Radiator? Radiator?

I have heard too many stories of Model As overheating.

Potential causes: Engine, water pump, coolant, radiator.

Engine: Improper timing, unwanted material within the engine cavities, (mouse nesting from storage), bad head gasket, cracked head

Then back to the radiator:

One of the last items that we don't want to spend a lot of money on. The radiator is constructed of two tanks connected by many tubes. The tubes run thru fins that are designed to take the heat away from the tubes. The manufacturing process is to run all the tubes thru all the fins. When all the material is new the parts are fluxed to accept solder and connect all the tubes to all the fins. The heat transfer becomes less effective with age. Over the years vibration and use the soldered connections come apart. The air side of the radiator must be clear for maximum air flow. Painting the radiator insulates the fins and tubes reducing the necessary heat transfer.

The internal of the engine and the radiator can be cleaned and flushed. Vinegar is an effective cleaner outer. I have used Draino as it "eats" organic material but not the brass and non-organics. There are many methods suggested to measure the flow capacity of the radiator. I have taken radiators to radiator shops that can do this test as well. I have been testing many Model As and measured the entering water temperature and return water temps. Factors we must consider are the air temperature and how long the engine has run and if it is warmed up or not. Most tests have given me 10 to 15 degree difference. If you are unsure of your radiator condition, I would like to test yours. I am using a multiple sensor electronic thermometer and feel better about spending \$500 if the radiator is confirmed bad, and that is what is needed to fix your car.

Caution when using the use of the Nu-Rex timing wrench with modern points

Find Top Dead Center (TDC) with your timing pin.

The Nu-Rex timing tool is a great easy way to set the cam position on a Model A distributor.

(From Snyder's Antique Auto Web site) on how to use a Nu-Rex timing wrench)

- 1. Remove the distributor cap and rotor. Place NU-WRENCH on the point cam: loosen the cam hold-down screw for a slight drag on the wrench rotation and rotate the wrench clockwise. This removes distributor shaft drive train slack.
- Rotate the Timing Tool two (2) turns clockwise. STOP when the tool leading edge (▲) contacts the #4 rear most distributor pin. Hold the tool against the pin and tighten the cam screw. The points are just opening-causing spark. This concludes adjustment.
- 3. Reinstall the rotor and distributor cap.

I have found this works great on original points but on some (not all) modern points I have had problems with getting the cam position right using this tool.




We drilled a hole in the handle of this tool that is lined up with pin #4 instead of the arrow. It is about half the width of the handle.

Both Dave Peterson and I have seen this issue with modern points on our engines. No sure why! It maybe that different manufactures position the wear block at different positions on the point arm. Of course, I did no keep the points that were a problem.

I did talk to Dave Gerold and he had a similar problem. He thought it might have been the position of the cam notch. He never thought it could be the wear block.

How I found this problem. After following all the proper timing procedures, I use a test light to check to make sure points are opening at the right time. I use this test light every time I set the timing.

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Test light Procedure:

Connect the Test light - one lead to a ground and one to the points wire connection. Don't let it touch ground.

Set the spark lever to full retard or all the way up. Turn the key "ON"

If the light is already on the point are open. The cam is too far advanced. Turn the key "off" and try the tool again. If the light is still "ON" turn the key "OFF" and the start over from the very beginning of the timing procedure. If the light is still "ON" now try moving the NU- Rex wrench handle arrow past post #4. about the half width of the handle and the point should close and light should turn off.

With the key "ON" and the light is "OFF "slowly move the Spark lever down one notch at a time. The test light should come on at the 2nd or 3rd notch. The points are now open. It tested correctly. You are done.

If the light doesn't turn "ON" until the 4th or 5th the cam is in the retarded position. Turn the key "OFF" and try again with cam tool. If it is still not right start from the beginning of the timing procedure.

Turn key "OFF" Put the cap and wire back on the distributor and now the engine is ready to fire up.

Our August tour started from the Target store parking lot in Inver Grove Heights as usual. The first stop was a short 15 minute drive to scenic River Road in Inver Grove Heights. It dead ends at the private Seaplane Base owned by the Wiplinger family, owners of Wipaire, one of the world's largest manufacturers of aircraft floats. Wipaire is based right in our back yard at Fleming Field Airport in South Saint Paul. With a manicured grass runway for airplanes with wheels and a docking area with access to the Mississippi river for float planes, it is a real slice of heaven for pilots. Originally built in the early 60's for customers to land their planes on the grass runway then have "Wipline" floats installed, the seaplane base is now mostly maintained as a Wiplinger family heirloom in memory of Ben Wiplinger who started the company in the 1950's.

The next stop was a 30 mile drive south of Hastings to the Little Log House Pioneer Village developed by Steve and Sylvia Bauer. The Bauer's have saved over 45 historic buildings from demolition over the decades and moved them to this location. Every summer for one weekend in July they hold the Antique Power Show. Unfortunately, it has been canceled for this summer but is scheduled for the summer of 2021 on July 23, 24th and 25th. I encourage you to put it on your calendar and take it in for a day if you never have. If you like old mechanical things, and apparently, we all do :-), I know you'll enjoy it.

The last stop was just another 3 miles to the town of Miesville where we stopped at King's Place for dinner. We had the entire outdoor seating area to ourselves and with no fewer than 64 different hamburgers on the menu hopefully everyone found something they liked.

A few of us made an unofficial tour stop at the Dairy Queen in Hastings on the way home. It was a good way to wrap up a really fun tour.
