Newsletter Distribution Changes for 2018

The Executive Committee agreed to a change in the way we distribute the monthly club newsletter. The

objective is to significantly reduce the number of newsletters sent to members by US mail. There are currently only about 10 members that do not have email. We are going to send paper newsletters by US mail to only those members who do not have email. Paper copies will be available at the meeting registration table so attending members can pick up a copy. Copies of the last several month's newsletters are available to read on our club website.

From Your Editor, Paul Shaffer



IMPORTANT: If you have not already done so, please go back and read the article starting at the bottom of page 2 about the change of newsletter distribution beginning in January of 2018.

My rant this month is about the tax reform act that just passed in the US Senate. As I write this, the House and Senate Bills are going to a reconciliation committee and will require yet another vote. By the time you read this, it will likely have already been passed. In general terms, I support the changes as they have been reported by those who support tax law changes. The biggest plus being the claim that "middle class" tax payers will see their federal taxes reduced, putting more money in their pockets!

However, there are a couple of things (well probably more than a couple, but I will stick to a couple) that really bother me about this proposed tax change. One is that all on the left (and even a few on the right) are saying that the tax bills as passed will INCREASE taxes on the middle class! They use examples, have tax payers on the air giving examples and also say over and over that only the rich will see relief. I suggest and most people agree, it has to be one way or the other, but it CANNOT be both a tax decrease for middle class earners and at the same time an increase for those same middle class earners.

I am perplexed that there is not an easy to understand, computer generated website that would show comparisons at low to high middle class earnings for the current and new tax schedules; One that would allow a person or family to plug in their income and current deductions and compare what they would pay under current tax law vs. the proposed changes.

I am somewhat suspicious of the outcome because of the proponents have changed the talking points rhetoric from "lower taxes" to "lower tax rates" for middle tax earners. If the final tax bill changes create increases in federal taxes for more than a few outliers, I will be extremely disappointed. Further, if that happens, we Republicans can kiss goodbye to control of the US House and Senate. Trump will be a one term President and we will see a far left Democrat like Warren or Sanders in the Oval office come 2021!

On another point, I get so mad that I could chew iron and spit nails when I hear the messaging form GOP talking heads about corporate income tax reductions. The Dems use it to make the claim that the reduction is to make the rich (read large corps) richer at the expense of the "little guy or middle class." While not true, it really resonates with their base and anyone else that thinks Corporations are rich greedy fat cats at the expense of the poor or middle class working stiff. However, the GOP speakers try to convince us that the Corps will use the reduction in taxes, additional profit, to grow their business and increase employment causing our economy to grow.

While that may happen to some degree, most people do not want a lesson in economics and do not understand or believe the message anyway. What we should be saying, in my view, is:

- Corporations do not pay taxes, people pay taxes
- Every tax on a corporation, including income tax, is calculated into the cost of doing business and therefore drives UP the price of the corporation's product
- All taxes paid by corporations are recovered by that price to the end consumer
- Reductions in cost of a corporation doing business is eventually reflected in lower prices
- All consumers will benefit by lower prices

People need to understand that any way our Federal Government can find to reduce the cost of Corporations doing business will result in reduced prices to the consumers.

With that rant about Econ 101, I will close with a wish to see you at the December 18 meeting and don't forget to bring a prospective member. If I don't see you or speak to you at the meeting, allow me to wish you a very MERRY CHRISTMAS!

House Speaker Extols GOP Record in Raleigh

As Republican legislative leaders gear up to retain control of the N.C. General Assembly in next year's election, they likely will tout efforts to cut taxes, reduce regulations and curb spending over the last five years.

House Speaker Tim Moore gave a de facto preview of what the GOP's strategy could be during an address to the Moore County Republican Men's Club at its monthly luncheon last week at CCNC. He noted that the state has its lowest unemployment rate in 17 years — 4.1 percent — and that its business climate now ranks among the best in the nation.

