

TICONDEROGA SCHOOLS BUDGET

On Tuesday, May 15th, a vote was held on the 2012-13 Ticonderoga School District Budget. Superintendent John McDonald and the Ticonderoga School Board, with the help of district employees who agreed to a pay freeze, have reduced expenses in the budget to a level lower than last year. However, with income reduced also, the actual tax levy will be greater than last year by 3.56%.

A summary presented to the public is as follows:

If the budget is not passed by the voters, the School Board can resubmit the same budget or present the contingency budget which has been set at \$17,495,049.

BOAT WASH STATION IN HAGUE

A \$40,000 boat wash station, purchased by the Warren County Soil and Water Conservation District, with additional contributions from the towns of Hague, Queensbury, Lake George and Bolton was scheduled to be set up in Bolton. When that location was not available, David Darrin was contacted by the Lake George Park Commission (LGPC) with a request to set up the portable boat washing station on his property across from the Hague Town Park.

At the May Hague Town Board meeting several questions were presented with regard to this project. No Town official had been contacted prior to the decision to locate in Hague so some questions went unanswered. Dave Wick, the new Executive Director of the LGPC, told *The Hague Chronicle* that he will be at the next Board meeting on June 12, 2012 to discuss the project and answer any questions.


The boat wash station is part of a pilot program designed to help keep invasive species out of Lake George. Wick said, "When boaters go to the Hague launch site, the Lake George Association Lake Stewards will inspect the boats and if a problem is noted, the boaters will be encouraged to go across the street to have their boats cleaned before putting them into the Lake." The cleaning is free of charge and voluntary.

Proponents of the plan envision boat wash stations ringing the Lake in a few years while opponents are concerned that if the program becomes mandatory, it will be difficult to administer and expensive for boaters.

THE FIGHT TO PROTECT LAKE GEORGE

Lawn fertilizers, stormwater runoff and invasive aquatic species are all threats to Lake George which are being addressed by the various Lake organizations, but it takes cooperation from the public to make the plans work.

The Lake George Park Commission (LGPC) is managing the fight to keep invasive species out of Lake George with a pilot program to clean boats before they enter the Lake from other bodies of water. The Fund for Lake George has published a document urging mandatory boat inspections and promoting a Clean, Drain and Dry program.






Hague Town Councilman Steve Ramant is urging his fellow citizens to support these plans. He said, "Lake George has four aquatic invasive species in it, Lake Champlain has 49 and the Hudson River has 91. The largest number of boats going into Lake George come from these two bodies of water. The public needs to be aware of these facts and moved to action. If not, there is a great chance that Lake George as we know it will have reduced property values, a reduced quality of life for all of us and conditions that may never be reversed."

"INVADERS WATCH" PROGRAM

The Lake George Association (LGA) is seeking volunteers to identify and monitor invasive species along Lake George's shorelines in a program called Invaders Watch. NYS ASSEMBLY PASSES INVASIVE BILL

The Invasive Species Bill (A9422), introduced by New York State Assembly members Robert Sweeney and Teresa Sayward, passed the Assembly in late April and is now before the State Senate. This bill authorizes the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) to establish a list of invasive species that will be prohibited from being sold, transported and introduced in New York State.

LGLC RECEIVES GRANT

The Lake George Land Conservancy (LGLC) has received a Conservation Partnership Program grant totaling \$8,300. The grant will enable LGLC to hire two student interns to assist with preserve management and easement monitoring, and to develop and implement educational programs.

FIRING UP THE FIREHOUSE RESTAURANT

The Firehouse Restaurant on Route 8 in Hague will reopen for the season on Thursday, May 17, 2012. *The Hague Chronicle* sat down with owner Sheri Delarm and chef Rob Riddle recently to find out what awaits guests this year.



"One thing that will be new," Sheri told us, "is our First Responders offering. That means 10 percent off any food items on the menu for those who choose to dine between 4:30 and 6 pm." Guests can expect to see most of the popular items from past years on the menu again this year, including strip steaks, prime rib, chicken parmesan and fish, to name a few.

In addition, Rob is very excited about the daily specials they'll be serving. "For instance, we'll have fresh Hawaiian fish again whenever we can get it," he said. And Rob knows a thing or two about Hawaiian fish, having spent the last few winters there, visiting the fish markets, touring the facilities and talking to chefs on the islands. The fish arrives at The Firehouse via Fed Ex, making the time from ocean to table less than 24 hours. "The waters off of Hawaii are among the cleanest in the world," Rob explained. "And very deep, which means that the fish have more Omega 3 oils – the healthy fat!" Add to that the fact that Hawaiian fish are more flavorful, and guests at The Firehouse are in for a treat. But it's not just the fish that draw guests back again and again. Rob prides himself on his culinary creativity and uses only quality ingredients in every dish.

Sheri also told us that she's going to be serving a weekly cocktail special of her own creation this year. She wouldn't divulge any of the recipes, but anyone who knows Sheri also knows that she's not about to serve anything other than the perfect drink. "We're really looking forward to seeing our regulars again – as well as meeting new people," Sheri said. "Come on in and get fired up!"

SPECIAL TOWN BOARD MEETING - 4/23/12

All Board members were present to review the Rules of Procedure governing the conduct of Town of Hague Board meetings adopted on 1/10/2012. The minutes state, "It was emphasized that Town Board Committees need to follow procedure by Town Law Section 63. Town Board Committees are to make studies and report back in writing with recommendations to the full Board."

