- Set up must be complete before 5:00pm on Friday, September 18, 2015. Dismantling will take place after 7:00pm on Saturday, September 19 or Sunday, September 20 at 4:00pm (not prior to that time).
- Electrical hook up is available. Extension cords are NOT supplied.
- 2 fair passes will be provided to the vendor for the weekend; any other volunteers will be required to pay admission fees to enter.

Outdoor Exhibit Space

- Set up will be completed by 5:00pm on Friday, September 18, 2015.
- Dismantling will take place after 4:00pm on Sunday, September 20, 2015 (or after the demolition derby, whichever is sooner) and not prior to that time.
- Electrical hook up is NOT available.
- 2 fair passes will be provided to the vendor for the weekend; any other volunteers will be required to pay admission fees to enter.





- 1. Every article to be entered for the competition must be the property of the person whose name is on the entry ticket.
- 2. Exhibitors must pick up their exhibits between 3:30pm and 6:30pm on Monday, September 21, 2015. **NO EARLIER!** Exhibits not picked up by 6:30pm will NOT be the responsibility of the Home Craft Committee.
- 3. Every person not necessarily required in the judging area must withdraw while the judges are officiating.
- 4. No person shall be the judge of their own property nor be allowed to exhibit and judge in the same class.
- 5. Persons interfering with the judges shall forfeit the right to any prizes to which they may be otherwise entitled.
- 6. Only one entry shall be allowed to an exhibitor in one section of the arena classes.
- 7. In addition to the stated prizes offered in the listed categories, judges may award additional prizes they consider worthy and the directors shall determine the prize. Judges shall have the power to grant or withhold any prizes in case of inferiority in any class.
- 8. Although directors will take responsible precautions to ensure the safety of articles exhibited, they wish it to be distinctly understood that the owners must take the risk of exhibiting them and should any articles be lost or stolen the directors will give every assistance in their power towards recovery of the same but will not make any payment of value thereof.
- 9. The animals or articles to which prizes are awarded shall be distinguished by attaching stickers or ribbons to the respective animals or articles.
- 10. The decision of the judges shall be final as to the awarding of prizes. No appeal shall be considered except in the case of a protest. All protests shall be made in writing and delivered to the fair office on the grounds within 1 day after the judge made the award. Any exhibitor making such protest will be required to deposit with the Secretary, along with the protest a sum of \$20 to cover costs and if said is not sustained, the said among protest will be retained by the WAS. The President, Vice Presidents, Secretary and Director in charge of the department shall be a standing committee to hear and decided all protests.
- 11. The WAS will withhold 10% of prize money received from cattle, sheep, heavy and light horse winnings. There will be no prize money withheld from entries in the-junior Home Craft division and 4-H. For all other arena exhibitors, any prize money received over \$10 will have 10% withheld to cover administration costs.
- 12. In the case of bad or unfavorable weather or other reasons causing the receipts to fall short of paying the expenses and all prizes in full after paying the expenses, a proportionate amount, exclusive of membership will be deducted from such prizes to enable the Directors to balance the accounts without loss. The Directors feel that this course is the most equitable and fair one that can be adopted, as any deduction will fall proportionately on all those participating in the amounts collected and not leave the whole sum to be a debt to bear heavily on the WAS and thus impair its usefulness.
- 13. While the Directors of the WAS will use every available means to prevent accidents in and or about the grounds, it must be distinctly understood that all persons going on to or upon the show grounds must personally assume all risk of accidents or injury from an cause whatsoever.
- 14. The WAS recommends that all exhibitors and competitors maintain a minimum liability of \$1 million insurance.
- 15. Absolutely NO alcohol or drugs on fair grounds.

None of this information will be sold or transferred to any outside party for any reason.







- Definition of an exhibit: All purebred registered animals, owned by one or more people, which are maintained on one farm or breeding unit, are considered to be the production of one farm or breeding unit.
- Each breed must be shown separately and have at least three exhibitors and 12 animals per breed to be eligible for the Federal prize money contributions.
- Where there are less than three exhibitors in one breed, the Fair will pay 50% of the prize money offered. All exhibits must be owned by and registered in the name of the exhibitor.
- All animals must be legibly tattooed if applicable.
- No animal will be allowed to show unless its registration certificate, health chart and production certificate are available for inspection and found in order by officials before judging.
- All cattle must be groomed and fitted for the show.
- This show operates under the Federal Livestock Classification.
- All classes to be on an open basis.

Health Requirements

Tuberculosis: Test for tuberculosis not required to cover cattle originating from

- a) Herds dealt with under the accredited Herd Plan in good standing,
- b) Herds in accredited areas with good standing.

Brucellosis: No owner or person in charge of any animal over the age of six months, except steers, spayed heifers and official vaccinates under the age of 18 months, shall show the animal unless it comes from a Brucellosis free region or a Brucellosis free listed herd and is accompanied by a certificate signed by an inspector indicating

- a) The Brucellosis free region or Brucellosis free herd from which the animals came,
- b) in the case of an animal from a Brucellosis region, that the animal has proved negative to all tests for Brucellosis required from animals in a Brucellosis free region,
- c) comes from a herd of negative status in a region other than a Brucellosis free region and has proved negative to a test for Brucellosis conducted by an inspector or an accredited veterinarian within 60 days preceding the show and is accompanied by a certificate sign by an inspector indicating the negative results of the Brucellosis test, the date of the test and the negative status of the herd from which the animal came. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to contact the District Office of the Health of Animals Branch to make arrangements for these health certificates.


