I've Been to the Paint Store

Martin Luther King Day is January 18, a federal holiday established in 1986 to honor...*a Baptist preacher!* Maybe it's just me, but doesn't that sound an awful lot like a move by the federal government to *establish religion*? You'd think that atheist activists would jump all over that just like they jump all over nativity displays on public grounds and references to God on our coinage and in our Pledge.

Wouldn't that be interesting? On the one hand, you'd have the 'political correctness' of racial inclusiveness and on the other hand, you'd have the 'political correctness' of keeping religion out of the public arena.

MLK Day is one of my favorite ways to poke fun at the inconsistencies of our government. Don't get me wrong: if the government is going to establish a federal holiday to honor a preacher of the gospel, I'm all for it! And think of the opportunity it gives to our teachers who can legitimately introduce their students to a gospel preacher, despite our "separation of church and state" government. Just playing the recording of "I Have a Dream" will expose them to at least four biblical references in a 15-minute speech. That speech was delivered on August 28, 1963 from the steps of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington DC.

Several years ago, there was a movement to have Dr. King's "I Have a Dream" speech included in the canon of scripture. There's no question his speech was inspired by the Holy Spirit, but the movement for canonization didn't gain much traction. Nonetheless, I believe we need Dr. King's words today more than ever. In one of the more powerful hopes from his "I Have a Dream" speech, Dr. King proclaims, "I look to a day when people will not be judged by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character."

Among other things, this past year was marked by the "Black Lives Matter" movement. While I wholeheartedly agree with the statement, I wonder if it calls us back to judging others "by the color of their skin rather than the content of their character"? There's no question that racism is evil, but is emphasizing skin color the best way to end racism? I'd rather emphasize the biblical truth that we're all created in the image of God (Genesis 1:26).

On April 3, 1968, the night before he was assassinated, Dr. King preached another memorable sermon entitled, "I've Been to the Mountaintop." Dr. King may have been to the mountaintop, but I've been to the paint store. Most paint stores provide customers with sample cards showing several different shades of the same color. If I want to paint a room green, I'll pick up a sample chip which will show five different shades of green, some light, others darker. They're simply different shades of the same color.

That's how I look at the color diversity of humanity: we are merely different shades of the same color. I don't say that to diminish anyone's cultural background; rather, I want to emphasize that we're more alike than we are different. I'm not particularly concerned with what color a person might be; but I am concerned with the content of their character. In fact, in my profession, color doesn't really matter, but character does. Tanning booths aside, I cannot control the color of my skin, but I can control the content of my character. (continued on page 2)

Connecting with the Word

As a United Methodist Church, our worship is shaped by the Word of God. To that end, we often follow the Revised Common Lectionary which suggests four scripture lessons for each week. Here are the scriptures which are suggested for each Sunday this month. Please read them as part of your devotions in order to prepare your hearts for worship, whether in-person, on the radio, or on Facebook.

We will not have services on New Year's Day, but the Revised Common Lectionary suggests readings from Ecclesiastes 3:1-13; Psalm 8; Revelation 2:1-7, and Matthew 25:31-46.

At Aledo UMC, we'll begin the year with Epiphany, which celebrates Christ being made known to the Gentiles. The biblical basis for Epiphany is the arrival of the wise men from the East who followed a star to the newborn king. Epiphany always follows the Twelfth Day of Christmas, which is January 5. That means Epiphany is always on January 6. We'll begin 2021 by celebrating the Epiphany of the Lord on Sunday, January 3. Scriptures include Isaiah 60:1-6; Psalm 72; Ephesians 3:1-12, and Matthew 2:1-12. I invite you to celebrate communion virtually by having bread and juice—preferably grape juice—handy. The elements may not be properly consecrated, but Christ will be properly remembered. That, after all, is the point of communion.

By the time we worship together on January 10, Christ will have grown into adulthood and will be baptized by John. Scriptures include Genesis 1:1-5; Psalm 29; Mark 1:4-11 and Acts 19:1-7.

In the United Methodist Church, Sunday, January 18 is Human Relations Day because it ties in with Dr. Martin Luther King Day. Scriptures include 1 Samuel 3:1-20; Psalm 139; 1 Corinthians 6:12-20 and John 1:43-51.

Scriptures suggested for Sunday, January 24 include Jonah 3:1-5, 10; Psalm 62; 1 Corinthians 7:29-31, and Mark 1:14-20.

We wrap up the month on January 31 with readings from Deuteronomy 18:15-20; Psalm 111; 1 Corinthians 8:1-13 and Mark 1:21-28.

