AT FEATHER LAKE

Feather Lake's current dry spell continues. In recent years during the irrigation season, the basin has received brief, intermittent pulses of water that El Paso County Water Improvement District #1 discharged into the Mesa Drain and the Mesa Drain Interceptor, the drain along which Feather Lake is located.

This year, with only a short, limited irrigation season anticipated, we can expect few, if any, of those intermittent pulses. Keep your fingers crossed for a decent rainy season.

Our next workday at Feather Lake will be **Sat.**, **April 13**, starting at **8 a.m.** We'll be getting ready for two Eagle Scout service projects planned for this spring.



Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux in El Paso, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave.



Water deliveries to Rio Bosque from the adjacent Roberto Bustamante Wastewater Treatment Plant ended Feb 10.



They will resume May 1 and revitalize the now-dry wetland cells. Last year, the first Painted Bunting arrived at the park May 8, too late for Birdathon but promising for the May birding tour.



Let's "Fly" into Action! Audubon's Birdathon 2019!

Birdathon counters are already "in training" in preparation for Birdathon 2019. It all takes place May 4 & 5.

What is Birdathon, you might ask?

One thing is for sure, it's not your average bird count or fund raiser! Birdathon is unusual and different: a wild weekend of birding and our organization's most important source of income for conservation and education programs.

We hope you can join us for a full, rewarding weekend of birding by being a **sponsor** and <u>pos-</u> <u>sibly even a counter</u>.

Birdathon 2019 will benefit the following programs and projects:

CHAPTER OPERATIONS

Your support allows our chapter to work alongside other organizations to support conservation & education.

RIO BOSQUE WETLANDS PARK

Each year, this site along the Rio Grande becomes more valuable as habitat for birds and other wildlife.

AUDUBON TEXAS

Our support helps keep National Audubon's state office an effective voice for birds, other wildlife and their habitats in Texas.

EL PASO-AREA WILDLIFE REHABILITATORS

Our support will help three deserving wildlife-rehabilitation programs in the El Paso area, **The El Paso Zoo Raptor Rehabilitation Program**, **Second Chance Wildlife Rescue** and **Stick House Sanctuary**, care for injured or orphaned birds for release, where possible, back into the wild.

How Birdathon Works

On the weekend of **May 4 & 5**, our dedicated Birdathon counters will be busy scouring the countryside, trying to find as many bird species as possible, in a single 24-hour blitz. These hardy, energized and intrepid individuals will start early, stay out late, visit varied wildlife habitats and give their eyes, ears and bird knowledge a full workout. Why do they push themselves so hard? For the pleasure of a day in the field, for a test of their birding skills and **most importantly, for a better West Texas environment**.

Each counter will be backed by sponsors who pledge either a given amount for each species seen or a fixed total amount. Most counters will identify 50 to 100 species. A pledge of, say \$0.50 per species for 60 species would result in a contribution of \$30. Over 95% of Birdathon income goes to the programs and projects; less than 5% to fundraising (printing, paper and postage).

Education: The Best Gift for Christmas

Biologists, children, games, music, hot chocolate and enthusiasm are the perfect combination to promote environmental awareness. By Flor Hernandez

Increasing awareness of environmental issues in the general public requires education. Towards this end, the Rio Santa Eulalia Biological Station-CORBIDI organized its IV Christmas Educational Workshop in December 2018, which was held in the San Pedro de Casta native community located in Lima, Peru. A group of undergraduate students led several outreach

activities where around 100 school-aged students participated, learning the roles biologists play in the conservation of the world's biodiversity.

To break the ice, the workshop started with a dance competition where the participants gave their most complicated

ticipants started the "Biologist for a Day" activity where the children created groups that repre-

sented different types of biologists (e.g. entomologist, herpetologist, ornithologist, mammologist, botanist and biotechnologist). In addition, the groups competed in several games while learning about different plants and animals, as well as the techniques used by biologists to study them. Then, each child received a small toy to re-

member their experiences, and shared panetone, hot chocolate, and candy with the attending audience.

El Paso/Trans-Pecos Audubon's financial support was essential to develop this last activity as well as for the transportation of the volunteers from Lima city to the native community. At the end, the children were impressed with biodiversity capture techniques and how fun and important is the work of a biologist. Ultimately, the members of the biological station hope to continue

increasing the commitment of the general public to avian conservation through more educational activities during this year 2019.
