

Grace & Peace : From the Pastor's Desk

Wednesday evening the choir and Anita were blessed to attend the Inter-Church Ministries worship service of Christian Unity. Along with Bryan's amazing organ accompaniment, with a cello and violin joining in with some of the pieces, we heard Pastor Jay Mitchell give a sermon based on the gospel of Luke 10:25-37 where Jesus tells the parable of the good Samaritan after being asked "Who is my neighbor?" Pastor Mitchell spoke of the goodness of sharing in the love of God. When we reach out to others we are reaching out as the love of God.

The days leading up to and including February 14 can be a difficult day for some people when the culture around them pushes the human nature of love, which is in Greek known as eros, a passionate love. People who are lonely because they've never had a love, the one they love has left them or passed away, or because the love they once felt for a person has died, feel even more isolated, alone, and hurting when it seems as though everyone surrounding them is happily celebrating love. I invite you to be more aware

of those whose Valentine celebration is filled with pain and unhappiness.

A second type of love is phila, a love between close friends. It is the type of accepting love that has a strong bond and it is good for your health. A light touch of a friend lowers blood pressure. Phila love keeps a person healthier and allows us to be more resilient when we go through difficult times.

Another type of love is storge, the love of parents for children. It is the most natural type of love because a parent cannot keep from loving their child, even when the child isn't "worthy" of love. A parent will tolerate behavior from children that they would never accept from a friend or their spouse.

The last of the Greek love types is agape love. Agape love is modeled on the selfless love God has for humankind. It is given whether or not it is returned. It doesn't require any response. This love is central to forgiveness, something that is necessary for every one of us. It is also the love that drove the Samaritan man to help the injured man on the road. He did not know this man; he had no idea whether or not this man was a good person. He saw someone in distress, no one stopping to help, and he did what he could to show him love. The Samaritan dressed the man's wounds, took him to a place where he could be cared for, and paid for the man's care until he could return. He looked for nothing in return other than the man recovering from his injuries.

One of the ways God shows love to humanity is through people. Love is not an emotional response, love is not an ooey gooey feeling, love is an action verb. Agape love reaches out to all people, in all places, at all times, and as demonstrated by the good Samaritan, whether the person is friend or foe. God's love is universal; there is not a person alive whom God does not love.

If you are one of those people who are hurting at this sugary sweet time of the year, remember that God knows your pain, God knows what you are going through, God loves you still. Reaching out to others in love may be a way to help you get through the difficult times.

Soup & Pasta Kitchen.


Large soup pots will be placed at both doors of the sanctuary before and after service for collection.






A thank you note was received from Alli Lee for the school supplies donated to Alli's classroom in Fairview.

WAR AND THE CLIMATE CRISIS

"Israel's military assault on Gaza is not just a humanitarian disaster but also generating massive amounts of planet-heating emissions and exacerbating the climate crisis. The carbon emissions from Israel's bombs, tanks, fighter jets and other military activity in the first two months of the war were higher than the annual carbon footprints of 20 of the world's most climate-vulnerable nations, according to researchers in the United States and United Kingdom. That is "a really conservative estimate," says *Guardian* reporter Nina Lakhani, who reported on the new study. The report is based on new work by researchers in the U.S. and the U.K., and they say even this impact is likely an underestimate. The analysis includes carbon emissions from fuel for aircraft, tanks and other vehicles, as well as emissions from making and exploding bombs, artillery and rockets. It also showed that U.S. cargo planes flying military supplies to Israel accounted for nearly half of all the carbon emissions."

"Twelve months in, the Russian/Ukraine war's decidedly mixed carbon impact is coming into view. Inside Ukraine, experts have tracked vast amounts of the greenhouse gasses that have been unleashed. Outside of Ukraine, though, the opposite has happened. To many analysts' surprise, Putin's decision to squeeze gas exports to Europe last summer has pushed the region's emissions down in recent months. It has also accelerated a global phase out of fossil fuels.

But the bad climate news first. Forest fires sparked by fighting, attacks on the Nord Stream 1 and 2 gas pipelines, the need to rebuild hundreds of thousands of blasted buildings, plus the millions of fossil-fueled journeys by soldiers, munitions, and refugees, adds up to a lot of extra carbon pollution. Russia's targeting of Ukraine's energy system, starting in October, has been particularly damaging: as oil depots and gas power plants have exploded, releasing carbon and methane into the air, Ukrainians have been forced to rely on dirtier fuels to keep warm. "We saw a huge influx of inefficient [diesel-powered] generators in November and December," says Lennard de Klerk, a Dutch carbon accounting expert in Kyiv preparing a report on the war's greenhouse gas impact, due to be presented to the U.N. in June(2023).

The better news is that Europe slashed its emissions in the later part of 2022. Many climate advocates had feared that Russia's suspension of natural gas exports to the E.U. would force the bloc to use more coal, which is twice as polluting. And some countries, including Germany and the U.K., did extend the life of coal plants that were due to be shut down. But the far more dominant trend was a fall in energy use. Europeans responded to dizzyingly high gas prices by turning down their gas-powered home heating or closing down businesses that couldn't pay their energy bills. The E.U.'s non-electricity natural gas consumption has fallen 17% year-over-year since the start of the war—which translates to 117 metric tons of avoided carbon emissions, according to Lauri Myllyvirta, lead analyst at the Finland-based Centre for Research on Energy and Clean Air. "Europe's CO2 emissions overall would have been higher without the invasion and Putin's attempts at an energy war.""
