
# BY LAWS OF THE Apostolic Faith Bible College, Inc. Article VII

### Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another, adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

- \* Triune God; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit
- Creation and Formation
- \* Man is basically sinful and in need of salvation
- Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life
- Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul, and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ
- Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the speaking in other languages.
- Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit
- \* Sacrament of the Lord's Supper
- Washing of feet
- \* Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers
- \* Do not condone divorce and remarriage
- \* Destruction of the wicked
- \* Conditional Immortality
- \* Rapture of the Man Child Class
- \* Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly
- \* A ministry supported by tithes and offerings

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if the are not inconsistent with the above listed basic doctrines.



### Testimony From The Heart of Kelly Walters

My story begins in March of this year... I hadn't been feeling very well so, I had one of the paramedics at work (METS) take my pulse & blood pressure. My pulse was in the upper 40's / low 50's & my blood pressure was going up & down. It was recommended that I call my cardiologist, Dr. Langevin, who wanted me to come into the office for an EKG.

Dr. Langevin asked myself, Jeff & my mother to come into the office the following week. He had found a Sub Aortic Membrane, which is a membrane inside my heart blocking off the blood flow out of the heart. He was also concerned about the coarctation (blockage) of the aorta, which had been repaired when I was nine. I was scheduled for a heart catheterization in two weeks, since he

was going out of town the next week for a convention. The convention had cardiologist's from around the United States. Dr. Langevin presented my case to the room for discussion. There was a doctor present from UCLA Medical Center and she, along with others, agreed that UCLA was the best place to perform surgery.

The following week, when Dr. Langevin returned from his convention, a heart cath & MRI was ran & sent to California. The doctors there had to review all of the reports and images from the tests before they could schedule my surgery date. My surgery was finally scheduled for May 14th. As if having surgery wasn't bad enough, this was also the day after Mother's Day and I would be missing all of the 'end of school' events with the girls.

We made all of the necessary arrangements for our stay in California and on May 10th, my Mom, Dad, Jeff & I were flying to California. As soon as we arrived in L.A. I had to go to the hospital for more tests and a meeting with some of the doctors.

On Friday morning, the 11th, the team of doctors and surgeons met and again reviewed all the tests and new images taken. They found out that the membrane needed to be removed, but the coarc needed to be looked at a little closer. Just below the coarc was an area that had become enlarged and was damaged. They concluded that on Monday, the 14th, the membrane would be removed and in six moths I would need to return for another surgery to repair the coarc. They couldn't take care of both, because of my having a previous surgery when I was nine.

On Monday, while I was being prepped for surgery, an associate of Dr. Lakes (surgeon) told us that the surgeon had discovered a way to place a graft just above and below the coarc. It would move the blood flow away from the area and he could do it all from the center of my chest. This meant I would not have to come back in six months for another surgery. Praise the Lord!

My surgery started at 3:00 PM that afternoon and finished at 9:00 PM. I was moved from ICU to an observation room Tuesday evening. I had a reaction to the medication, so I was sent back to ICU. After observation, I was sent back to a room on Wednesday and I was out of the hospital by 4:00 PM Friday.

We had to stay one more week to make sure everything was going well and to get clearance from my doctors to fly home. On May 24th, I was able to fly home to Joplin, Missouri.

About a week after I was at home, I caught the flu. On Monday, June 4th, Dr. Langevin sent me in for chest x-rays and lab work. They called me that afternoon and said that my left lung was full of fluid and had to be drained, so I was admitted to the hospital. After draining almost 3 quarts from the left lung and 3 more days in the hospital I was finally home.

During my last stay in the hospital I was upset and complaining about not being home with my girls and only seeing the bad. Then part of a song came to my mind, one that we sing at church, "For the God in the good times is still God in the bad times..." what a blessing. I may have gone through a lot, but He is still my God and He had never left my side. I cannot stop praising Him for all of the blessings and the miracles that He showed me and my family through these past two months.

Acts 20:24 "However, I consider my life worth nothing to me, if only I may finish the race and complete the task the Lord Jesus has given me - the task of testifying to the gospel of God's grace."


