Running a dry washer or a recirculating wet washer is a simple task.

Most of them are easy to set up and run. It is like a tinker toy set. Each piece fits in only one way. Naturally, after going through the labor of setting up the machine, now you want to see the Gold.

That is exactly the problem.


LEAVE THE MAT ALONE. Let the machine run. Don't keep stopping the operation every so often to see if you have hit the mother load. Leave it alone and let it run. The Gold, if you have any, will still be there later on.

Watch the flow of the materials that you are running as it runs over the riffles. If necessary, put some tape under the riffles which will create a 'dead air zone. This will make a pocket for the gold to drop into. (Thanks Jim Miller)

Always keep the wind at your back while the machine is working. The dust from the machine can cause you a problem with breathing. It is a good idea to have a dust mask on. This will prevent the dust from getting into your lungs. Good Luck. May your mat be all full of Gold on each trip.

METEORITE MANIA

Every treasure hunter I have come in contact with lately seems to want to talk about a recent issue of Smithsonian magazine and its 10 page article on hunting for meteorites with a metal detector.

The article was written by Kevin Krajick and covers, among other things, where to find meteorites, what they are worth and why the intense interest on the part of universities and collectors in acquiring them.

For years a "veil of secrecy" has existed surrounding the practice of hunting for meteorites with a metal detector with a few of the "inside professionals" volunteering any information as to how they find them or where and to whom to sell them ... With the publication of the recent Smithsonian article this veil of secrecy has now been lifted and everyone I have talked to wants a "piece of the action" Certainly, part of the interest in acquiring meteorite fragments stems from the upward spiraling prices which have ranged from \$100 gram a few years ago to as much as \$5000. Per gram today for choice specimens.

For the detectorist reading this article who might want to search for meteorites, here are a few basic facts: Meteorites are fragments of cosmic material that manages to make it through the earth's atmosphere without completely burning up and actually strike the earth. Scientists estimate that approximately 6800 meteorites strike the earth each year; most weighing less than a pound.

Meteorites are valuable because they are one of the few ways we have to learn about the structure and composition of the solar system and because they may ever reveal clues to our own origins. Universities and other scientific institutions have always sought to acquire specimens of meteorites to study. In recent years, dealers, speculators and collectors have also joined the ranks of those seeking to acquire meteorites causing the prices to rise dramatically.

This sudden craze to acquire meteorites should be of interest to those of us who metal detect because one of the primary ways to locate meteorites is with a metal detector. Today's modern metal detectors are quite capable of locating meteorite fragments; even those embedded at shallow and medium depths. Every detectorist probably already own all the equipment necessary to locate meteorites... Since meteorites have been striking the earth at a constant rate since the beginning of time, it is possible that some detectorists have already found meteorite fragments without even knowing it. The message here is not to be so quick to discard those bothersome "hot rocks" as you may be discarding something that is 250 time more valuable than a gold nugget of equal size.

on it without being fined or whatever the
government decides as to claims.

Mr Lombardo spoke of the need to write letters to Congress, Sen. Reid and other members of government. We need to oppose the movement to stop mining and prospecting. Sen. Reid has a bill to stop collecting fossels. If they can stop us from collecting fossils, they can stop us from collecting gold.

These helpful suggestions will improve the effectiveness of your letter.

...State the purpose for writing in the first paragraph of the letter. If your letter pertains to a specific piece of legislation, identify it accordingly, e.g., House bill: XXX, Senate bill: S. XXX ...Be courteous, get to the point, and include key information, using examples to support your position, if that information is available to you. ...Focus on only one issue in each letter. If possible, keep your letter to one page. ...Ask your member of Congress to respond in to your concerns.

Volunteers make mines safer.

A posse is roaming around Nevada, but they're not after outlaws.

They are volunteers from the Gold Searchers of Southern Nevada, trying to make the desert a little safer.

The group, which mainly consists of seniors, has closed more than 40 abandoned mines scattered all over Southern Nevada.

But they have a long way to go. Club members work with the state Division of Abandoned Mine Lands to reduce the chance of death or injury from accidents occurring in abandoned mines.

Doug Driesner, division administrator, estimates there are approximately 50,000 abandoned mines in Nevada that may present safety hazards

. "The division has identified and ranked 8,461 hazardous mine openings throughout the state with 6,289 having been secured," he says.

Not only do club members help secure the mines, they help educate the public about the dangers.

Gold Searchers is a non profit Las Vegas club with 535 members from all walks of life. Some members are experts in geology, mineralogy and mine engineering, but others are volunteers who enjoy searching for gold.

"Our members show a great interest in prospecting for gold or other valuable minerals in the land, "explains Daniel Green, vice President of the group, says.

"It is a lot of fun, interesting and educational. A little last of history go8ing back to the days of old."


The members also give gold panning demonstrations to Scouts, schools and at special events. "Searching for gold is a healthy, worthwhile hobby, "Green says. "But as a prospector, do not expect to get rich. It is just a hobby."

The club conducts prospecting trips each month and files claims with the Bureau of Land Management. There are roughly 500 acres under claim and all of them contain gold.

"There is more known gold in Nevada than all the states in the U.S. Combined together, "explains Green. Last year, Nevada produced 8.5 million ounces of gold at 130 Mines.

At a field trip last year, one man picked up 28 ounces of gold in an hour. He donated some of the nuggets to the club.