"The biggest thing is we've changed the tax structure and the regulatory environment so that businesses want to locate here, and businesses that are already here want to grow and prosper," he said. "In 2011, when Republicans took over majority, the unemployment rate was over 10 percent. We cut the personal income tax, business tax and fees. We've made all these changes to the tax code. We have the lowest taxes we've had in North Carolina in decades ... Is the state running out of money? No. We're actually having a surplus. What we have proven is that by cutting taxes and cutting regulations — President Reagan showed us this in the '80s — to actually increase economic prosperity, you actually increase the amount of revenue that you see produced."

Moore's office sent out a news release Friday saying the state added 91,964 new jobs during the last 12month period from last October, according to figures from N.C. Department of Commerce.

He touted the most recent budget enacted by the Republican-controlled House and Senate this year as being fiscally responsible, and chastised Democratic Gov. Roy Cooper for vetoing it, which the General Assembly overrode.

Cooper and Democratic legislative leaders decried the budget, which they contend did not do enough to adequately fund state government — particularly public schools — and that teacher pay raises were nowhere near as generous as Republican lawmakers extolled.

Moore defended budgets passed by the GOP-controlled General Assembly and the decision to increase the state's rainy day fund, which he said proved the right course in the wake of Hurricane Matthew in October 2016.

"We didn't necessarily want to spend it all," he said of the surpluses. "That is what took so long (this year). Do we want to put it in the rainy day fund or cut taxes? What we did in the end was a compromise — put some in the rainy day fund and cut taxes.

"We were criticized by Gov. Cooper for putting money in the rainy day fund. But after a major hurricane hit and we needed the money, he suddenly quit talking about that. Had we budgeted like Democrats, we'd probably have to come into a special session and figure out what taxes we are going to have to raise to pay for hurricane relief. Even after paying for it, we still have \$1.8 billion in the rainy day fund. You don't want to spend every dime you have. We also got rid of some of the debt we have."

Moore said that when Republicans took control of the General Assembly in 2011, the state had a "structural deficit" to the federal government totaling \$4 billion, mainly for unemployment insurance and some stimulus money.

"Not only have we paid that off, we also have a surplus in those funds," he said.

He said that enabled the state to reduce the unemployment insurance taxes.

"Businesses are paying less in taxes," Moore said. "It has allowed a more vibrant and robust economy, lower unemployment and as a result, greater job prosperity."

Among the accolades Moore touted was that the state has the fourth highest wage growth in the nation since 2016, that several publications rank the state first in the nation for starting a business, for business prosperity and technology job growth. He added that the state has improved from 44th in 2011 to 11th tax climate.

He said the state is continuing to grow and that it will pick up one and or possibly two more seats in Congress after the next census in 2020 as result of population growth.

"So we must be doing something right," he said.

Moore said the state has also drastically changed the way highway construction funding is awarded to take politics out of the process.

"Road funding used to be based on who is in political power," he said. "While it would have been an easy temptation for those of us in leadership now to retain that, we didn't do that. That is not right. We need to make sure we have a road funding model in this state that actually follows what the needs are, where you have analytics — things like traffic counts, population growth, density and number of accidents — that get plugged into a formula used to decide which roads should be built. We've done that. As a result, you are seeing road construction all around the state."

Moore said one of the biggest complaints he hears now is about the amount of road construction and motorists having to negotiate around the orange barrels. He quipped that some people have said the state might need to replace the longleaf pine tree as its symbol with the orange construction barrels "because they are everywhere."

"Well, those are some tough growing pains," he said.
"That is because our state is one of the fastestgrowing states in the country. We are catching up on
all those unmet transportation needs for years and
years."

Prior to his visit to Moore County last week, Moore said he met with his predecessor as House speaker, Sen. Thom Tills, who expressed hope the Congress would be able to enact its own tax reform before the end of the year. Moore said the federal government would be smart to follow North Carolina's example.

He concluded, "The tax reforms we did at the state and local level since 2011 have fundamentally changed our economy."

The "Unaffiliated" are clearly the second largest group of registered voters and if the trend continues will overtake the number of Republicans in the not too distant future.
