"Will You Kiss the Leper Clean?"

Many years ago I entered the hospital room of an elderly lady who greeted me with the words, "you shouldn't have gone to all that trouble for me. I'm so ashamed. I was always been a clean person." It took me a moment to realize that she was embarrassed because I had to put on a mask, gown and gloves before entering her room. She had tested positive for an antibiotic resistant "superbug." that she had picked up in the hospital through no fault of her own; but she believed that carrying these germs somehow made her less worthy of care. I think that was the moment when I really began to understand the significance of Jesus' action in today's gospel.

Illness is horrible on many levels: the pain; the uncertainty or fear; the confrontation with mortality; the weakness or exhaustion; the inability to do the things you used to do ... But the most devastating aspect of illness comes through a loss of connection whether that be a loss of connection with self, with others, with nature or with God. Human beings are remarkably resilient. We can bear the unbearable when we know we matter, when we know we are loved, when we know we are not alone. But without love and connection. without a way to connect or contribute, without a sense of self worth, even minor ailments can overwhelm us. The woman whose room I entered had lost her sense of self. Aging and illness had gradually isolated her from others and the hospital precautions sign pushed her to the breaking point. She believed that she could no longer hope to connect with others because of her "uncleanness." She struggled to find meaning in her life because she saw herself as a "nuisance" rather than as a gift. She was dying from the inside out.

The leper in today's Gospel had also lost himself because of his illness. As a leper he was no longer allowed to participate in or contribute to society. Instead he had to let others know that he was nothing but a dangerous obstacle in their path, some "thing" best avoided. When Jesus heals him, he sends him to the priest so that he may be reconnected to the community. It is not the physical cleansing that is the incredible gift, instead it is the restored sense of belonging. That is why the man cannot keep silent. He needs to tell his story because finally he has a story that others care about, a story that makes him truly alive.



Today is World Day of the Sick. It is a day when all of us are called to remember that the miracle that Jesus offered to the leper is one that we too can offer to those who are sick. We can walk with them through the illness, stay connected even when it is not easy and listen to the story even when it frightens us. Jesus' healing miracles are the sign that a person is not defined by his or her illness. We are called to see beyond the illness to love and learn from the other even in the midst of illness.

NOT GETTING AN ANSWER, BUT WE'D BE MORE INFORMED ABOUT THE QUESTION-Recent legislation around the question of medically assisted suicide invites us as Roman Catholic Christians to give serious consideration to what we believe about death and dying. The Church holds the underlying principle of Choose Life among all others; we recognize the question of medically assisted suicide is a multifaceted one with no easy answers. The English Diocesan Pastoral Council understands the importance of having dialogue about this. Therefore, over the next year or so, the Office of Faith Development will be offering a series of initiatives to enable these conversations.

During Lent you are invited to read Sr. Nuala Kenny's book: Rediscovering the Art of Dying: How Jesus' Experience and Our Stories Reveal a New Vision of Compassionate Care. Sr. Nuala is a member of the Sisters of Charity of Halifax, medical doctor, ethicist and professor emeritus with Dalhousie University's Faculty of Medicine. In her book, she talks about the challenge of being pastorally present to those who are "sick, dependent and dying, to those who may be considering medically assisted death, and to the bereaved whose loved ones have chosen it."

Having read the book, you are invited to join Claudia McCloskey and Maurise Leveque, two retired nurses, as they facilitate a discussion on it, on April 14th and 21st, from 9:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon at St. Bernard's Church Hall. Claudia and Maurise readily admit they don't have all the answers, but they understand the importance of living in hope.

Later in the spring, we will explore the Church's beliefs and attitudes around death in a session facilitated by Dr. Andrew Wilson; in the fall, we will look at how our Canadian bishops have responded to this legislation in a session facilitated by Archbishop Valéry Vienneau; and in March 2019 Sr. Nuala will present a Mission on the topic.

These are complex issues, and as the title of the series suggests, may not offer any ready answers; but we need to do some personal reflection, and engage in dialogue with others about this so we can more fully delve into the complexity of suffering and death. How, even with the great pain and hardship of chronic, debilitating and terminal illness, can one still live in hope?

RITE OF ELECTION

This rite from the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) both closes the period of formation of the catechumens, (adults and children of catechetical age who are preparing for baptism) and marks the beginning of the period of final more intense preparation for the sacraments of initiation.

The Church makes an **election** based on the testimony of godparents and catechists and the reaffirmation of the catechumens' intention to take part in the sacraments of initiation, to admit those catechumens at the next major celebration in the sacraments of initiation. Since these will be celebrated during the Easter Vigil, the Rite of Election takes place on the first Sunday of Lent and the period of final preparation of the elect will take place during Lent.

The RITE OF ELECTION takes place with Dennis Owen next Saturday, February 17th during the 4:00 p.m. liturgy at St. Augustine's.

CELEBRATION OF THE WORD DURING


