

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

Parish Council: Meets on the Monday evening after the third Sunday of the month.

HOW CAN I WITNESS TO RESURRECTON TIME?

We're used to using terms like B.C. and A.D. or C.E. (Common Era) and B.C.E. (Before Common Era) to divide human history in two, but perhaps a more significant division occurred with the



event we celebrate today. When raising Jesus Christ from the dead, God ushered in a new era: Resurrection time. Resurrection time means sharing in the hope of eternal life with the Lord. It means that God has chosen to bring salvation to this imperfect world. It means that we are

called to bring new life, resurrected life, to our world. In the beginning God created the world and in the Resurrection, God saved the world. Because we are made in the image of God, we are challenged to be creative and salvific in the way we act. "Seek what is above," Paul commands us, for we "were raised in Christ" (Colossians 3:1). We look to the resurrected Christ, who joins the Father in heaven, but is also with us always. When we love our neighbor, when we help our sisters and brothers, we are not just doing the right thing, we are not just doing what Jesus asked us to do, we are also participating in the redemptive work of our Lord. We are living in Resurrection time.

In John's Gospel we get to hear of three different reactions to the empty tomb. It is dark, the woman is alone, and she immediately runs for help. Peter, the first to enter the tomb, is confused as well.

He takes the time to see the burial cloths rolled up separately, not thrown or unrolled on the floor as they would be if the body had been dragged away. But he did not understand. Neither did John, "the disciple whom Jesus loved," but he saw and he believed. Perhaps it was the intensity of his love that led to his immediate belief. His heart moved faster than his head. He did not understand the Resurrection yet, but he so wanted



the crucifixion of the one he loved not to be the end that but the beginning of eternal life..

The initial encounter of the empty tomb exposes a paradox. It is not the presence of Jesus that inspired belief in John, but his absence. Belief came without seeing, hearing, or touching. It came without proof. It came alongside doubt and confusion. But it came nonetheless. Different disciples took different routes to belief. We heard this today and will continue to hear it over the next two Sundays. We take different routes ourselves. In His presence, or in His absence, belief can rise in us.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

How can I come to believe? How can I witness to "Resurrection time," to this era in which our lives have a deeper dimension and a greater purpose?



A Happy Ending Isn't the Whole Story

"Is there a happy ending?"

When my kids were young, we never made it past the first whiff of any narrative tension before I got this question. As soon as whatever princess or furry woodland animal who was the hero of the story got into any small scrape, they wanted that reassurance, "Is there a happy ending?"

I can't say I blame them. Don't we all feel that way sometimes? We enter into a relationship with someone or some situation, and we just want to protect ourselves. We want to know it's not going to go badly — or, if it does, that we will be able to come back from it. It's a human instinct, a reflex. Our inclination to protect ourselves makes it so that we sometimes want to press fast-forward on the bad stuff and skip straight ahead to the happily-ever-after.

Easter is the ultimate happy ending. It's the day of miracles. The day when all the stones roll away and all the sins are forgiven. It's the day that puts everything right.

But if we learned anything from this week — from the Passion and death of the Lord — it's that we can't press fast-forward on the hardships of life. That tension, that loss, that fear — it's crucial, isn't it? As Catholics, we are who we are because of Easter. But Easter doesn't happen without Good Friday.

So, does the story of salvation have a happy ending? We know it does. But we also remember that the ending isn't all that matters.
