Red, yellow and orange are the colors of the month. There is a very cool interactive foliage map available online at smokymountains.com to show where the best places are, and at what times, to see the beautiful autumn landscape. In addition to orange leaves, it's also the time of pumpkins and a good excuse for a festival, which we love!

The Houston Pumpkin Festival will be going strong on Oct. 13-15 with fall fun, food, games, a parade, music, entertainment and pumpkin activities.

The Confluence PumpkinFest will be held Oct. 6-8 and feature arts, crafts, food vendors, pumpkin contests, an auto show, a parade, live music and more! Info at confluencepumpkinfest.com.

Amazingly, I turned 80 this month. Amazing because I don't feel old....but I was alive during World War II and the founding of the UN, not to mention before most people had TVs, and before anyone had a computer or a cell phone. So I AM old!

To celebrate this achievement – living so long – my kids, Lisa and Gordon, staged a This is Your Life production for me, while I was in California. It included live appearances by childhood friends, high school boyfriend, ex-sister-in-law and Zoom appearances by more recent loved ones (last 50 years). What a joyful celebration! I feel so blessed.

One of the people at that party asked me, "How do you account for the fact that you are such a spunky 80 year old?" I gave some off-handed answer, but it got me to thinking, and I want to answer the question more seriously here.

•Love - I chose my parents well, and not only did they have good genes, they loved each other and me and my siblings deeply. After I divorced my first husband, Roger, and got over being mad at him (which took about 5 years), I owned the fact that I had not loved him very well. I spent too much time looking for signs that he loved me. I set out to learn how to love better, to love past irritations and criticisms. I had two more marriages, with Gene and Hal, and grew in my ability to love more fully. I continue to practice loving well with friends and family and clients. In my estimation, learning to love well is the most important ingredient to being happy.

•Gratitude – I am grateful for many things every day: the sparrow out my window this minute, my health and energy. I'm grateful that my brain still works and enjoys learning, and that I have friends and family and a place to live and a beautiful garden on the Ohio River.

'Sense of humor – keeps me laughing, and keeps me having fun. I often laugh outloud several times every day, just by myself...over silly stuff, or the way a chipmunk jumps off my porch, or a joke someone tells me.

•Staying Healthy – I eat well and exercise regularly. Staying healthy feels even more important since I had cancer years ago. I can't keep all the tell-tale signs of aging away, but I can do a lot. Funny, but even a week without exercise, or a few days of eating poorly and I feel older!

•Faith – As a member of the Baha'I Faith, I believe civilization will eventually advance to a place where there is no prejudice, where we all get along, where there is unity. Getting there will be hard, though. Lots of old beliefs and institutions must crumble on the way. Pain and chaos is inevitable. I figure that's where we are now. I don't watch news, because it hurts to be reminded of the suffering during this decline. I do what I can day to day to be of service to others, to make the world a better place.

It's hard to believe I'm 80. That sounds old. And I feel young. I am glad to be alive. Each day I try to see what I haven't seen before.



Back-to School Health and Safety Routines

A month into the school year and families are just adapting to the back-to-school routine - adding health and safety to your schedule is a must for children from kindergarten to college.

An annual physical is required for student athletes, but all children should receive a well-check every year to assess health, weight, growth and to stay on track with immunizations. Your doctor will tell you which shots are needed, depending on age. College students should receive the meningitis vaccine and flu shots. Schedule a vision and hearing check if it is not part of the annual exam. These are important because sometimes learning issues can be attributed to undetected vision or hearing problems. And, it's a good idea to also schedule dental check-ups and cleanings.

Check backpacks for strength and back support and be sure to talk to the doctor about the maximum weight for your child's size and health condition. If needed, you may have to alert the school about the number of books and binders your child can haul at school and travelling to and from home.

Make sure your child has the proper safety equipment for sports: helmets, eye protection, shin guards, etc. and remember fill out/update the forms from the school to inform administrators and teachers about any of your child's special medical needs. If attending a new school, don't forget to find out about the school's emergency/crisis plan. Also, make sure strangers can't walk into the school unnoticed. Check to see that the playground is safe - it should be free of peeling paint, rust and sharp edges. The ground should be soft enough to cushion falls.

Remind your children about illness prevention. COVID and other illnesses will be on the uptick in fall and winter. To avoid getting or spreading germs, tell them to wash their hands often, and to cover their mouths when coughing and sneezing. And, not to share food or drinks with friends. Consider resetting your child's sleep schedule to ensure they get at least 8 hours of sleep per night. Enough sleep each night can keep your child's health and focus during the school day.

If your family practices good nutrition habits, this will contribute to your child's success - even through to high school and college. Studies prove that a nutritious breakfast helps students do better in school. Students who eat breakfast are more alert during class and the right foods combined with enough rest will help fight off infections.

The Fishin' Hole



October is a month spent in transition for local anglers. The early part of this month is full of great Smallmouth Bass fishing and the end of the "summer bite" for Largemouth Bass. Later in the month we will see the Walleye bite begin to really heat up in our local rivers and, of course, soon all the questions will start about when is a good time to make the trip north to try for Steelhead on the Erie tributaries. On top of all this, the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission will begin a fall stocking of trout in many of our nearby waterways. In

October, Canonsburg Dam, Dutch Fork Dam, Brady's Run Lake and Raccoon Lake are amongst many others scheduled to get a fresh stocking of fish for fall anglers.

The Fish and Boat Commission is also having an event at North Park Lake on Saturday October 14th. It's called a "Fishing Meet Up at Park Til Dark Event." Fishing meet-up events are social gatherings for anyone interested in learning more about the basics of fishing. This informal event is the perfect opportunity to socialize, learn, and share fishing experiences with other anglers. Equipment and bait are provided; participants may also bring their own tackle. Anglers under age 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

The details from the Fish Commission Calendar are:

"Come try your hand at fishing during this family-friendly "Park 'til Dark" event at North Park. PFBC staff will provide

fishing rods, tackle, and bait; but you are also welcome to bring your own gear and/or bait. Fishing licenses will not be required for those who sign-in with PFBC at the Kolich Shelter. Participants can participate at any time during the 11-2pm time frame. New to fishing? No worries - PFBC staff and volunteers will be available to lend a helping hand."

The location of the event is at Kolich Shelter on Lake Shore Drive. Registration for the event is open at acparksfoundation.org.

I have heard reports that there are already some Steelhead in the tribs and at the mouths of the tribs in Erie. I have gone on and on in past articles about taking walks and getting away from the crowds when in Erie but this is not the month to do that. These early fish will come up a little bit but then drop back into the lake. They will be concentrated near the lake, as will the crowds. So you can try to avoid the crowds by going during Steeler football games, and yes Browns football games as well. I know that might seem a little bit like making a Sophie's Choice to go fishing but if a little extra room means to you, what it means to me, it is a choice well made. You watching and yelling at the television does NOT change the outcome of the football game. Well, that's what my wife tells me

I will be focusing on finding the fall Smallmouth Bass that are load-

ing up on calories to get them through the coming winter months during October. The water temperatures are cooling down now and the bass are moving into the slower moving pools to do their feeding, and their living. For the last couple of months I have had most of my luck in fast moving water where the fish can feel cooler, as the water cools they will want to burn less calories, so I slow down my presentations accordingly. If the fish are not where you have been finding them recently, try the slower, deeper water for October. Keep those lines tight and keep sending your stories to samdhall@ and pictures comcast.net.




