The President's Notes

The weeks between *Shavuot* and *Rosh Hashanah* have two holidays. Both are mournful.

The fast of the 17th of the month of *Tammuz*, known as *Shivah Asar B'Tammuz*, is the start of a three-week mourning period for the destruction of Jerusalem and two Holy Temples.

The fast actually commemorates five tragic events that occurred on this date:

- 1. Moses broke the tablets when he saw the Jewish people worshipping the Golden Calf.
- 2. During the Babylonian siege of Jerusalem, the Jews were forced to cease offering the daily sacrifices due to the lack of sheep.
- 3. Apostomos burned the holy Torah.
- 4. An idol was placed in the Holy Temple.
- 5. The walls of Jerusalem were breached by the Romans in 69 CE after a lengthy siege. (Three weeks later, after the Jews put up a valiant struggle, the Romans destroyed the second Holy Temple on the 9th of Av.) The Jerusalem *Talmud* maintains that this is also the date when the Babylonians breached the walls of Jerusalem on their way to destroying the first Temple.

Tisha B'Av is regarded as the saddest day in the Jewish calendar and it is thus believed to be a day which is destined for tragedy.


The observance of the day includes five prohibitions, most notable of which is a twenty-five hour fast. The Book of Lamentations, which mourns the destruction of Jerusalem is read in the Temple and Jerusalem. As the day has become associated with remembrance of other major calamities which have befallen the Jewish people, some *kinnot* (dirges, sad poems) also recall events such as the murder of the Ten Martyrs, massacres in numerous medieval Jewish communities during the Crusades and the Holocaust.



From the Ritual Chair....

When I wrote my little essay a year ago, we were still processing the terrible news about the shooting at the AME church in Charleston. In the year since, there have been many, oh so many, mass shootings around the world. Again and yet again we are reminded of our sad human ability to do great harm to one another. Sometimes the acts of violence are so random, we're left wondering whether it's safe to leave our homes. And if the random acts of violence



Last year, I wrote about *tikkun olam*, the Jewish concept of performing *mitzvot* to repair the world, and how such acts must surely also be about repairing the human community. This is not going to be easy because so much of the violence seems to be bred by an ever-escalating cycle of hate and fear. I also asked what we, a few well-meaning people in a small congregation in South Carolina, can do to contribute to this repair. Last year I confessed that I had no ready answers. This year, I'm not so easily letting myself off the hook. This year, I'm suggesting that a path to *tikkun olam* that we all can take is embodied in the Jewish concept of *gemilut chasadim:* acts of loving kindness.

There are two main types of *gemilut chasadim* that we can do as a congregation that can make us effective agents of change, at least within our own community. The first is supporting our charitable efforts, such as contributing to our collection of food and clothing and *tzedakah* cash. Not only does this help meet some very real needs in the community, but it lets people in need know that their community cares about them. The second is interact with others with openness and respect. Too often our media groups people by labels, and too often these labels can have negative connotations that only add to the hate and fear. Let's try to remember that no single label can tell you everything about a person, and every person has a right to his or her own story.


CHARITY DRIVES

Sylvia Speaks of Jewish Culture

An Investigation of Origins and Variations

There was a Jewish population in Europe from very early times, especially in the area of the former Roman Empire. As Jewish males emigrated, some took wives from local populations. These groups were joined by traders and later by members of the diaspora. Jewish communities in France and Germany date from the 4th century, substantial Jewish communities in Spain were noted even earlier.

There are questions as to whether the Middle Ages were uniformly difficult times for Jews. Before the Church was fully organized with increasing numbers of rules, early medieval society was tolerant. Between 800 and 1100, an estimated 1.5 million Jews lived in Christian Europe. Since they were not Christians, they were not included in the feudal system of clergy, knights and serfs. This excluded them from the oppressive demands for labor and military conscription suffered by Christian commoners. In relations with Christian society, Jews were protected by kings, princes and bishops because of the services they provided in the areas of finance, administration and medicine.

As the Church became institutionally stronger, Jews suffered more discrimination and persecution in Christian Europe. This first peaked during the Crusades. Communities on the Rhine and Danube were utterly destroyed. French Jews were subject to frequent massacres. The Crusades were followed by massive expulsions including all English Jews in 1290, 100,000 from France in 1396, and thousands from Austria in 1421.

During this period, many Jews in Europe either fleeing or being expelled migrated to Poland where they prospered into another Golden Age.




New Memorial Plaques


