are some spots that need to be filled *FAST*!



PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE...

Romans 8: 28 - We know that God causes all things to work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called according to His purpose. 29 For those whom He foreknew, He also predestined to become conformed to the image of His Son, so that He would be the firstborn among many brethren; 30 and these whom He predestined, He also called; and these whom He called, He also justified; and these whom He justified, He also glorified.



As is typical at the beginning of a New Year, many church leaders are beginning their newsletters by quoting Jeremiah 29 where God speaks of divine plans for his called people by promising a "future and a hope" according to God's plans for a good life and not disaster. (I get lots of newsletters.) It's a beautiful text, wherein God tells his people to take life by the horns and fully live: buy homes, get married, have children -an admonition that they should stop holding back because of uncertainty – because there is nothing about which to be uncertain when God made a promise.

I believe that – that God has promised good to us – such thorough good, that we should hear the word of God and take into ourselves God's admonition to hold nothing back. I am not in a position to promise the modern version of Jeremiah's promise: a booming stock market, a great housing climate or falling in love – those things are beyond my job description... but because of Jesus Christ, I am in a position to promise that in this coming year, God has our good in mind and, a future and a hope, and plans for our well-being – because: 1.) God loves us and 2.) we are called according to his purpose.

I am sure you will recognize the words of Romans 8 in the above paragraph – a chapter in which our future is already secured in Christ. "In Christ" – these are the key words in anything the Apostle promises – in Christ we are situated to share his resurrection glory, the undaunting victory of God over all sin and obstacles, and all of the promises of God's presence and help. The phrase "in Christ" is a natural partner to another phrase: "according to his will" because to be in Christ means to trust God's will in the big picture while we do God's will in the small bits we can control. In the end, it all comes down to this: in Christ, we are challenged to embrace a life of doing God's joyful will without fear, to hold nothing back, and to truly believe that God's good will follow.

So, sweet church, Happy 2019! Let's embrace the promises of God, and charge into this year without fear. Let us challenge one another to remain open and flexible to God's leading, so that we may walk according to his will – and let us hold back nothing that could serve his purposes. We want the future in Christ. We want those promises. So, let us reach forward without fear, and see what God will do among us!





NURSE'S NOTES...

Welcome to 2019! I hope each one of you have a great 2018.

So here is a North Dakota poem for you:

It's winter in North Dakota, and the gentle breezes blow, seventy miles an hour, At thirty-five below. Oh how I love North Dakota, when the snow's up to your butt; you take a breath of winter air, and your nose gets frozen shut. Yes, the weather here is wonderful; so I guess I'll hang around. I could never leave North Dakota', 'cause I'm frozen to the ground.

According to the American Macular Degeneration Foundation there are ten habits for eye health and American macular degeneration treatment:

What can be done to reduce the risk of developing macular degeneration?

The New England Eye Center at Tufts Medical Center recommends the following healthy habits, and your health care provider may give similar recommendations:

- Do not smoke. **Smoking may speed this deterioration** by increasing the number of damaging chemical compounds or reducing the number of protective nutrients delivered by the bloodstream to the eye, researchers speculate. Another theory is that smoking reduces blood and oxygen to the eye.
- Eat healthy foods with a diet rich in green, leafy vegetables such as kale, spinach, and collard greens. Eat fruit.
- Eat fish high in omega-3 fatty acids at least once or twice a week. This includes salmon, sardines, mackerel, herring, and albacore tuna.
- Avoid processed snack foods such as cakes, cookies, potato chips, candy, and soft drinks. Higher intake of specific types of fat—including vegetable, monounsaturated, and polyunsaturated fats and linoleic acid—rather than total fat intake may be associated with a greater risk for advanced AMD. Diets high in omega-3 fatty acids and fish were inversely associated with risk for AMD when intake of linoleic acid was low (1).
- Avoid partially hydrogenated fats such as coconut or palm oils. Use oil from olives, canola, or flaxseed in moderation.
- Maintain normal blood pressure, blood sugar, and cholesterol levels.
- Maintain a healthy weight.
- Exercise. Walk half an hour every day, or participate in more strenuous activities if possible, like yoga, aerobic activities, or sports.
- Wear sunglasses and a hat with a visor in bright sunlight to protect your eyes from potentially harmful ultra-violet (UV) light and blue light.

