Abigail Adams's life is one of the most documented of the first ladies; she is remembered for the many letters she wrote to her husband while he stayed in Philadelphia during the Continental Congress. John frequently sought advice from Abigail on many matters, and their letters are filled with intellectual discussion on government and politics. In one of her more famous letters, she implores her husband and his colleagues, all of whom were male, to, "...remember the ladies...if particular care and attention is not paid to the ladies we are determined to foment a Rebellion, and will not hold ourselves bound by any Laws in which we have no voice, or Representation." Learn about Abigail Adams, a significant woman in this powerful presentation portrayed by Sheryl Faye. Presentation will last approximately 45 minutes, followed by a Q & A.
