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Stocks pleads guilty; to spend life in prison

LONOKE — Heath Stocks of Furlow pled guilty Friday to three counts of capital murder in the Jan. 17 shooting deaths of his father, mother and sister at their home. Stocks had previously entered a plea of "not guilty."

Circuit/Chancery Judge Lance Hanshaw handed down three life sentences in response to Stocks' plea. The sentences are

to be served consecutively.

Stocks was arrested Jan. 19 for the killings and first arraigned on Jan. 21. At that arraignment, Stocks was remanded to the state hospital for a mental examination. At an April 8 arraignment, Stocks pleaded "not guilty."

The "guilty" plea agreement was made between Lonoke County prosecuting attorney Larry Cook and defense co-attorneys Edgar Thompson and Mac Carder Thursday. Cook said Friday negotiations had been underway several weeks, but did not say what had led to the final decision.

Hanshaw posed a series of questions to ensure Stocks understood the significance of the plea agreement. "Do you understand in making this plea you are giving up your right to trial by jury?...You are giving up presumption of innocence?" Hanshaw asked. Stocks answered each with "Yes, sir"

Cook read the charges against Stocks. The deaths of Joe Stocks, Barbara Stocks and Heather Stocks were each treated as a separate charge.

Stocks responded as guilty to each. Impassive for most of the proceedings, Stocks' response to the charge of killing his sister, Heather, was possibly his most apparent show of emotion.

Asked how he pled to the charge, Stocks paused for several seconds before very quietly saying "guilty."

Hanshaw then passed sentence.

Stocks was returned to Lonoke County Jail to await transfer to the Arkansas Department of Corrections. He is scheduled to be moved to the Pine Bluff Diagnostic Unit this week.

FAMILIES SPEAK

The families of Elwood and Annie Mae Harris and Martin and Dorothy Stocks, Heath Stocks' grandparents, released a state-
