


Dance and Sing a Song of Christmas



Ring in the New Year

In Isaiah 43:19-21, the prophet talks about new beginnings. Our church calendar begins anew during Advent, while our secular calendar starts with New Year's Day. Either time provides an opportunity for family members to reflect on blessings received and challenges faced in the past year and to look forward together to the future.

Start your new traditions with a family notebook. Purchase a spiral notebook to place by the telephone. Invite family members to record phone messages, as well as thoughts and feelings, successes and failures. Encourage your family to write positive comments to each other as well. Family members who can't write may dictate their ideas or draw pictures. Save the book and use it during family times through the year. (You may need more than one book!) Look through it together next year. It's fun to see how each person grows and changes throughout the year.

Play together a favorite board game or card game. If you have time, let each family member pick a game to play. Enjoy a special snack. Serve treats that the whole family has helped prepare, such as "ants on a log" (celery stalks filled with cream cheese or peanut butter and dotted with a row of raisins). Sandwiches cut with holiday cookie cutters are also fun to make.

Close with devotions. Gather together around a lighted Advent wreath or large candle. Read aloud Isaiah 43:19 -21. Talk together about how it feels to start afresh, and that God forgives mistakes and offers us new challenges each year. Share one way that God helped you during the past year and invite other family members to do the same. Then think about the many blessings God has given you. Distribute slips of paper. On each one have family members draw or write about a way God has blessed them. Roll up each slip and tie it with yarn to form a prayer scroll. Put them in a basket or box, which you label: Our Basket of Blessings. Read the blessings during the year to remember how God has blessed you. Add more scrolls as blessings continue.

Invite each family member to choose a scroll from "Our Basket of Blessings." Offer a pray of thanks for the blessing written on it. An older family member may need to help a non-reader.

Why God's Word Cautions us about Debt

God cautions us from using debt because debt creates bondage to the world and prevents us from allowing God to act freely in our lives! Reverend Bill Hybels in his "Achieving Financial Freedom" audiotapes discusses reasons that God says "no" to debt:

- ✤ Debt obligates a person to earn more money and to earn it constantly. Working two or three jobs just to pay off debt is not the way to live.
- Debt enslaves a person to a creditor (Proverbs 22:7). When the creditor says, "Jump," we say, "How high?"



- ÷ Debt undermines joy. It is difficult to enjoy a weekend away or a dinner out when we are deep in debt, because money spent for those activities is money not spent on paying off credit card debt, which prolongs the problem.
- ÷ Debt erodes giving opportunities. God gives us the ability and the desire to help others. The lack of money makes it difficult to respond to God's gracious prompting.
- ÷ Debt imperils a Christian witness in two ways. First of all, we can be less effective in our evangelism when we face daily tension and anxiety over debt. Second, our witness to others suffers when they see or hear about our financial difficulty.
- Debt exaggerates character problems. Experiencing a problem with debt may reveal character ÷ weaknesses such as impatience, discontentment, a lack of self-discipline and even failure to trust in the Lord's provisions.

Before you use your credit cards, you should be slow, deliberate, and cautious. Prior to taking on debt, it is advisable to ask yourself some basic questions, such as the following:

- 仓 If I borrow, will I get something of enough value that it's worth the added obligation? Will the asset purchased appreciate in value?
- ♥ Will the taking on of debt allow me to give, save, and maintain my lifestyle?
- ✤ Have I considered giving up expensive activities and/or liquidating valuable possessions?
- Does the borrowing fit my budget? ÷
- ÷ Will the borrowing cause any tension or anxiety in my family?

Sharing God's Bounty

Gold, Incense, and Myrrh . . . and a Message to All

H ow much do babies appreciate the gifts they receive when they are born? Did Jesus, being the Son of God as well as the son of Mary, value the gifts the Magi brought? We would think those gifts impractical for a baby, but then this was not an ordinary baby. That gold bought food and lodging and everything that was needed by the holy family as they fled to Egypt and then got established in a new home. The incense was burned as their prayers ascended to the Father in Heaven, and the myrrh was used some thirty years later to anoint the body later of the Baby grown to be our Savior.



"The gifts are traditional gifts of the East," the Concordia Commentary on Matthew 2:11 tells us. We can be sure that these gifts were appreciated by our Lord, for St. Paul writes, "*If the willingness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has, not according to what he does not have*" (2 Corinthians 8:12).

Were the gifts of the shepherds that first Christmas night acceptable as well? What did the shepherds bring? The Bible does not record their bringing any gift at all – except, that is, the gift of their running to the stable with anticipation, the gift of their humble worship as their anticipation turned to realization, and the gift of their "*spread[ing] the word concerning what had been told them*" as they returned to their flocks, "glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen" (Luke 2:17, 20). It is obvious the willingness was there as the shepherds brought gifts according to what they had. Therefore, according to Scripture, their gifts were acceptable.

We, too, can be sure that our gifts are appreciated by our Lord – the gifts of our treasures – our gold and silver and the gifts of our praise and adoration as we witness to what we have heard and seen. Like the Magi and the shepherds, we are drawn to the manger bed. Like them, we kneel in awe and adoration. Like them, we use the gifts God gives us, wherever we are, wherever God places us, to "*spread the word concerning what [has] been told [us]*."