Thoughts on headphones from a national expert!

It is a fact that all land based metal detectors produce an audio signal when they pass over metal targets. It is also true that when you first hear these signals, they seem to be shockingly loud. So, it would naturally seem to follow that a metal detector's external speaker should be totally sufficient. Why then do experienced detectorists always use a set of very good headphones? Furthermore, what makes a headphone "very good" in combination with a metal detector? Let's explore some of the reasoning involved in

headphone usage. Imagine yourself lying back on a lounge, soaking up the sun in a local park, or at the water's edge. Some one comes along, plunks themselves down five feet away, and blasts a boom box at you during the time that you had set aside to unwind. That would be downright rude. All sports and hobbies have an etiquette as well as a code of ethics and sense of fair play. Metal detecting is no different, and it is highly discourteous and quite offensive to hover around some one while your detector beeps away. Do this long enough and you could provoke someone into summoning a person with the authority to exclude you, your detector and other detectorists from the area.

On the other hand, let's assume that you are not an especially socially conscientious person. Well, okay... what you really care about is finding a lot of STUFF! So, now we come to one of the greatest reasons to use a headphone. You will be

able to better hear those faint, deep

items which might be lying on edge.

This will allow you to find more items. Additionally, many distracting exterior sounds such as wind, waves and wolves will be muted. Okay, If you insist upon hearing the wolves, leave one earcup askew!

If you are fiscally oriented in the same direction as many detectorists, then you have an economical streak in you and undoubtedly enjoy getting something for nothing. Well, the use of a headphone will save you money by allowing the batteries in your detector to last longer.

This is because the speaker in the detector is turned off when the headphone is plugged in to it and so, no energy is required to drive the detector's external speaker.

"But," you say "I already have a great set of headphones for my stereo or multi-media system.

Can I use them?" The answer is "Maybe." If you can answer all of the following questions with a yes, then you probably can. Does your headphone have a volume control on each ear?

(Most detectors don't have a volume control, and you don't want your ears blasted.)

Does your headphone have moisture resistant mylar speakers? (Paper cone speakers deteriorate from moisture and eventually mute soft signals.) Do you know if your detector has a stereo jack? (If stereo headphones are used with a detector that has a mono jack you will get sound in only one ear.) (Of course, you might want to listen for wolves with the silent ear.)

The components, frequencies, and Ohms in metal detecting headphones are specially selected to allow you to

hear the best with most metal detectors. Most headphones have a selector switch or adapter so that you can use them with all of the detectors that you own

Some specialty headphones can process the audio of metal detectors for maximum depth as well as safeguard your hearing against overly loud signals. These will automatically match your detector's preferential Ohms. Look for them under the DEPTHMASTER brand name.

- If you discover live ammo, explosives or a lethal object, DON'T touch it.
 Mark the site and notify the Police at once.

Dry washing in the Desert.

It was reported to us on November 7, 2001 that a person had been arrested in California by the BLM. This arrest took place while working a dry washer and while on an outing with several other people.

I began inquiries about this arrest and reported the incident to our members at our general meeting. Since that time, I still have not been able to confirm what this arrest was all about.

The Gold Prospectors
Association has heard of the incident that took place on one of their claims. They were unable to identify the man or the particular incident as beginning a change in direction for the BLM and the Department of Interior. I contacted Gale Norton's office by E Mail but received no reply. This incident happened in the Barstow, California area.

HOW-TO BUILD A GOLD SCREEN



uite by accident we devised a gold screen that works better for us.

When we first began our prospecting. I used graduated sizes of screen that were flush with the top of our buckets for sifting our concentrate into smaller sizes. We had to work the concentrates through the screen, which was difficult and time consuming.

One day while filling a bucket full of water with the screen slightly submerged in water the job was a lot easier. The con-




Completed frame, with flange, for classifying screen.

attached "flatwise" to the top edge of the previously formed square. I again used eight 1-1/2 inch screws in pre-drilled holes.

The next step was painting the device with a water based paint.

After the square with a flange was made, I cut a 9×9 inch piece of screen, removing a $1/2 \times 1/2$ inch square from each corner. This allows the screen to bend over the edge of the boards. I then stapled the screen to the bottom of the recessed portion of the frame.

centrate went through the screen faster and at the same time the dirt fell from the particles of concentrate. The only problem here was that the water level

Then we came up with the idea of building a recessed screen that would fit down into our plastic buckets deeply enough to allow the concentrates to be worked completely under water.

Here is how we built it.

To begin with I used 1/2 x 1-1/2 inch air molding and cut four equal pieces 7-1/2 inches long. I then took eight 1-1/2 inch screws and inserted them in pre-drilled holes. These were located two at each corner to form a square eight inches by eight inches.

I next cut four pieces of 1/2 x 1-1/2 meh molding eight inches long. These I

I made three of these classifying screens using 1/4 inch (4 mesh), 20 mesh, and 40 mesh screen. On the 20 and 40 mesh screen I added a piece of 1/4 inch screen for extra support. I applied the smaller screen first, then attached the 1/4 inch screen.

The flange on the screen allows the device to sit in the top of either a square or round five gallon plastic bucket. This places the bottom edge 1-1/2 inches below water level if the bucket is full.

Our new classifier screens help us get the job done quickly and with less effort, which is why we wanted to share this information with you!
