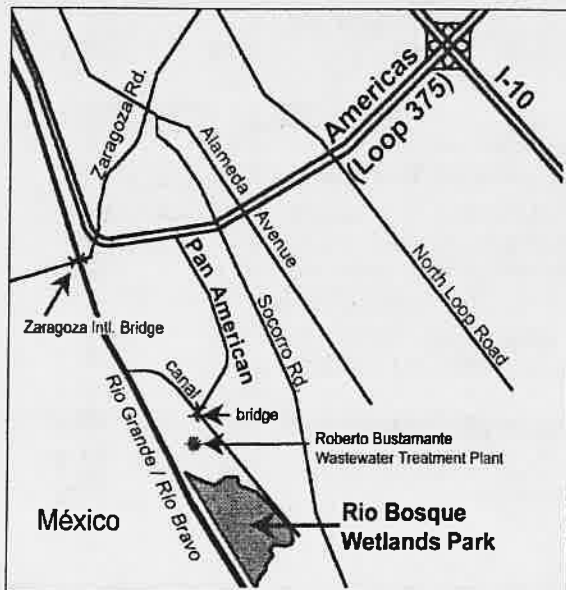

ON THE TRAIL

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS

The El Paso/Trans Pecos Audubon Chapter calls upon volunteers in the El Paso area to join with birders across the western hemisphere and participate in one of Audubon's winter time traditions, the annual Christmas Bird Count (CBC). This year's count will be the 104th.

Today, over 55,000 volunteers from all 50 states, every Canadian province, parts of Central and South America, Bermuda, the West Indies, and Pacific Islands count and record every individual bird and bird species seen in a specified area. During the 103rd CBC last year, about 73 million individual birds were counted. Last year saw a new record high of 1,981 individual counts. Each individual count group completes a census of the birds found during one 24 hour period in a designated circle 15 miles in diameter-about 177 square miles.

People are asked to contribute \$5.00 to help defray the expense of publishing "American Birds", This is the volume detailing all 1900 plus counts. The El Paso/Trans Pecos Audubon Chapter will cover \$3.00 of this for the Hueco Tanks and El Paso counts.

BOSQUE DEL APACHE NWR

One of the more popular National Wildlife Refuges in the country (there are over 500) is located about 180 miles north of El Paso off of Interstate 25. How about 20,000 Snow Geese with a number of Ross's included, see if you can tell them apart, 12,000 Sandhill Cranes, 25,000 plus ducks and MANY Bald Eagles.

Start off your 2004 bird list with some great entries. Last year 74 species were recorded on our trip, these included 15 waterfowl species, 7 Raptor and 3 grebe, also a number of passerines. The Refuge reported over a dozen Bald Eagles, and we saw 5 at one time.

KEYSTONE - SUNLAND

A look at hundreds of gulls, mostly *Ring-billed* but quite often a *Herring Gull* or *California Gull* has been around, and remember January, 2002 when a State of New Mexico first, the *Lesser Black-backed Gull* was in the area for almost 2 weeks. You probably will see *Snow Geese*, maybe *Canvasbacks*, and some wading birds, perhaps *Great Egrets*, *Longbilled Dowitchers*, *Greater Yellowlegs*.

Wyer Tramway Hawkwatch

This season's hawkwatch ended a bit early for me, because of a late Oct., early Nov. trip to visit friends and family in NJ, NY & FL; but, this didn't mean that I stopped looking for raptors though, because I was able to enjoy the wonders of the Cape May hawkwatch spectacular & the beauty of Florida's amazing osprey population.

This season's Wyler Tram hawkwatch had approximately 100 hours of observation time & yielded a bounty of over 700 raptors.

Here are the raptors seen this season:

Osprey & Ferruginous hawk
Sharp-shinned and Coopers' hawks
Kestrel & Red-tailed hawk
N. Harrier & Swainson's hawk
Prairie falcon & Peregrine Falcon
Golden Eagle



The bird checklist for the state park now rests at 101 species [the list increased by ~ 25 species in the past few months].

Almost 300 Western scrub jays were observed moving past the platform, as well as rarer to the area sightings of birds such as acorn woodpecker, hepatic tanager, & Cassin's finch.

I'd like to thank everyone that came out to help this past season, and encourage anyone with interest in this project, to contact me by January regarding helping out in this coming Spring's observation period that will begin in a few months.

Don't be bashful, if you are unsure of your skills, because training sessions will take place, in the field, at the tramway, and in the classroom [besides the best training of all, which is actually conducting observations].
