By Laws of the

Apostolic Faith Bible College

Article VII—Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians) and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

- *Triune God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit
- *Creation and Formation
- *Man is basically sinful and in need of salvation
- *Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life.
- *Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul and Body, a Second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ
- *Baptism of the Holy Spirit, evidenced by the speaking in other languages
- *Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit
- *Sacrament of the Lord's Supper
- *Washing of Feet
- *Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers
- *Do not condone divorce and remarriage
- *Destruction of the Wicked
- *Conditional Immortality
- *Rapture of the Man child Class
- *Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly
- *A ministry supported by tithes and offerings

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not inconsistent with the above basic doctrines.


During the past summer she taught in Sunday School, Children's Church and worked in church camp in the kitchen and helping with crafts.

Wherever you fit in that category, alumni or not, I hope that as you read this today you are challenged to "seek the Lord while He may be found" (Isaiah 55:6) and follow His leading. Greetings From the 4-State Camp Campground Board

Much has happened in the last 6 years at the Baxter Springs, KS campground. Six years ago the camp was burglarized and most of the buildings stripped of wiring. As a family of God, we pulled together and gave financially and physically in labor to rewire the grounds and to provide living quarters for a caretaker. We are so blessed now to have Seth and Ashlie Reed living on the campgrounds to mow and provide security. After two years of camp at another local facility, we came back to Baxter Springs. For the past three years we have been at the campgrounds and have seen God move in almighty way among our youth.

As a board we feel that now is the time to renew our vision for ministry to our youth and expand that vision. We are currently taking steps to put the Baxter Springs campgrounds on a firm footing so that we can improve what we do in our yearly youth camps and also to put the grounds into such a condition that all our area churches can begin to utilize our facilities for church retreats, youth activities and special events through the spring, summer an dearly fall months. We would like to invite you to share with us in this vision.

We are currently in the process of using the remaining funds given when the camp was vandalized to replace the girl's dorms, built in the early sixties, with anew building that will be secured and air conditioned. We have torn down the old dorms, and we have enough funding to complete the shell of the new building, install electricity and air conditioning, and perhaps frame all of the interior walls. With additional giving, we will be able to completely finish the interior and have the building fully functional by next June, but we feel it is imperative that we begin to use what we have been given.

We are in the process of obtaining liability insurance for the weeks of youth camp and insuring the facilities against loss and damage. We are also writing policies for youth camps and for use of the grounds, creating training materials for camp committees and camp workers and drafting a continuing ten year plan of improvements to the grounds. With additional giving we would like to build a new boy's dorm, upgrade the kitchen and dining hall with efficient windows and some remodeling, put new roofs on several of the buildings, build some new recreational facilities including a sand volleyball court and a new basketball court, upgrade the plumbing in the bathrooms and showers, and provide better living quarters for our camp caretakers.

We feel that God has given us a very valuable tool; for ministry. As a board we have a vision to see that tool sharpened and put to much greater use to build the Kingdom of God and we are inviting you to share our vision for seeing that ministry not only continue, but grow and expand. Please pray for the board and for what happens at the campgrounds. Thank for supporting the camp. You may communicate with us via email or mailing address.
