The Hiding Assessment... finding your "Just Right Number"

- I. Use the student assessment chart to track and record answers during the assessment.
- 2. Begin with a number you believe the child has "mastered," say 5.
- 3. Have the child count out that many counters or cubes into your open hand.
- 4. Close your hand around the counters and have the child confirm the numbers counters in your hand.
- 5. Then, remove some and show them in the palm of your other hand or on the table surface.
 - Ask the child, "How many are hidden?" or "How many are hiding?"
 - Repeat with different amounts removed.
- 6. If the child responds quickly and correctly and is clearly not counting in any way, call it a "mastered number."

 If a number is mastered, repeat the entire process with the next
- higher number.

 7. Continue until the child begins to stumble.
 - Evidence of stumbling might be using fingers, nodding with head, and or long pause.
- 8. If a student stumbles on one or more of the combinations of a number, use that number as their "Just Right Number."
- 9. Keep a record of the numbers a child has mastered.
- 10. Conference with the child to discuss their "Just Right Number."
- II. The student begins working on their "Just Right Number" using the game-based activities to develop conceptual understanding and fluency.
