As most Pepsi-Cola Collectors know, Pepsi-Cola was created in 1898 in New Bern, NC. That makes the 100th anniversary just 3 years away. In recognition of this historical event a number of organizations are planning activities, including the PCCC. It is the desire of the Express to keep club members informed of every aspect of the 100th anniversary celebration. To accomplish this we will add a new section to the newsletter called "Countdown to the 100th." We will highlight the achievements of Pepsi-Cola and its bottlers over the past century.

As part of the effort to celebrate the Pepsi-Cola centennial, the Minges Family has purchased the Tom Avery Pepsi-Cola collection with plans of having a museum built in New Bern, North Carolina in conjunction with the 100th anniversary.

The Minges own three Pepsi-Cola franchises in North Carolina - Greenville, Kinston, and New Bern. Their family has played a significant role not only in Pepsi's history, but in the soft drink history as well. They believe owning the franchise where Pepsi began gives them an added responsibility for preserving Pepsi's history and they do so gladly.

building where Caleb Bradham's original drug store stood. This was the exact location where Pepsi-Cola was created. (See drug store article below).

BRADHAM'S PHARMACY

Before there was Pepsi-Cola there was Bradham's Pharmacy - just one of the thousands of mom and pop type drug stores scattered across America. Financially unable to complete his education in medicine, Caleb Bradham opted for a career a merchant - first in partnership with Thomas Gates in a feed store and later in 1893 as owner-operator of his own drug store. At the time no one realized what a pivotal event this was, not only in business history but in American history as well.

It was in this drug store that Caleb Bradham first began experimenting with remedies for various ailments. Using herbs, oils, and extracts, eventually Mr. Bradham concocted a flavor his friends referred to as "Brad's Drink."

The following ads were printed between 1896 and 1902 by Bradham to stimulate sales of his patent medicines at his drug store or by mail order.

BRADHAM'S PRESCRIPTION PHARMACY TAKING PRECEDENCE

Over all other functions of this store is our Prescription Department, and we feel that it has demonstrated its position with considerable emphasis as compared with other prescription departments.

The fact that our R trade steadily and continually increases week after week the year 'round goes to further establish our position as meriting your exclusive trade.

The appliances, equipments and conveniences are of the most modern adaptation. Nothing is wanting that could assist us in rendering a better

service. We invite you to bring all your Prescriptions to Bradham's Pharmacy to be filled.



The Golden Era of Pepsi Memorabilia

Over the years I've wondered why there seems to be a preponderance of memorabilia from certain dates and very little to none from other periods. I've come to the conclusion that it has to do with two different entities - economics and luck.

Economics simply means that during prosperous times the Pepsi-Cola Company produced more advertising materials which increased the odds of more items surviving.

The luck factor has to do with the fact that in some eras where very little was produced, a significant number of artifacts managed to survive over time.

The first piece of evidence to support my theory is the increase of Pepsi bottlers from 40 in 1907 to 280 in 1910. This increase is paralled by an increase in point of purchase advertising material. The material produced during this era is the most plentiful available today from the New Bern era.

A number of signs and bottles survived from the Richmond Pepsi-Cola Company which had financial problems from the very beginning. The fact that so much survived from this era is luck.


With the introduction of the 12 ounce bottle for a nickel in 1934, Pepsi was an overnight success. By 1939 profits were rolling in. Thus began the golden era of Pepsi-Cola point of purchase advertising. Because of World War II, this era only lasted from 1939 until 1942, but this was some of the best material produced.

Congratulations to James Ayers on his new book <u>Pepsi: Cola Bottles.</u>


This is the first collectors book that is dedicated exclusively to Pepsi-Cola bottles. James did a scholarly job on his identification and description of each bottle. The photography is excellent and the color makes the bottles easily distinguishable. He deals primarily with bottles from 1905 thru 1939 - but there are some newer bottles included. The book is arranged in alphabetical order based on the city embossed on the bottle. Each bottle is priced as well as given a rarity rating. I heartily recommend this book to the novice as well as the experienced Pepsi bottle collector.



As most of us know, Pepsi-Cola the drink began in 1898, but it wasn't until 1902 that we have any evidence of Pepsi-Cola being advertised. Over the next 38 years Pepsi-Cola suffered many economic ups and downs which resulted in a disjointed advertising program. Some years it was professionally organized and managed, other times it was really the bottlers that spearheaded what advertisement there was.

The success of the 12 ounce bottle in the 1930's insured Pepsi-Cola would be a dominant factor in the soft drink business. The legal problems that had plagued Pepsi since the early 1930's were resolved by 1939. The time was right for Pepsi to develop a national advertising strategy. So in 1940 Pepsi-Cola introduced their first new logo in over a decade. This new logo was called the flag design. This face lift of the Pepsi-Cola logo was an effort to standardize both print media advertising as well as in store point of purchase advertising.

No longer were bottlers free to create their own advertisement. They were told to use the programs created by the parent company. Therefore from the 1940's on Pepsi began developing a uniformity to their advertising, packaging, and delivery vehicles. In the 1940's the Pepsi-Cola logo evoked from the flag design to the crown logo. The flag design was used from 1940-1945.

