Autumn Changes



Autumn Leaves and Pumpkins, Please!




Dear Classroom A Families,

It is unbelievable how fast the time is flying by! We have been in school for two months together and it has been wonderful to see everyone getting to know each other more, forming positive relationships and friendships within our classroom. We have continued building on the lessons about **Grace and Courtesy** and our classroom discussed what we want our classroom to look like, sound like, how we want to feel, and how we would like others to feel in the classroom. Children were excited to demonstrate lessons like, "How to push in a chair", "How to offer someone help" and "How to clean up a work" during group circle time! It was so great to see the children encouraging one another, giving a round of applause after each demonstration.







Our classroom read, *Don't Touch My Hair* by Sharee Miller, *The Caring Me I Want to Be!* by Mary DiPalermo, and *In My Heart: A Book of Feelings* by Jo Witek. We discussed personal space, how you can show you care, and how our hearts can feel. After reading these books, our classroom worked together to create a poster to display in the classroom to help remind ourselves and each other of what classroom A can do to make our classroom a place to do our best learning!





This month in **Science**, our classroom has been busy learning all about trees, leaves and pumpkins! Children enjoyed reading *A Trees for Every Season* by Robin Bernard and learned about the different kinds of trees. We also learned about the resources trees give us, like maple syrup and shade to play in! We learned the parts of a tree and children enjoyed working on the parts of a tree science puzzle.





After learning all about the parts of a tree, our classroom took a closer look at leaves! We learned about why they are such an important part of the tree, and why the leaves change and then fall in autumn.

Finally, as we approached the end of the month and Halloween, our classroom took a look inside a pumpkin and learned all about the different parts! Children helped to clean out the inside of the pumpkin by scooping out and collecting the fibrous strands and seeds...there were so many! After learning about the parts of the pumpkin, our classroom carved it into a Jack-o-Lantern and sang a song while watching the candle burning bright!







In **Geography**, our classroom has been learning about land and water using the sandpaper globe! We learned that the rough brown sandpaper on the globe shows the land and the smooth blue surface on the globe is the water. Children were excited to practice creating different land and water forms by pouring water into models like isthmus and strait.





We have also been learning about how land, air, and water makes up our planet Earth! Children have enjoyed learning about land, air, and water through reading books and sorting pictures. We have also learned about land, air, and water transportation. Children have been working on sorting different modes of transportation like, sail boat, steam engine, helicopter, that go in the air, land or the water!





During **Kindergarten Afternoon** class, Kindergarteners have been working on building sentences with the movable alphabet and handwriting in Language, color mixing, learning primary and secondary colors in Sensorial, counting using a number line in Math, and reading the book *Where do I Live?* by Neil Chesanow, learning about all the ways to describe where we live in Geography. The Kindergarteners have also enjoyed going on a fall scavenger hunt outside our school. There was so much to discover! We read *My Mom Hugs Trees* by Robyn Ringgold and created bark rubbings when we were learning all about trees. It was interesting to see the different textures created! Approaching Halloween, the Kindergarteners enjoyed reading books and learning about bats and spiders. We learned that bats are mammals and are nocturnal! Kindergarteners read a fiction and nonfiction text about spiders and they learned how to distinguish between the two kinds of books.













We look forward to learning about the harvest next month and all the upcoming celebrations including Diwali, Thanksgiving, and a couple of birthday walks!

Just as a reminder, as the weather continues to get colder, please dress your child appropriately for school with coats, hats, gloves/mittens, and snow pants if necessary. If it is not raining or too cold out, we will try and get outside as much as we can during play time!

Classroom B Newsletter October 2021

Hello Classroom B Families!

It's hard to believe it's the end of October. We've had some really beautiful days on the playground! The mornings are slightly chillier, and the leaves are changing color and falling fast!

Grace and Courtesy

Ms. Angela and I continue to remind the children of the rules of our classroom and how we take out our work, use it respectfully, clean it up and place it back on the shelf. Children at this age need constant reminders to help them with so many things! The older children are a big help in reminding the younger friends of the rules of our classroom!

Practical Life

Since this month is all about pumpkins, we have added pumpkin pounding and pumpkin washing to this area of our classroom. The children love to pound the golf tees into the pumpkin and make different designs. In addition, they enjoy our new gourd scrubbing work! This work has many steps and takes a lot of concentration. It's amazing to observe a child complete this work from beginning to end with such satisfaction!











Science

In Science, we learned about the parts of the tree. The roots of the tree are important because they bring water to the tree and hold the tree in its place. Leaves are also an important part of the tree. They consist of the stem, rib and veins. Leaves provide food and air to the tree to keep it healthy. Speaking of leaves, we learned about the life cycle of maple and oak trees. The children enjoyed collecting all the acorns and leaves that have fallen on the playground. We have even put some in our art area to create nature masterpieces!! We also used some of the beautiful leaves to do crayon rubbing! We learned that the types of trees that lose their leaves are called deciduous trees, like the maple and oak tree. Deciduous trees lose their leaves in the fall and bloom again in the spring.

We learned about the parts of the pumpkin and the lifecycle of the pumpkin. We even had a chance to carve a pumpkin and pull out the seeds!

In addition, we focused a little bit on bats and spiders! Some facts the children learned were that bats are mammals, and not birds. Not all bats eat insects. Fruit bats eat fruit. Bats are not blind as they see black and white in the dark. Bats use echolocation to help them find food in the dark.

Spiders are arachnids and do not have a backbone, but they do have an exoskeleton which is a hard shell on the outside of their bodies that can't grow with the spider. This is why spiders molt - to shed their exoskeleton. The Kindergarten children had the opportunity to watch a video of a tarantula molting! The children loved it! (I was a little creeped out by it!) The children also learned that some spiders have 8 eyes but very few arachnids have good eye sight.

Geography

This month we studied North America. North America is the orange continent on the Montessori globe. We are learning that the continent of North America includes many countries and regions. Of course, the larger countries are Canada, the United States and Greenland. However, there is also Mexico, the Caribbean countries and Central America. We are focusing on the US and have learned to identify the flag of our country and animals that are native to the US, including the bald eagle, raccoon, buffalo, moose and beaver. We will continue to learn about North America and the United States as we move into November.

Peace Curriculum

As you know, we have a peace corner in our classroom where our friends go to enjoy being peaceful. We also have a table where one child at a time can practice silence. There is a sand timer which the child can turn over and then practice sitting quietly for 1 minute. You'd be amazed how sitting for even 1 minute can feel like forever! We also practice this at our group time. Maria Montessori referred to this as the silence game. We all sit with our eyes closed and listen to our own thoughts in our minds and the sounds around us. It amazes me that each child is able to sit silently for so long!

To tie the peace curriculum together, every Friday we practice our candle peace walk. This practice is a way for us to end our week together and wish each other a peaceful weekend. We use our battery candle with our special lotus flower candle holder. I play our special candle walk music, we turn out the lights and sit quietly. We sing "Make new Friends, but keep the old" song. I begin by holding the candle and walking slowly around the rug. I gently place the candle in front of a child. Then he/she gently picks up the candle and places it in front of another child. We do this until we have all had a chance to walk around the rug with the candle. We conclude our candle walk by saying together, "May there be peace before you, behind you, above you, below you, from your heart to your lips, to everyone".

We have had a fantastic October and are looking forward to all of the fun things to come in November!
