PAPER FREE RENEWAL PROGRAM

The latest AUDUBON magazine includes notice of a new and very exciting option for renewing Audubon memberships, open to all chapter members. Instead of receiving multiple renewal notices, members can now call 800/274-4201 and ask to sign up for Audubon's Paper Free Renewal Program. Starting January of 2002, those who sign up will have their membership automatically renewed each year, and will simply receive one bill approximately two months in advance of their membership expiration date. Chapter generated members will continue to be credited as such, and, of course, you can cancel at any time. Save paper and simplify your accounting.

From the President's Aerie

On February 16th we will have our annual meeting and a new Board of Directors will be installed. Looking forward to the new year is a good time to look ahead to what we need to accomplish next year and to review what the chapter accomplished during the past year. The 2001 Birdathon raised \$7,000, which was used to support education, Feather Lake, and Rio Bosque. Under the planning and direction of Charles Simpson, a new Visitor Center was built at Feather Lake. Bob Johnson continued to provide interesting field trips each month for both members and the public. Volunteers served as guides for school groups visiting Feather Lake. The El Paso Christmas Bird Count, organized by Jimmy Zabriskie, counted 120 different species. Nancy Wilson arranged interesting and educational programs for all of our meetings.

Kathy Whelen and Jane Fowler have made sure the Roadrunner comes to you every month. John Sproul has kept volunteers at Feather Lake every weekend of the season. Needed changes to our By-Laws were approved at the December meeting.

One of the major things I think we need to accomplish in 2002 is improving our publicity so that more people can take advantage of our programs and facilities. We need to involve more of our membership in our programs and in the leadership of the Chapter. We will continue projects nearing completion (a Visitors' Guide to Birding El Paso and a new Fact Sheet). Our efforts will be in line with the mission of the National Audubon Society that is to "conserve and restore natural ecosystems for the benefit of humanity and the earth's biological diversity."



At Feather Lake

Feather Lake is a 43.5-acre wildlife sanctuary our organization manages in El Paso's Mission Valley. It is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave. Feather Lake is open to the public every Saturday, 8:00 a.m. to noon, and every Sunday, 2:00 p.m. to dusk. Admission is free.

In dry years, Feather Lake can go almost dry by mid-winter. This past year, of course, has been extremely dry, and the lake is now down to just a few puddles. When will it be a lake again? Probably not until late February, when the irrigation season is underway.

In April, we traditionally hold our monthly general meeting at Feather Lake. This year, please make an extra effort to attend. We'll be dedicating the new sanctuary visitor center and honoring the people who made it possible.

We'll also honor some of our new volunteers. Volunteers staff Feather Lake during visitor hours. They also help with sanctuary projects at scheduled workdays and other times. Want to help with our visitor program? Please contact John Sproul at 545-5157. Want to help at our next workday? Grab your gloves and join us Saturday, March 23, beginning at 2:00 p.m.


RIO BOSQUE WETLANDS PARK

Conservation



Great Backyard Bird Count

Some vary rare or unusual sightings for this area follows in this first section.

Hummingbirds: We have had a number of people report having these birds hanging around through most of the winter. Kiseda's have had Broad-billed, Anna's, and Rufus. Helen Bigalow has a Violet-crowned and so has Barry Zimmer. The following is a part of a report that Barry put out on Nov. 28th.

For the past hour I have been watching one of the most unlikely avian sights ever to be seen in Texas---my Violet-crowned Hummingbird chasing a Female Broad-billed that arrived in mid-morning! There are about four previous county records for Broad-billed in El Paso. The odds of having these two very rare hummers in the same yard in El Paso in Late November in a snowstorm seem incredibly unlikely. In addition the adult male Rufus has returned after being gone for a couple hours. Five species of hummingbirds (immature male Anna's and male Broad-tailed coming in often as well) in the yard at one time!
