DESCRIPTION: Great performing George Birnie designed short hunting bow that has been well used and abused. Bow has numerous issues, none of which appear fatal. The bow had been hand painted. I stripped and refinished the bow and repaired the flaws to the extent it was cost-effective to do so. I have shot this bow several times without issue, but don't know how long it will last. That it why it is priced more as a wallhanger.

The good: Very comfortable grip. Limbs have no delamination; limbs are straight. Overlays and tips are in very good condition.

The neutral: 2 small professionally filled screw holes on the side of the riser (see pic) that are hardly visible. Minor nicks and scratches here and there.

The bad: One epoxy filled drill hole on the back of the bow (probably where a non-factory bushing had once been installed) (see pic). A small crack in grip (see pic). A ding in the riser next to the specs (see pic). A crack in the fiberglass in the middle of the lower face limb (see pic p.8) that does not seem to be fatal. The part of the riser behind the calf-hair side rest plate had been gouged and was filled with epoxy. Thin stress lines in the fade-outs (see pics). No crazing. Short horizontal marks in the upper back limb just below the tips (see pic on p. 5). I see these in about 1% of vintage bows of various makes, especially Bear. These are not horizontal stress lines, but thought to have been caused by a flaw in the resin.
