Fire Services/Insurance

Did you know that the cost of fire suppression by the fire department is payable by the property owner? In our area we have seen the cost of fire suppression for a structure fire as high as \$28,000 and for a wildland (grass fire) as high as \$12,000.



Be sure to check your home insurance policy or talk to your insurance agent about what exactly your policy covers and how much it covers. Besides inquiring about your home structure fire insurance, we encourage you to inquire about wildland insurance (for a grass fire that happens but never reaches a structure).

ALSO, be aware that should the fire department be dispatched by 9-1-1 to your residence for any reason (house alarms including false alarms, campfire, downed utility line, etc.) you, as the property owner, will receive an invoice. The only exception is for medical response calls (assisting Alberta Health Services) – there is no charge for these calls.

Did you know that if more people from the area volunteered to be a Firefighter, volunteers and our communities will get:

- Free training as long as you volunteer your time
- Firefighters get tax breaks as well as life insurance
- A fire truck stationed out of our neighbouring community – Silver Sands
- Residents may get an insurance break due to having a satellite fire station
- Better/faster coverage in the Summer Village

Snow Removal and Sanding Services

The Summer Village contracts to P & E Ventures for snow removal and sanding services. When there is snowfall, the Summer Village contacts the service provider to perform these services. While many residents are keen to help remove the snow on the roads and while the gesture is appreciated, it can cause issues later on with plugged driveways, with snow being placed in areas where it should not be and with making it difficult for the contractor to move the heavy snow piles later. Due to this, we ask that residents only remove snow from their own properties.

Outstanding Taxes Due December 31st

A reminder that any outstanding taxes are due on December 31st, 2021 otherwise are subject to an 18% penalty on January 1st, 2022.

SAFE & HAPPY HOLIDAYS - FIRE SAFETY TIPS

As we approach the holiday season, let's keep it safe by following a few fire safety tips.

Home Fire Escape Plan – Take the time to make a home fire escape plan, and practice it; you never know when you and your family might need it.

Fireplace – Have your chimney inspected and cleaned by a professional. Ensure the flue is open before lighting up. Avoid burning wrapping paper, which may create a dangerous flash fire.

Indoor/Outdoor Decorative Lighting – Using decorative lighting correctly can be the difference between happy holidays and having more than just chestnuts roasting on an open fire. Follow these Do's and Don'ts on decorative lighting to prevent injuries and fires.

Do's

- Use lights with a safety certification (CSA, ULC, etc.).
- Replace old or damaged lights.
- Plug outdoor lights into a GFCI outlet.
- Turn off the lights when going to bed or leaving the house.

Don'ts

- Use inside-only decorative lights outside.
- Use electric lights on a metallic tree.
- Run electrical cords through or across doorways or under carpets.
- Overload the circuit by plugging too many lights

Holiday Tree – Always place the tree out of the way of foot traffic and do not block doorways or exits to the outside. Make sure the tree is well-secured in a sturdy stand, and place it away from any heat sources, including fireplaces and burning candles.

- **Artificial Tree** - Look for the "fire resistant" label, which indicates that the tree will resist burning and should extinguish quickly.
- **Real Tree** – Make sure it's green, the needles are difficult to pull from branches, and don't break easily when bent. Cut a few inches off the trunk to expose fresh wood, allowing better water absorption, and preventing the tree from drying out prematurely. Immediately dispose of the tree as soon as the holidays are over, or when the tree is dried out.



A Reminder to Build Yourself a 72-Hour Emergency Kit!

In an emergency, you will need some basic supplies. By taking a few simple steps today, you can become better prepared to face a range of emergencies. Individuals and families should be prepared to be self-sufficient for a minimum of 72 hours. On this page you will find emergency kit lists to help you and your family become more prepared. The items below will not apply to every situation or every person. Personalize your kit to suit your particular situation. Here are some basic items to consider for your emergency kit:

- ✓ Three-day supply of water (4 L per person per day)
- ✓ Non-perishable food for all family members and pets (three-day supply)
- ✓ First-aid kit
- ✓ Flashlight, battery-powered radio and extra batteries
- ✓ An extra set of car keys, credit cards, and cash
- ✓ Sanitation supplies
- ✓ Extra eyeglasses or contact lenses
- ✓ Important family documents and contact numbers
- ✓ Prescriptions or special medications
- ✓ Chargers for electronic communication devices
- ✓ Insurance documents
- ✓ Emergency phone numbers list
- ✓ A change of clothes for each family member
