## SAFETY PLANS IN PLACE AT STEPPING STONES ACADEMY

As always, at Stepping Stones Academy the safety and well-being of our children is of upmost importance. After the recent events in Florida followed by the continuous school threats around the U.S., we wish to reassure our families plans and procedures remain in place for emergency situations, including evacuations and lock-downs.


Each summer we review the plans with Homeland Security and the local authorities. We also complete this process during the school year to ensure the most current and safe plans are in place. Staff members are trained on these procedures and we frequently review the process with staff members to update information, address new issues, and answer questions.

Currently the awareness and emphasis on school safety remains concerning for all stakeholders. With this in mind, we recently reviewed with all staff members the safety plans and procedures, as well as how to best address children's questions. We will continue to practice both evacuation and lock-down procedures just as we do each year. Be assured, each and every day, we continually remain vigilant and proactive when our children's safety is involved and all of us at Stepping Stones Academy take this responsibility very seriously.

## HELPING OUR CHILDREN - WHAT TO SAY? WHAT TO DO?

With the recent events occurring in our schools, many of us are once again stopping and reflecting on "what ifs?" As adults we work to process the information about what occurred and many times struggle with making sense of such events.

Our children also work to understand such news; however, their abilities to vocalize thoughts and feelings are much different than ours. Some children have little to no understanding about what occurred and other children have so much information they are unsure what to do with it all.

To assist families in helping children make sense out of such events, we are including five tips suggested by school psychologists and social workers. These tips are not designed to provide all of the answers, but hopefully will serve useful when addressing children's questions.


1. Reassure children they are safe - Recognize children may become concerned something bad will happen to themselves, family, or friends. Validate their feelings and explain safety measures are in place. Reassure them adults will take care of them.
2. Make time to talk but do not dwell on the event - Let the children's questions be the guide as to how much information to provide. Avoid having adult conversations regarding the event in front of children; however, be available to answer questions to the best of your ability. Young children may not be able to express themselves verbally. Pay attention to changes in their behavior.
3. Limit exposure to media coverage - Images of a disaster or crisis can become overwhelming, especially if watched repetitively. Young children in particular may not be able to distinguish between images on television and their personal reality. Older children may choose to watch the news, so be available to discuss what they see and to help put it into perspective.
4. Review safety procedures - This includes safety procedures at both school and home. Help children identify at least one adult in the school and community to whom they should go if they feel threatened or unsafe.
5. Maintain normal family routines - Routine family activities, classes and friends help children feel more secure. Ensure children get plenty of sleep, regular meals, and exercise.
