James 1:2-4 NRSV

This column comes in the time of Lent and Easter. You cannot have Easter without Lent. It is



essential that we, the faithful, see what that last period of Jesus' life was like. We need to visualize his raising of Lazarus, but also see how he dealt with Martha and Mary. We need to walk into the Garden of Gethsemane with him, as he agonized over what would come. We need to see him endure.

For that is what Jesus did; he endured. He understood that his home synagogue would reject him, because they could not get past their image of him. He endured their rejection. He heard the words from His Father: "This Is My Son, my Chosen; Listen to him!", but knew those gathered who heard the same words didn't understand. He endured their

ignorance. He healed ten lepers; only one stayed to praise God.

He endured their lack of gratitude. He went to the cross, and the only disciples who followed him there were Peter and the disciple whom he loved. He endured the absence of the others and Peter's betrayal. He endured a hideous, excruciating death. He did all of this so that we might live.

We do not have the same set of circumstances that Jesus did. But, we still have circumstances that we need to face. Perhaps, we have experienced the betrayal of someone we love. Perhaps we are suffering from a painful illness. Perhaps we struggle with depression, or other forms of mental illness. Perhaps we are grieving. These are all things we must endure. They are events or circumstances that we meet head on. We do not run from them, or try to find someone on whom to place the blame. We look them squarely in the face, and get through them. How? With the strength that Jesus showed when he faced his own obstacles. All we need to do is ask for it. When Jesus became human, he took on all of our humanity. Therefore, he knows what it is like to struggle, to feel discouraged or depleted. He understands hitting a brick wall, and not being sure where to turn. He knows what it is like to be alone. And, he says,"I'm right there with you. I endured for your sake. I came to defeat death and bring you new life. I will never leave you or forsake you."

This is Lent....and Easter. We cannot fully grasp the joy of Easter without understanding the travails of Lent. Let us walk with him, and see his endurance. Then, let us celebrate his victory, and know that all of it was done for us.

Church News & Updates:

Red Cross Blood Drive

February Blood Drive Results: We had a successful blood drive in February. We collected 33 units. These units will go on to help as many as 105 patients in need of a blood transfusion. Our thanks to the volunteers and donors who donate time or blood.

Our next drive is Monday, April 11, 2022, from 2:00 - 4:00 PM. It will be in the Fellowship Hall of the church. You can sign up in advance by contacting the Red Cross online. Please note that while we encourage appointments (makes for less waiting for you ... and appointments have priority), walk-ins ARE welcome. Also, please come into the church with your mask already on. Thanks. Hope to see you there!

New Roof (Update)

Although the present roof is in no immediate need of repair, it **is** 35-40 years old. The trustees have submitted the grant application to help with the roof repair. And now the wait begins. Moving ahead with roof replacement next year would be contingent on obtaining a grant. We will continue keep all informed of the results of this grant.

We are hosting two BBQs from Gale-Wyn Catering this year. The first one is Sunday, April 24th. The second will be Saturday, July 23, 2022.

Worship Services

We continue to not require the wearing of masks. Depending on each person's comfort level, we even dispense hugs to our fellow congregation members - or accept them! There is no more special pew markings and members and visitors are welcome to sit where they wish. There are masks available should you choose to wear one (and have forgotten yours). We understand the hesitancy and safety concerns of some folk. Therefore, for those who cannot attend, or who are still not yet comfortable attending public services, we are continuing to tape and post Sunday's service that Sunday afternoon on our Facebook page. However, the tapes are audio only (similar to a podcast) and we are recording only the scripture readings and Pastor Sue's sermon. 


