano Mountains to observe part of the annual migration of *RAPTORS*. This is one of a number of sites in the west that Hawk Watch International uses as a counting and banding site for the study of raptor migration. The raptor count is conducted from about the middle of August until the first part of November. The observation point is located on <u>Capilla Peak</u> in the <u>Cibola National Forest</u>.

A few motels in Mountainair about 15 miles south from a campground below the peak and motels in Albuquerque about 50 miles north. This is not a trip where you have to get out at sunrise as the birds are flying by all day. The latter part of September usually has some of the highest counts. Two years ago when we went they had the biggest count day with over 300 birds seen.

You will see various species up close, including hand held raptors that have been mist netted for banding. They will show the wings and body size and explain about the bird. You might be one of the persons that will be allowed to hold and release a bird.