TOWN BOARD MEETING - 5/8/2012

Supervisor Frasier and Board members Fitzgerald, Martucci, Meola and Ramant were all present.

Assessor Dave Martucci announced that the Assessment Roll has been published and the Board of Assessment Review (BAR) grievance day will be on May 22, 2012.

Councilman Fitzgerald reported on work at the Community Center. The Board agreed that he should continue working to have the upgrades done in the kitchen. They also authorized him to pursue work needed at the sewer plant and the highway garage.

Councilman Fitzgerald reported on activities of the HVFD. He noted that they need additional volunteer drivers who will be trained.

Supervisor Frasier read thanks to Highway Superintendent Don Smith from the DEC on the excellent job – done in a more timely manner than the DEC could do it – that the highway department has done on the road to Jabe's pond.

Councilman Meola reminded the Board of the Clean-Up day in June. He also asked ZEO Clark if any visits had been made for junk vehicles or junk yards. ZEO Clark noted she has made some personal visits but has not had time to do a whole town survey. A recommendation was made at a conference she attended that a town have a committee to do the survey rather than just a single person. She also noted that the Code does not address junk boats and a place is needed to take them.

Councilman Ramant reported on the Oktoberfest, the ATT cellular antenna for the Community Center roof and the new promotion spots that the Chamber is working on.

Councilman Meola reported that the Silver Bay Youth Summer program will be held from June 25 – August 17, 2012. The Town and Silver Bay share the costs for this well received program. Anyone interested should contact the Community Center for an application.

Supervisor Frasier and Councilman Meola looked at the equipment at the Wastewater Treatment Plant. There is a shortage of drying beds so they need to get more or get a special machine that takes out the water. They favored the latter and will look into possible grant money. Audience member Gene Moran noted he has read that these machines can break down and they would have to watch maintenance costs. Supervisor Frasier also reported that Paul Belden has been doing a "tremendous job" managing the work of the Sewer Districts.

The Board approved hiring Evelyn Gravelle, Susan Adair, Kathryn Ramant and Miranda Wells to work as Park Attendants at the Visitor Center. Councilman Ramant noted that the hours will be full-time but flexible for the four employees and they have received a job description.

Councilman Ramant also noted that the Town Boat Launch will be closed from noon to 4 pm during the Memorial Day activities and he has had signs made to put up there. He also has a sign with the Music in the Park events which will be posted at the Town Park with directions to the Visitor Center for information. Repairs are being made to the Park and nine geese have been dispatched to date.

The Board was able to get a better health insurance policy for employees through CDPHP which will be effective June 1st.

The Board accepted a proposal for work around the Community Center from North County Landscaping as the low bidder of \$800 under DeFranco Landscaping bid of \$950.

A proposal was approved from Jaeger, Flynn to contract for Human Resource services including Cobra and Benefits enrollment for \$300.

The Board then adjorned to Executive Session to discuss the requirement of all employees to use a daily time card.

Supervisor Frasier said she will have her report posted on the Town website <www.townofhague.org>.

The *Ticonderoga Sentinel* of March 26, 1908, is the source of this humorous tale entitled "Great Coon Hunt at Swamp Gore".

"There was a nice party at the home of Gene Doolittle Friday night, which was given in honor of his great coon hunt the day before.

"One day last week Eugene Doolittle went from his farm to Swamp Gore, just below the mill of the American Graphite Co., in search of game and noticed several coon tracks around the



butt of an old decayed maple tree which was still standing. Thinking the coons were in the hollow of the tree he set fire to it and waited, but the coons did not show themselves. So he started home for an axe to fell the tree and on the road met Wm. DeLarm, who had an axe, and together the pair went back to the tree,

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which when they reached it fell. The two limbs struck another tree. It broke in the middle and out dropped four coons in midair. When they fell on the snow the two hunters made a grand rush for them. Delarm succeeded in catching two of them alive and Doolittle got one, while the other started up another tree. About this time one of the coons bit DeLarm on the wrist and he shook it off: So up the tree goes this coon. The hunters brought their two coons to the hollow tree again and shoved them both in and noticed there was yet another coon in the hollow of the old tree, which was then covered to keep the three coons from escaping. Then the hunt began for the escaped coons. One tree was cut down and a coon fell out of the branches but was caught alive by Doolittle, while DeLarm started in to cut down the other tree. When it fell, the coon fell also, but up it goes another tree and about this time, Doolittle's coon bit him on the hand and got away getting up another tree. . Well, the boys worked nearly all day and at last succeeded in capturing all the five coons alive, but it required the cutting down of over twenty trees. Mr. Shattuck of Hague gave Doolittle \$5.00 for the coons, which he is going to raise on his place at Hague."

AT FORT TICONDEROGA

On May 10, 1775, 237 years ago, a force of New England men under the joint command of Ethan Allen and Benedict Arnold stormed into Fort Ticonderoga and successfully captured it from a startled British garrison. The surprise attack marked America's First Victory in the War for Independence.

Following the capture, Ethan Allen wrote "The sun seemed to rise with a superior luster and Ticonderoga and its dependencies smiled on its conquerors who tossed about the flowing bowl and wished success to Congress and the liberty and freedom of America." Today, the sun again seems "to rise with a superior luster" as the staff at Fort Ticonderoga begins another exciting season of events and programs.


