Board meeting started at 6:43pm and was held at the home of club vice-president Dorwin Skinner.

The Agenda was set as follows;

Advertising:

- VP Skinner called attention to a copy of the Gem Show flyer we have used in the past, compared it to a flyer with new pictures and asked for suggestions for improvement. It was decided that the ad needed a few different pictures that would show well in both color and black and white. Mike Stone will look for new pictures and create a transparent background. On the flyer, there will be a coupon for a free ticket to enter the door prize drawing.
- Kelly Johnson will be provided with a box of flyers to distribute during his shows.
- We will also advertise in the newsletters of Rock and Mineral groups and the SFMS publication.
- VP Skinner produced information from several regional publications detailing how much our ads would cost and how many households they would reach. These will be investigated further and decisions will made at the next BOD meeting.

- Various suggestions;
- We should have signs posted by the road for a week before the show.
- Have a banner made and display it on the side of Mike Stone's trailer, parked on Hwy 19 for the week before the show.
- Hire "Sign Spinner people".

Election:

 The Board agreed on establishing a nominating committee, and discussed several members to ask to be a part of the committee. Several Board members also had members in mind for new officers and board members. Specifics will be ironed out at the next meeting.

Ideas for Programs:

 Dave Letasi will present two programs during the Gem Show. One presentation on Saturday and a different one on Sunday. The Board will ask members to suggest other programs for the Gem Show and also for the monthly meetings.

Silver smithing class:



Geocaching for Rock Hounds

Several years ago, Peg and I put on a geocaching presentation as a program for our rock club meeting. One of our members asked what geocaching had to do with the rock club, and we answered,



"Often times while looking for geocaches we come across interesting rocks, minerals, and fossils".

Recently we found an EarthCache in Hardinsburg, Kentucky.

An EarthCache is a special geological location people can visit to learn about a unique feature of the Earth. EarthCache pages include a set of educational notes along with coordinates. Visitors to EarthCaches can see how our planet has been shaped by geological processes, how we manage its resources, and how scientists gather evidence. Typically, to log an EarthCache, you will have to provide answers to questions by observing the geological location. For more information about EarthCaches visit http://www.earthcache.org/."

While at the location of the EarthCache, we couldn't help ourselves and checked out some of the rocks in the road cut as well as the debris that had fall-

en off the steep sandstone and limestone wall. It didn't take us long to find bi-valve and very tiny crinoid fossils. None were better than what we had in our collection, but it was nice to be able to combine two hobbies.

Over the years while geocaching, we have found, pyrite, quartz crystals, a partial chert spear point, an arrowhead, canal coal, trilobites, petrified wood, brachiopods, Potomac marble, and many more rocks, minerals, and fossils for our collection. We also met Dorwin Skinner for the first time on a limestone road in the Weekie Wachee Wildlife Preserve. We were all looking for geocaches.

Monthly Meeting Kitchen Duties

Micrometeorites

Dave Letasi's article about meteorites in the July Rock Talk was very interesting. It was also coincidental, because I had recently been trying to find micrometeorites (MM) in our swimming pool, using a very strong magnet. I found a few tiny pieces of slightly magnetic rock, but nothing that resembled melted or partially melted MM when I looked at them under the microscope. They looked very much like the tiny rocks used on asphalt roof shingles, and could have simply blown off the house. They looked nothing like the photo below.

The Earth is constantly being bombarded with extraterrestrial material. Some are large chunks that can do substantial damage when they impact the surface, but the vast majority are very small, dust to grain size MMs ($50\mu m$ to 2mm). In other words some are as small in diameter as the thickness of a sheet of paper.

It is estimated that approximately 2,000 tons of this cosmic dust reaches the surface of the Earth each year. That sounds like a large amount, but on the average only one MM per year falls on every square yard of the Earth's surface. Scientists believe that these MMs come from the Solar System and are products of asteroids, comets, and fragments from our Moon and Mars. Nowadays scientists collect most MMs from polar snow and ice.

You can find MMs by using a strong magnet. Attach a string to the magnet and place it inside a strong plastic food storage bag. Drag the bag and magnet over the ground to collect magnetic particles. Dry ground is best because it will more easily release the particles to the magnet. Once the bag has several bits and pieces of magnetic material stuck to it, place another bag over the bag with the magnet and the collected particles. Remove the magnet from the inner bag and the particles will fall into the outer bag. At that point you can label the collection location.

The gutters on a building can also be used to collect micrometeorites. Magnets enclosed in a baggie can be placed in gutters or downspouts and left for a long period of time attract MMs.

