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
President's Corner

of objects to see behind? So remember when you're pulling out what little hair you may have left in the sixth hour of that twenty minute job; yeah, we've been there. Next step, headliner. Yay!

Battery Business [Hap Schadler]

I recently took my 2001 Bullitt out of hibernation to get an emission test. I had the car on a battery tender for the last couple of months and discovered the terminal connectors looked really bad. The car got through the test, but the next day would not crank on battery, but would start when jumped. I removed the connectors and cleaned the negative and replaced the positive while the battery was being charged. The Charger showed a completely charged battery and it showed 12.3 volts across the terminals on a volt meter. Everything back together now and the car will not crank. Just solenoid noise.

So I consulted my friend Donny Seyfer of Seyfer Automotive. This is the explanation he provided.

12.3 Volts is actually an indication that the battery is only at about 50%. Odds are what's going on is that as soon as you apply a load to the battery it will drop down to next to nothing. If you could crank the car over you could test to see what is the cranking voltage. It could be that the battery just goes open when you put a load on it and all you're seeing is the static voltage.

I just did an article for a magazine on using the lab scope to test batteries in this situation because it'll cause all the computers on the car to shut down and not do their jobs if they cannot maintain a minimum of about 7 Volts during crank and they really only have about 135 milliseconds to stay down there or the computers will shut off due to the time at a low voltage.

So looks like I need a new battery. This also better explains why I needed a new battery on Sara's 2010 Mustang which would crank but no longer had enough voltage to keep the computers going.

Makes one nostalgic for the days when there were no automotive computers and a car that had enough battery voltage to crank would start.

Club's Facebook Group Page

In light of the recent privacy concerns for Facebook members, the Board considered if anything needed to be changed relative to the Club's Facebook group page, and concluded nothing needs to be changed.

The privacy concerns relate to personal data and its use associated with Facebook members. A Facebook group consists of individual members, where each member is responsible for their individual privacy settings. The settings associated with a group relate to who can see the group, who can see the member list of the group, and who can see posts. Our group is a PUBLIC group and as such, anyone can see the group, anyone can see the group membership list, and anyone can see posts. (As a note, only members can post to the group.) We could change the group to a CLOSED group where anyone can see the group and it's members, but only members can see posts. We could instead change the group to a PRIVATE group where only members can see the group, can see the list of group members, and can see posts. Changing the type of group only relates to non-member visibility of the group, it's members, and it's posts. The type of group doesn't change how Facebook, itself, uses the data, whatever all of that might be. The one obvious, likely use is that as individuals we would be subject to Mustang related ads. Facebook could also use the group membership list to see who we associate with in a social media sense, whatever that might mean.

It seems that it comes down to an individual choice. Be a member of the group (or any group for that matter) or not, and have a Facebook account or not ... and this is a decision only an individual Facebook member can make.

The Board concludes that based on current understanding of Facebook, no change to the Club's group page is needed. If you have concerns about this decision, please contact the president of the club (Pat).





Club Clothing

There are two sources of club clothing: Graffi-T's Screen Printing and More, and Lands' End. Graffi-Ts is located in the Springs and provides silkscreened clothing. Lands' End is available online and provides their clothing embroidered with the club's logo.

Graffi-Ts

Graffi-T will provide club clothing that includes the Mustangers logo on the left chest and the running horses across the back. The long sleeve garments also include a left and right sleeve print. The colors that work best with our logos are: white, light grays, light blues, pinks, light greens, yellows, red, tans, and orange. The available styles are: sweatshirts, hoodies, long sleeve t-shirts, short sleeve t-shirts, and ladies v-neck t-shirts. A minimum order of 24 or more pieces in mixed styles, colors and sizes is required. In order to meet the minimum order quantity, the club accumulates individual member requests until the minimum quantity is met, then places an order. There are shirts available from previous club orders. Please contact the Club Treasurer about clothing currently in the club's shirt inventory.

Lands' End

Rocky Mountain Mustangers stitched-logo apparel is available from Lands' End. Use this link <u>Lands'</u> <u>End</u> to access the club's Lands' End website to place an order. The logo is shown below. Clothing items include shirts, sweaters, blazers, jackets, and caps.:



The cost of an item is the cost to apply the logo to the item you select (\$8.50) plus the cost of the item itself, and shipping (typically \$9.95 for multiple items).
