Message from CFJM President

Last year was a busy year for the neighborhood and our HOA. I want to thank all of our board members and volunteers for their efforts. I also want to thank our residents for the fantastic turnout at October's annual meeting. We had more of you attending than any time in recent memory. It is encouraging to see that so many of you are taking an interest in your community and providing feedback and suggestions on how we can all continue to make it a better place to live. Completing the entrance sign project is one of our higher priorities this year. Jonathan Grefaldon, who presented designs at the annual meeting, will be sharing some revision ideas with you for your feedback and comments before we move to the next phase of the project. A special line has been added to the 2015 Dues form for contributions to this project. Community support is very much needed to finalize this project.

We put in requests with the City of Dallas last year for traffic studies at our Chimney Hill intersections to see if traffic lights or something more effective than stop signs could be installed. They advised it would take around 9 months for the studies to take place due to backlogs, but hopefully once completed we will have some options available to address the speeding and other safety issues on that road.

Last summer we switched to off-duty Dallas Police officer patrols and we've seen positive results from that program. Especially helpful has been officer interaction with strangers and non-residents in our alleys and other areas. Officers identify and escort them out of the neighborhood if they have no valid reason for being there. Your continued feedback on how this program is working is important, so please continue to share your own experiences.

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Patriot Paws



Patriot PAWS http://patriotpaws.org trains and provides service dogs at no cost for the benefit of disabled American Veterans in order to help restore their physical and emotional independence, and to provide a service for other American's with mobile disabilities. Patriot PAWS Service Dogs organization was officially designated as a 501 (c) (3) organization in February 2006 and is a certified member of Assistance Dogs International (ADI).

The founder of Patriot PAWS, Lori Stevens, is a Certified Pet Dog Trainer (CPDT), Karen Pryor Academy (KPA) graduate with over 20-years experience.

Patriot PAWS trains service dogs to perform various everyday behaviors that everyone does naturally. The following is partial list of some of the 35 services the dogs are taught to assist disabled veterans. To accomplish most of these daily tasks without a trained service dog would otherwise be difficult or impossible:

- Get help in emergencies
- Recognize and avert PTSD episodes
- Pick up and retrieve items
- Open and close doors
- Pull wheelchairs
- Provide bracing to stand, walk, and sit down
- Help with chores, such as laundry
- Take off shoes and socks

Patriot PAWS uses positive reinforcement training. Positive reinforcement is giving the dog a reward in the form of praise, play or food when it responds and offers an action or behavior that you like.

Patriot Paws Service Dogs is always looking for volunteers: general clerical, puppy raisers, assistant trainers and other opportunities are available. We have a volunteer application online at http://www.patriotpaws.org A background check and attending our volunteer orientation are required.
