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HISTORY IN PERSON - Bringing history to life is the a goal of educator Bill Perryman. Mr. Perryman of History In Person will spend a week making presentations at selected schools. Dressing in period costume, he will portray a variety of historical figures including Sam Houston, Thomas Jefferson, Paul Revere, Ben Franklin, and Abraham Lincoln. The presentations also include a Power Point slide show to enhance the production for students and teachers.



PreK SEQUENCE – A travel grant was provided to eight Lubbock ISD educators to attend a Core Knowledge Getting Started professional development session in Phoenix, Arizona. Teachers and administrators from Ballenger, Martin, Mahon, and Stubbs Early Learning Centers attended the event in January to learn more about the PreK Sequence, which is utilized in the SOAR PreK programs in LISD. The group met to determine what additional Core Knowledge PreK modules might be offered as appropriate training for PreK teachers.

ACTIVITY REPORTS – The annual Core Knowledge activity reports are due April 10. A template will be sent to principals. The reports will cover topics of study, culminating events, special presentations, special speakers, and instructional materials and equipment related to Core Knowledge implementation.



SEQUENCE PLANNING – With Lubbock ISD planning to implement CSCOPE K-12, there is a need to review the *Core Knowledge Sequence* as it relates to CSCOPE and expectations for common formative assessments and benchmarks. A team of teachers will meet this summer to review the scope and sequence and determine the appropriate placement of Core Knowledge topics for the upcoming school year. This group will interface with Kathy Rollo, the LISD

Executive Director for Professional Development.

STORYTELLING - Master storyteller Jim Weiss shared his talents captivating students of all ages from PreK to middle school. Mr. Weiss spent a week in Lubbock sharing fables, cultural tales, stories about historical events, and mysteries with students in an effort to enhance their language arts classes and inspire them to read beyond the classroom. His presentations were scheduled at Centennial, Murfee, Rush, Wheelock, Roscoe Wilson, Lubbock Christian, Hutchinson Middle School, and St. Luke's Preschool.


DON SMARTO Don Smarto made a photography presentation at Hutchinson Middle School. The program was attended by all students taking photography classes. He highlighted composition using famous photographs as examples. He also showed the students how cameras developed through history displaying cameras from his personal collection. Mr. Smarto is an award winning cinematographer for his documentaries. Don Smarto also made a presentation on the Civil War for 8th grade students at O. L. Slaton Middle School. STRUGGS BOOKS IN LIBRARIES – Professor E. C. Struggs served as the principal of Dunbar Junior Senior High School for thirty years (1930-65). During that time, he was instrumental in obtaining full accreditation for the school, secured used uniforms and equipment for the football team from Texas Tech, and served as the school leader as the campus moved into a new location in 1936 and again in 1959. HMr. Struggs career was closely aligned with the history of Dunbar. Sam Ayers researched and wrote the book, and Judith Struggs (E. C. Struggs' daughter, provided valuable documents and photographs). Professor Struggs' life and achievements are highlighted in this biography available in Lubbock area public and school libraries.





ARTIST SPEAKS TO STUDENTS – Mike Wimmer delivered the commencement address at the LISD January graduation ceremony held at Monterey High School. A total of eighty students representing Coronado, Estacado, Lubbock High, and Monterey received their diplomas. The award winning artist and illustrator also made presentations to all the art students at Lubbock High School and the 8th grade students at Hutchinson Middle School. In addition to highlighting his training, research, and the painting process; Mr. Wimmer stressed the importance of passion, practice, perseverance,

and dedication in order to achieve success. Mike Wimmer has created illustrations for Disney, TV Guide, Procter and Gamble, AT&T, and American Airlines. He has illustrated book covers and several children's books. He also paints portraits and murals.

SCHOLARSHIP - Heather Bullock is the spring 2010 recipient of the Helen Jones Core Knowledge Scholarship. She graduated from Goddard High School in Roswell, New Mexico in 2008. RENAISSANCE FESTIVAL - The fourth graders at Murfee elementary stepped into medieval life in an annual Medieval Feast and Faire. Preparations included hand crafting stalls and wares that were later traded as the students reenacted a medieval market. Students dressed in costumes ranging from acrobats and merchants to priests and peasants. RENAISSANCE FESTIVAL - Roscoe Wilson students concluded their study of the Renaissance with their annual Shakespeare Festival. Their study began with the Islamic scholars who helped to translate Greek and Roman works, progressing through Italy (Medici Family, Catholic Church, Michelangelo, Leonardo da Vinci, Martin Luther/Protestantism) and the Reformation (printing press, Galileo & Copernicus, Ignatius of Loyola and the Council of Trent). The unit of study concluded with the Golden Age of England with Henry VIII, his 6 wives, and Queens Mary and Elizabeth. All students attended the festival in Renaissance attire and enjoyed Renaissance festivities including food and drink. Students selected a king and queen representing the Kingdom of Wilson. There were student performances and an



entertaining jester. The O.L. Slaton Madrigal Choir also provided an impressive performance.
