AMANA NEWS AND NOTES

Quilt Amana is April 1 – 3 This Quilt has a Community Story to Tell

A happy spring happening is Quilt Amana at the Price Creek Event Center in Amana, April 1-3

Guest artist, Sue Kluber, merchant vendors, quilts for sale, fabric sales and a new exhibit featuring a quilt that was born in communal Amana is all part of the weekend. An exhibition of traditional Amana hand quilting will be featured, while Schanz Furniture will be at the show with their work.

"Found" is an exhibit of quilts created from historical fabrics or portions of unfinished quilts that have been found in attics, sewing boxes or chests of drawers. Using these unfinished quilt "tops" or bundles of old fabric, the new quilts have been patiently, carefully and lovingly stitched to create or in some cases, re-create a new quilt from the old. Three of the quilts were made of hand stitched embroidered quilt squares.

"I think of them as tributes to the women who started these quilts and for some reason, perhaps a circumstance in their lives that happened, they couldn't finish the quilt. We looked at these pieces and finished them or created a new quilt from them," explained Chris Davies, Heritage Designs Quilting and Needlework. "It's really done in honor of the craftswomen and their work."

Chris Davies, Danita Simmons, master quilter Jane Bazyn, and the entire team at Heritage Designs has poured heart and soul into Quilt Amana, especially the new exhibit "Found."

"It's been pretty special to work with these found peices and bring them to light," Davies added. "I think they tell stories – and to see them is to finally be able to see their story."

One quilt has been especially meaningful for Davies as it's literally involved a village to create. Lynn Hattery-Beyer, Amana, had a packet of samples of original calico from the Amana calico works. Each swatch was small – just a couple of inches across. Hattery-

Beyer saw the beauty in them and felt they were so precious that they should be used to create a quilt to honor the calico works and the tradition of quilting. So she brought them to Chris Davies.

The Amana calico works operated prior to World War 1 in Amana. The calico works was located where the Amana Furniture Shop is now and used water power from Price Creek to power it's printing mill. Cotton fabric was purchased and then dyed and stamped with designs. The print works used mostly blue indigo dyes, but also printed red and green fabrics. Printed calicos were highly popular across America. When the imported dyes could not be obtained the dye works was closed at the offing of World War 1. The last shipment of indigo dye which was processed and imported from Germany was brought on a submarine that slipped through a net of British destroyers to complete a harrowing voyage from Bremerhaven to Baltimore. Though it was never confirmed or denied, this submarine was said to have carried a special envoy from Germany to Washington DC to appeal to the United States not to enter World War I. Of course the USA did enter World War I and the shipment of all goods from Germany ceased. The story of this sub and its crew became a huge headline in

Apart from this colorful end to the calico works, the place had had an important role in helping provide the means to sustain the early Amana community. What's more, printing and selling reasonably priced fabric meant that working class women could afford new, pretty cloth for their clothing. Having the cheerful calicos to work with was part of nearly every woman's life in 19th century America.



Looking at each one of the deep blue, calico pieces – they looked as if they had been printed just yesterday – Davies knew it would be a very special quilt. She found 30 different calico patterns and so designed a quilt incorporating those patterns.

Then she and Bazyn stitched the pieces together at a quilt retreat. The finished quilt top was then given to Middle Amana master colony quilter Marlene Trumpold. She attached it to her quilting frame and hand quilted it using a replica cotton fabric as its backing. The replica fabric was chosen to highlight the calico.

This was a meaningful moment as the quilting of calico fabric into comforter style quilts has been an Amana tradition since the calico works was founded in the mid 19th century. The fact that the Amana quilters had access to calico cloth and wool meant that they did not have to "piece" quilts – though they sometimes did for fun or as a way to use up odds and ends of cloth. Marlene's grandmother Reihmann had been a piece-quilter. But the majority of quilts were comforters made from large pieces of wool, flannel or cotton calico.

Davies contacted needlecraft expert and historian Barbara Hoehnle for insight on the history of the calico works and will incorporate what she learned about the calico works into the exhibition of the finished quilt. The quilt will be exhibited and used to help show and tell about textile history and quilting as a part of American history.

"This was a true team effort," said Davies.

Quilt Amana will be open Friday, April 1 through Sunday, April 3 at the Price Creek Event Center.

According to Chris Davies of Heritage Designs it will be quite a beautiful display made up of quilters from people she has taught, quilts people have resurected from attics and even a quilt from calico blocks which Mrs. Bayer gave to Chris.

Chris developed a pattern and constructed a quilt using these old Amana calico samples and then Marlene Trumpold quilted it.

That alone should be worth the trip. We are losing our quilters and are lucky to have people take interest in this very special art.

It truly is an art because quilting is not just making a running stitch, but developing a pattern, applique, patchwork, cotton or wool quilting, matching fabrics and on it goes.

It is truly a labor of love that some of us have put away in trunks because we can remember the people who made the art pieces and we don't want someone to jump on the bed with their dirty shoes thus soiling the quilt.

Yes, I had that happen and did not speak to that "culprit" for a very long time.