Light at the End of the Tunnel

Due to the current rise in Covid-19 infections across our state, Aledo UMC will continue to suspend in-person worship through the month of January. This action is taken in response to a December 9 letter issued by Bishop Frank Beard of the Illinois Great Rivers Conference. This follows a November letter from our Bishop in which he wrote, "I am instructing our churches not to meet for indoor worship for the next four weeks" (November 22 through December 13). That letter went on to say that on December 9, he and the cabinet would decide how churches should proceed thereafter.

On Wednesday, December 9, Bishop Beard issued that letter, stating, "I encourage pastors and laity to continue to provide virtual worship..." and "I strongly recommend that pastors across the IGRC refrain from in-person worship in our church buildings and facilities."

Now let me digress for a bit. For five years, I was a part-time hospice chaplain for Blessing Hospice in Pike County. One of the reasons I was a hospice chaplain is because Medicare required Blessing Hospice to include spiritual care for its patients. That is because Medicare understood the importance of spiritual care for a variety of reasons.

I am fully aware of the ongoing harmful impact of this pandemic. Much has been cited concerning its harmful effect on the economy, including the loss of jobs and businesses. Much has also been cited concerning its harmful effect on mental health. Unfortunately, not as much as been cited about the harmful effect on the spiritual lives of people. Many have argued for churches to be reopened because of the financial harm they are experiencing, and while that is true for many, many churches, I believe that it is more important for churches to reopen for the spiritual well-being of people.

With that in mind, I've noticed a change in tenor in Bishop Beard's letters. In November, we pastors were *instructed* not to meet for indoor worship. That's a clear and strong directive. However, his December 9 letter *recommends* that we refrain from in-person worship and *encourages* us to continue virtual worship. That's a bit more flexible. Nonetheless, Aledo UMC will stick to virtual worship through January with one service streamed live on Facebook at 9:15 am and broadcast weekly on WRMJ Radio. However, as pastor, I am reserving the right to invite a limited number of persons to attend our 9:15 am worship service. Worshippers will be required to wear a mask and socially distance themselves from others. For those of you who suspect that I might be playing favorites, please know that you will be right. I will be playing favorites. But please also know that I have over 500 favorites living in Mercer County. Unfortunately, I can't invite them all.

If you can possibly participate in our worship through Facebook or WRMJ, please continue doing so. But if you would like to be considered for an invitation, please contact me.

I pray that once we get past Christmas and traveling dies down, we will be able to resume limited in-person worship in February. If that happens, we will likely resume three services because it better facilitates social distancing. I will keep you posted.

Winter Safety Tips from your AUMC Safety Team

Choose Appropriate Clothing:

- Avoid boots or shoes with smooth plastic or leather soles; boots made of non-slip rubber or neoprene with grooved soles are best.
- Wear a heavy, bulky coat that will cushion you if you should fall.
- Wear a bright scarf or hat so drivers can see you, but make sure it doesn't block your vision or hearing.
- Wear sunglasses during the day to help you see better.

Walking Over Ice:

- In cold temperatures, assume that all wet, dark areas on pavements are slippery and icy and approach with caution. Dew or water vapor can freeze on cold surfaces, forming an extra-thin, nearly invisible layer of ice that can look like a wet spot on the pavement.
- Walk in designated walkways as much as possible.
- Point your feet out slightly *like a penguin!* Spreading your feet out slightly while walking on ice increases your center of gravity.
- Bend slightly and walk flat-footed with your center of gravity directly over the feet as much as possible.
- Extend your arms out to your sides to maintain balance. Keep your hands out of your pockets. You can help break your fall with your hands free if you do start to slip.
- Watch where you are stepping and GO S-L-O-W-L-Y.
- When walking on steps, always use the hand railings and plant your feet firmly on each step.
- Use special care when entering and exiting vehicles; use the vehicle for support.
- Take short steps or shuffle for stability. It also helps to stop occasionally to break momentum.

Indoor Safety:

- Walking over slippery floors can be just as dangerous as walking over ice!
- Remove as much snow and water from your boots as you can when entering a building.
- Notice that floors and stairs may be wet and slippery—walk carefully especially by outer doors.

If You Should Fall:

- Try to avoid landing on your knees, wrists, or spine. Try to fall on a fleshy part of your body, such as your side.
- Try to relax your muscles if you fall. You'll injure yourself less if you are relaxed.
- If you fall backward, make a conscious effort to tuck your chin so your head won't hit the ground with full force.
