

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

# **CHANCE TO CHANGE**

How often do you regret a choice you made? When was the last time this happened? Do any drastically negative choice you have made, still haunts you now? If so, and you were given a once in a lifetime golden opportunity to go back in time and change that choice, wouldn't you jump at the opportunity?

I remember an insurance advert in which someone was involved in an accident. The guy had very limited coverage with an inferior company. But then he zoomed back in time to where he had signed the insurance contract and instead of that particular company; he opted for a better, more reputable insurance company. Of course, he had to pay more to get a good package. Next, he returns to real time where the new insurance company was only too glad to wipe away his financial tears.

Would that life worked that way! Would that life after death works that way also! But poor us, it doesn't. The readings of today remind us that our choices have consequences.

In the first reading (Amos 6:1-7), the Prophet Amos addressed the Israelites who had gotten comfortable and indifferent to the plight of the poor and afflicted, rather than being grateful to God and sharing their blessings with the former. He warned them of the risk of losing the Promised Land if they continued this attitude. Unfortunately, they didn't listen to him and finally they lost Jerusalem and went into exile.

In the Gospel (Lk 16:19-31), Jesus warns those present and us to beware that the fate that befell the Israelites in Amos' time does not befall us. He uses the parable of the Rich Man and Lazarus to drive home his warning.

These readings challenge us to count our blessings and to remember that whatever we do to the least of Jesus' brethren, we do unto Him (Mt 25:31-46). They remind us that when we sincerely become conscious of the plight of those around us, and worry about their physical, emotional, financial, spiritual plight, and reach out to them, out of the little we have or even in spite of our own needs, that we will not end up like the Israelites at the time of Amos or like the rich man in the gospel.

May the Lord continue to bless us, may we always count our blessings and aid the needy in our midst and those around the globe. Amen.

#### St. Bart's Parish Pastoral Plan:

I shared with us last Sunday my proposal for us to embark on a 3-5 Year Parish Pastoral Plan. I shared more details with the Pastoral Council when we met on Monday, Sept 23rd. The proposal was approved and a committee was set up to work out the details and present it at our next meeting. Again, we want this to be OUR pastoral plan; we want every voice to be heard and every idea to be considered.

# **Making All Things New:**

I suspect that many of you know something about the Archdiocesan Pastoral Plan: Making All Things New. Our Parish Committee (Richard Califano, Catherine Hickey, Bill Mascetta, and I) attended a session organized by the Archdiocese on 9/24/13. The Archdiocesan plan is not very different than our Parish Plan. Its goals include the eventual consolidation of parishes, linking parishes or making it possible for parishes to collaborate more with each other.

We will not wait for the outcome and implementation of this Archdiocesan plan, but will move ahead with our own Parish Plan, geared towards growing our parish. We can kill the two birds with one

stone. This will help us to be even better positioned when the Archdiocese begins to consider the strengths and weakness of each




#### 2014 MASS BOOK IS OPEN

# GUARDIAN ANGELS OCTOBER 2<sup>ND</sup>



Perhaps no aspect of Catholic piety is as comforting to parents as the belief that an angel protects their little ones from dangers real and imagined. Yet guardian angels are not just for children. Their role is to represent individuals before God, to watch over them always, to aid their prayer and to

present their souls to God at death.

The concept of an angel assigned to guide and nurture each human being is a development of Catholic doctrine and piety based on Scripture but not directly drawn from it.

Jesus' words in Matthew 18:10 best support the belief: "See that you do not despise one of these little ones, for I say to you that their angels in heaven always look upon the face of My heavenly Father."



Devotion to the angels began to develop with the birth of the monastic tradition. Saint Benedict gave it impetus and Saint Bernard of Clairvaux, the great twelfth-century reformer, was such an eloquent spokesman for the guardian angels that angelic devotion assumed its current form in his day.

A feast in honor of the guardian angels was first observed in the sixteenth century. In 1615, Pope Paul V added it to the Roman calendar.

**COMMENT:** The concept of an unseen companion has



given rise to many childish titters about leaving room for an angel in a crowded seat and teacher-induced terrors about the danger of sudden death for a child who fails to honor the angel with prayer. But devotion to the angel is, at base, an expression of faith in God's enduring

love and providential care extended to each person day-in and day-out until life's end.