NURSE'S NOTES...

- If you have symptoms of macular degeneration or a family history of AMD and an unhealthy diet, take supplements which include lutein, zeaxanthin, vitamin C, vitamin D, vitamin E, zinc, and omega-3 fatty acids (fish oil).
- ◆ Eat large quantities of dark green leafy vegetables rich in carotenoids, the yellowish pigments that include precursors of Vitamin A. Spinach and collard greens are possibly the most beneficial vegetables in this respect. Two yellow pigments found in the macula known as lutein and zeaxanthin are also found in these vegetables, and are thought to filter out visible blue light which might possibly damage the macula. Therefore, these two yellow pigments may protect the macula from light damage (click here for a table listing foods rich in these carotenoids). Antioxidant vitamins and zinc supplements may help.

CHARITABLE ROLLOVER

As of December 18th, 2015, the IRA Charitable Rollover was passed by Congress and signed into permanent law by the President, allowing taxpayers age 70 1/2 or older to transfer up to \$100,000 annually from their IRA accounts directly to charity without first having to recognize the distribution as income. Members of First Presbyterian Church who are 70 1/2 years of age and are receiving required minimum distributions (RMD) from their qualified retirement plans have found this to be a useful tool for making their contributions to our Church. PER CAPITA 2019

Per capita payments, which represent a contribution to the work of the Presbyterian church at all levels, offer a working example of Christian sharing. A request for a per-member contribution is also made by the Synod and by the General Assembly; the sum of those three amounts constitutes the total per capita payment. Each church is asked to pay the total per capita payment to the Presbytery, which then distributes the payments among the three recipients. This way, each Presbyterian church within the Presbyterian Church (USA), has the opportunity to share equally to promote the work of the Presbytery , the Synod, and also the General Assembly.

Per capita payments recognize the fact that we Presbyterians see ourselves as a collective part of the body of Christ. We are not separated by region or by distance, instead Presbyterians are a single body, faithfully sharing our resources at all levels of the church. By sharing in these expenses, the collective financial strength of all church members can be focused on issues which concern all Presbyterians, not only in our area, but throughout the country and the world.

The per capita payments for 2019 as approved by Presbytery of the Northern Plains are \$44.00 per member.

The faithful recognition of this financial contribution by each church is integral to the operation of the Presbytery, since the Presbytery makes the payment based on the number of church members in the Presbytery, to the Synod and General Assembly, even if a local church does not pay that church's per capita assessment.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS DECEMBER 18TH, 2018

NEW MEMBERS

CLERK'S REPORT

The death of Gary Lahr, December 7th, 2018, was reported. With the addition of four new members in November, the membership total is 377, after tonight 382.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Pastor Leanne expressed gratitude for the ministry of music and children/youth Christmas program. Installation of new Elders and Deacons will be January 20th with Elder Training set for Saturday, January 19th.

COMMITTEE REPORTS (from meetings and minutes)

Administrative and Personnel—Parish Nurse, Wanona Goetz, will be offering a class on Healthy Lifestyles for 6 weeks, beginning in January. Pastor Leanne will use continuing education funds for a Pastoral Coach.

Business and Finance—The committee held a joint meeting with Outreach to agree on a budget of \$6,650 for the Outreach Committee in 2019. A donation was received for the real estate specials so the budget for property taxes would be \$800.00 less. (\$2,700 instead of \$3,500)

Christian Education—Bibles were presented on December 2nd (and at later times) to children in Grades 3-5. There are 6 adult prayer partners with six children. The PresbyTeen Fundraising Account will be used for half of the Triennium registration fee. The new confirmation class will begin in January, one Wednesday night a month.

Membership—The committee is studying possible gift packages for visitors. Runick Fru will remain on the committee.

Outreach—The committee will support a Girl Scout Troop to be formed in association with Boy Scout Troop 6. Gift cards were purchased for four Tree of Love families.

Session approved the 2019 Child Care center budget showing total income \$605,995 and total expense \$574,986. Session also approved the three-tier employee wage schedule.

Session approved the proposed 2019 General Fund Budget showing total income of \$491,500 and total expense of \$503,911. This includes a 1% salary increase for employees.

Session approved the 2019 minister's compensation package, totaling \$111,487.50, no change from last year.
