Assembling the Lulav

The spine of the Lulav should face you. The Hadasim should be on the right, the Aravot on the left, making sure that both are pushed down so the hand will be over them while holding the lulav.

The Lulav should protrude above all others and the Hadasim should be <u>higher</u> than the Aravot.

Left- handed people hold the Lulav in the left hand (for Ashkenazim), Sephardim who are left-handed should hold the Lulav in the right hand as all others.

ORDER OF SHAKING THE LULAV & ESROG

When reciting HODU Shake to the east (front)

When reciting L'ADO-NAY No shaking

When reciting KI Shake to the south (right)

When reciting TOV Shake to the west (back over left shoulder)

When reciting KI Shake to the north (left)

When reciting LEOLAM ---- Shake upward

When reciting HASDO ---- Shake downward (top remains facing upward)

When reciting YOMAR Shake to the east (front)
When reciting NA Shake to the south (right)

When reciting ISRAEL Shake to the west (back over left soulder)

When reciting KI Shake to the north (left)

When reciting LEOLAM Shake upward

When reciting HASDO Shake downward (top remains facing upward)

The Sheliach Tzibur shakes the Lulav & Esrog on the 1st and 2nd lines only. The congregation shakes each time Hodu is recited.

When reciting A Shake to the east (front)
When reciting NA Shake to the south (right)

When reciting ADO-NAY---- No shaking

When reciting HO Shake to the west (back over left shoulder)

When reciting SHI Shake to the north (left)

When reciting AH Shake upward

When reciting NA Shake downward (top remains facing upward
