
About Nebraska's New Voter ID Law

Voter ID begins with the May 14, 2024 primary and will continue thereafter. Nebraska's new voter ID law (LB514) requires all registered Nebraska voters to present a photo identification when voting in an election in Nebraska.

ID must include name and photo. A Nebraska driver's license or state ID (from DMV), a Nebraska college ID (public or private), a Nebraska political subdivision ID (state, county, city, school, etc.), a United States Passport, Military or Tribal ID, or a hospital, assisted-living facility or nursing home record with your name and photo on the ID will be accepted. The IDs may be expired.

If you forget your ID, you will fill out a provisional ballot. For your ballot to count, you will need to present a photo ID to your county election office on or before the Tuesday after the election.

If you don't have an ID, you can get a state ID for free (*for voting purposes) from the Nebraska DMV. You will need to bring certain documents to get a state ID, so check with the DMV website ahead of your visit. If you cannot get an ID due to disability/illness, religious objection to being photographed, or lack of documents to obtain a free state ID. you can complete a reasonable impediment certification.