When processing the collected particles, use sieves of various mesh sizes from 1.5 mm to .4 mm to help sort and remove obvious material (manmade and organic)

that couldn't possibly be a MM.

Next use a strong magnifying glass, loop, or microscope to explore your finds. A toothpick can be used to sort through the pieces. Separate the spherical objects from the other shaped particles. Because the MMs are so small, they become a liquid when they enter the atmosphere at 30,000 miles per hour, and as their entry speed is reduced, they solidify and normally form tiny beads.

A couple advantages of collecting micrometeorites compared to the usual specimens is that MMs don't take up much space in your display cabinet and also burglars can't see them so they won't steal them. I think it would be great to have a little bit extraterrestrial material that we found in our collection.

Tuesday Morning Workshop



When Katie showed it to me we both misread it and thought it said Hematite. I didn't catch my mistake until I looked at the photos. It is in the quartz family and is mined in China. It is identical to Pietersite mined in Namibia. Judith donated a 32-inch flat screen TV to the club. What a difference it made when she used it to show a short video demonstrating techniques. You could actually hear and see it without straining. I think that it will work well at our meetings for showing our videos.

The class activity was making mounts for their cabochons they had brought with them. Just in case someone needed one Judith had extras. New Raptorial Dinosaur

Recently a new raptorial dinosaur has been discovered, based on two 71 million year old skull fragments. These remains were named after their origin of location and famed paleontologist Dr. Philip J. Currie. Albertovenator curriei ("Currie's Alberta Hunter") was discovered from specimens at the Royal Tyrrell Museum in Alberta Canada. This new dinosaur is believed to be related to Troodon inequalis a meateating dinosaur with a sickle-like claw on its feet, used for killing prey. These feathered dinosaurs had binocular vision and one of the largest brain-to-bodymass recorded in dinosaur fossil skulls. Although a rather small animal, about turkey to emu size, they are considered apex predators.

During the 1980's, I was fortunate enough to collect in South Dakota, the remains of the foot bones of a Troodontid dinosaur in the Hell Creek Formation. They are believed to be from a dinosaur similar to Pectinodon bakkeri. In 1996 a friend gave to me several apatite crystals encased in rock and bone. After nearly a decade of studying and prepping them, I was able to determine that I had five fragmentary hand elements of a large raptor. These hand bones are similar to Deinonychus a large raptor made famous by the movie Jurassic Park. The specimens are found in association, northeast of Moab, Utah. They are from an animal earlier in geological age and also somewhat larger. The restored hand was completed in 2016.

Last year Dr. Currie had a museum named after him called the Phillip J. Currie Dinosaur Museum. It was named in honor of his work on Tyrannosaur and Ceratopsian dinosaurs from both Canada and Asia. I had the honor of working on various projects with Dr. Currie, including the designing of the sauropod dinosaurs at MOSI in Tampa, and in 2000 the CT scanning of dinosaur eggs under an In-Kind Donation from the University South Florida Hospital. One of the eggs we were studying was found in a nest with the famous Baby Louie Embryo, therefore we believed our egg might also have had embryonic skeletal remains within its shell. The 18 inch long dinosaur egg and embry-

onic skeleton was recently named Beibeilong sinesis and came from a giant oviraptor dinosaur nest discovered in central China. It was featured in a 1990's National Geographic Magazine article. I was very fortunate to have been involved in these raptor discoveries and to work with Dr. Currie.

Find the Balance Point

With odd-shaped pendants or earrings it is often difficult to find the right place to attach a bail or loop so that the piece is balanced and hangs straight. A quick way to make a tool for this is to modify a set of tweezers. Any set of tweezers will work. Spread the tips, sharpen them with a file, and bend the tips at a right angle to point towards each other. To use the tool suspend the pendant or earring between two sharp points to see how it will hang.


Drill Bit Breakage

Using a small drill bit is difficult for a beginner, especially if it is hand held in a flexshaft or Dremel. They are easily broken if you push too hard or if you tilt the drill while it is in the hole. Most problems, however, are the result of buying cheap drills that suffer from poor quality steel or inaccurately ground cutting edges. A good drill from jewelry supply companies is well worth the price.

Remember that drilling always goes easier with lubrication. A little wax or oil is all you need. Almost anything will work - Three and One, beeswax, mineral oil, injection wax, car oil, olive oil, or one of the commercial cutting waxes. The lubricant helps to move chips out of the hole and reduces friction of the drill bit against the side of the hole, keeping the bit cooler.

Weeki Wachee Senior Citizens' Center


