

"Col." Craft's Suffrage Work.

"Col." Ida Craft, 294 Stuyvesant avenue, suffrage leader of the Fifth Assembly District, is putting in some strenuous work for her party. In September she returned from her trip to Boston taken with the Misses Elizabeth Freeman, Elsie Mackenzie and Vera Wentworth, and since then has been giving a series of lectures. Not a day or night did the little "Colonel" miss making an address when on the road and since her return many requests have come from far and near for "a speech."

On last Friday night she spoke at Havemeyer and South Fifth streets, under the auspices of the Fourth Assembly District, Mrs. Rose A. Brunner, leader. The subject was "A Trip Around the World," illustrated with flags showing countries where they have some form of suffrage and general conditions existing in each place. On Thursday evening, the Fourteenth Assembly District, Miss Mary Rafter, leader, will have her on the program. On October 25 she will be in Richmond Borough. Last Thursday at the noon hour she was at William and Wall streets, New York, telling the brokers on the curb "why women should vote." She also attended the National Suffrage Summer School in

Manhattan that was conducted by Mrs. Carrie C. Catt. One hundred and fifty pupils were in attendance with representatives from nineteen States.

On October 14 "Col." Craft will go as a delegate from the Fifth Assembly District of the Woman's Suffrage Party to Binghamton, N. Y., to attend the convention that will be held there during the days of 14th, 15th, 16th and 17th. Upon her return to Brooklyn she will have a thorough canvass made of the districts to find out how voters stand for amendment.

Other prominent workers include the Misses Mildred Bennett, Mary Merwin, Lillian Bridge Hassard and Mrs. Maud Lesser. Miss Elizabeth Freeman is doing Auburn, N. Y., and "General" Rosalie Jones is as busy as she can be on the Long Island part of it. Next month, Saturday nights will be spent in making an address on suffrage in various parts of the Fifth Assembly District.
