Jim Gaskill is retiring from Weber State University where he has been an instructor of Forensic Science for 30 years. When Jim first came to Ogden it was called Weber State College and the program was called the Police Science Department.

At one time Weber State was

recognized as one of the five best colleges in the entire United States offering education in Police Science and Criminalistics. As terminologies and definitions evolved, so also has the Police Science Department evolved into the Criminal Justice Department, and

Criminalistics has evolved into Forensic Science. From the first Director (Lynn Lund) who began the program in the mid-60's, although he only had a B.S. degree and the school only awarded an A.S. degree; to the present Director, Morris Sterrett, who has a PhD degree and the school now offers a Master's degree; the program has taken major steps in getting even more recognition throughout the world.

Although Jim is humorously known for his hunting obsession, he is even

better known for the quality of his teaching. In 1970 when he came to Weber he instituted a program, on his own, to assist police officers in the analyzation of evidence. As work increased, he realized the importance of scientific evidence in criminal investigations. Within just

a few years of his arrival at Weber State he applied for and received the first federal grant in Utah for a Crime Lab.

Some have affectionately called Jim Gaskill "The Father of Utah's Crime Laboratory".

From that meager beginning the State Crime Lab has grown and evolved into its present status of being operated by the State (not Weber State), and having laboratories in Salt Lake, Ogden, Cedar City, and Price.

For those of you who know Jim personally, he is a unique individual who has the capacity to understand theory and put it into practical use. His teaching

expertise has touched thousands or students over the past 30 years, and these students are now employed, or supervise laboratories around the United States and several foreign countries. Some

have affectionately called Jim Gaskill the Father of Utah's Crime Laboratory, and I cannot think of a more fitting title.

With his retirement, there will be a void that cannot be filled. Although he is retiring from Weber State University, I am sure we will still see him periodically in his trademark

"Sherlock Holmes" hat. Perhaps he will be teaching a class for Weber State or perhaps we will see him in the courtroom, but we will still miss him.

Always an avid supporter of the Utah Division of I.A.I., it was just three years ago, that the Utah Division of the I.A.I. sought to honor Jim's dedication by naming an award after


half of I.A.I. members and law enforcement officers throughout Utah and those who are spread around the U.S. . . .


The exciting thing is the conference is close enough for our members to attend and that it is a 4 day training conference. This makes it worth the travel time and money.


It will be held in Boise. Idaho on May 14-18, 2001. We will be holding meetings

Our delegates at the 50's party on Wednesday night.. The President Ann Punter was great fun, she is on roller skates. We are holding her up.




This is the formal installation dinner on Friday night.. Ever the famous Jeff Itami was there.