In 1943 and 1944 a variation of the flag design, the oval, was also used. The crown design was used from 1945 thru 1950. The dates used represent when significant changes in the logo occurred but in no way can they represent the exact date the changes took place. Sometimes the older logo was used in conjunction with the newer logo.

These variations and changes of the logo are important keys to dating your Pepsi-Cola collectables.




1940 FLAG LOGO

COLLECTOR INFORMATION

To frame or not to frame - that is the question?

If done correctly, framing is the best way to protect and preserve your Pepsi-Cola cardboard and paper collectables. Unfortunately too many picture framers are only interested in enhancing the beauty of an item, and not protecting it from the environment. Here is a simple guide of what to look for when having your Pepsi pieces framed.

- 1. Know your framer use an established, reputable picture framing company.
- 2. Use acid free matting material acid free is more expensive but it will lessen the chances of the matting harming your sign.
- 3. Spacing the mat board must create a space between the glass and the piece being framed. Changes in temperature could cause damage to the collectable.
- 4. Do not mount permanently if a piece has to be mounted on a mat board before it is framed, do not let the framer use anything permanent such as glue as this will hurt the value of the item.
- 5. Use Plexiglass the use of Plexiglass has become more popular for picture framing in recent years. If by any chance the glass in the frame should get broken it could damage a very valuable Pepsi-Cola collectable. Plexiglass will not break and damage your items.

These are guidelines for framing your collectables. I am not an expert in this field but I hope these suggestions are helpful to you. For best results get to know your framer and when you're not sure - ask questions!

Quality framing can add significant value to your Pepsi collectable. The cost of framing can run into hundreds of dollars. This is important to keep in mind when purchasing a piece that has already been framed. If framed incorrectly, the frame adds no value or can even decrease the value if the piece is permanently mounted.

Sometimes I hear collectors complaining about the lack of old Pepsi-Cola memorabilia available. For the most part they are right. However, that is what makes collecting Pepsi-Cola special. Due to so many fluctuations in the economic health of Pepsi-Cola, there was never the quantity of items produced that were produced by that cola company from Atlanta. The rarity of Pepsi-Cola collectables adds to the excitement of the hunt.

I've been collecting Pepsi-Cola memorabilia seventeen years and I'm more excited about this hobby than I've ever been. When I first started collecting nobody knew what items were available and fewer people had any Pepsi memorabilia for sale. Today there are numerous books showing many of the items available but there aren't any books that show all the items produced.

This past weekend I attended a local collectables show that I have been going to for a number of years. In the past few years this show has been almost barren of Pepsi memorabilia. But the drought came to an end this past weekend. The frustration of attending this show without finding anything suddenly ended. In the space of thirty minutes I found three 1940's vintage Pepsi-Cola cardboard signs that I had never even seen before!

It is finds like this that renew the spirit and makes all the futile searches worthwhile.

The state of Pepsi collecting has never been better. There has never been a more exciting time to be a Pepsi collector than right now.

SAVE THE CROWNS

One of the most interesting Pepsi-Cola items to collect are Pepsi-Cola crowns also known as bottle caps. Crowns have been around almost since the very beginning of Pepsi. The crown that most people are familiar with is the crown with cork on the underside. this crown was developed at the turn of the century. William Painter was the inventor who revolutionized the bottle industry with single use crowns.

The early Pepsi-Cola crowns are hard to find but are very interesting because of the colors. The earliest Pepsi crown was basically all blue with the Pepsi script in white, this crown was used from 1905 until 1923. From 1923 until 1929 an orange crown with Pepsi script was used, this crown is associated with Pepsi-Cola having their headquarters in Richmond Virginia. The 1929-1930 was green with Pepsi script also from Richmond Virginia. After Pepsi relocated to New York the crown became red and orange. About 1943 the color of the crown changed to red, white and blue.

During the 1940's Pepsi began printing under the crown various words these words were used in association with contests. There were contests to spell "Pepsi" and contests to collect various crowns. The memorabilia associated with these contests are very collectible.

Some states put their tax stamps on the crowns which creates variations of crowns. When Pepsi changed logos, logos on the crown also changed. In modern time the crown s have become twist caps. So as you see the crown offers challenge and opportunity to every Pepsi collector.



BRADHAM GRAVE SITE

Two years ago I had a chance to interview George Bradham, son of Caleb Bradham - inventor of Pepsi-Cola. During that meeting Mr. Bradham shared with me that he had always wanted to place a marker at his father's grave site with the Pepsi-Cola name engraved on a stone. To honor his wish I made this a club project. Last year at Pepsi-Fest we had a raffle with the proceeds going to pay for this marker. Because we wanted to use the Pepsi-Cola script we had to have Pepsi-Cola's permission, which was immediately granted. We also had to find a stone engraver who could replicate the script. After accomplishing this we were finally able to have the stone placed at the grave site this past June. For the club to have participated in making this monument to Caleb Bradham possible is one of our proudest accomplishments. Thanks to John Minges of Pepsi-Cola Bottling Co. of Greenville, NC who helped make this happen.


