Give Up or Hang Tough?



When I travel to Nigeria, I mostly fly into and out of Lagos and spend the last two days or so with a family there. I did so on my recent trip. On the morning of my last day (the flight was in the night), as I was repacking my things and getting ready to go out on some last minute errands, their last born, a ten year old boy, came into the room. As we conversed, he casually mentioned that their neighbor's son who had just returned from the USA

came home with a Nintendo. Minutes later, he informed me that the Nintendo was a 3D. His eyes were glowing as he spoke. I knew what was coming and it didn't take long: He wanted a Nintendo, any Nintendo, but a 3D would be an unbelievable dream come true. His eyes glowed even more. Fast forward to 30 minutes later and he was still at it. One hour later and he was still at it without any signs of slowing down. His elder sister, who probably was well aware of his desire, found a way to distract and get him out of the house. Well, he was back in less than a half hour, with the neighbor, who proudly displayed his 3D Nintendo to both of us. My friend's kid reminded me that it came from USA. To my surprise, he never really asked me directly to get one for him. He just kept repeating his dream, knowing that I live in the USA. Next, he told me that he wouldn't mind a used one. I was glad when I finally left the house to finish up some business.

When I returned so did the child, this time, he was singing about how much he needed a Nintendo - a 3D Nintendo, or just any Nintendo. It was actually so amusing that I joined him in making up a song about how much he needed a Nintendo. I think he stopped only when his parents came home from work and sent him on an errand.

Jesus asks us to never give up when we ask God for something. The more important it is to us, the more we should persist. Our prayers never go unanswered. Unlike me who couldn't afford a Nintendo for the boy, God is able to provide all our needs. Like me who knows that the boy had other more urgent needs than Nintendo, God knows and understands the hierarchy of needs his children yearn for. The kid hung tough in making his desire known. I'm sure he's still telling anyone that cares to listen. We should hang tough too and not despair or give up. If his parents were rich enough to buy him a 3D Nintendo, I'm sure they'd buy it for him. "If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father who is in heaven give good things to those who ask him!" (Matthew 7:11). St. Paul encourages us to pray without ceasing (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18).

JOHN OF CAPISTRANO PRIEST (1386-1456) OCTOBER 23RD

It has been said the Christian saints are the world's greatest optimists. Not blind to the existence and consequences of evil, they base their confidence on the power of Christ's redemption. The power of conversion through Christ extends not only to sinful people but also to calamitous events.

Imagine being born in the fourteenth century. One-third of the population and nearly forty percent of the clergy were wiped out by the bubonic plague. The Western Schism split the church with two or three claimants to the Holy See at one time. England and France were at war. The citystates of Italy were constantly in conflict. No wonder that gloom dominated the spirit of the culture and the times.

John Capistrano was born in 1386. His education was thorough. His talents and success were great. When he was twenty-six he was made governor of Perugia. Imprisoned after a battle against the Malatestas, he resolved to change his way of life completely. At the age of thirty he entered the Franciscan novitiate and was ordained a priest four years later.

His preaching attracted great throngs at a time of religious apathy and confusion. He and twelve Franciscan brethren were received in the countries of central Europe as angels of God. They were instrumental in reviving a dying faith and devotion.

The Franciscan Order itself was in turmoil over the interpretation and observance of the rule of St. Francis. Through John's tireless efforts and his expertise in law, the heretical Fraticelli were suppressed and the "Spirituals" were freed from the interference to their stricter observance.

He helped bring about a reunion with the Greek and Armenian Churches, unfortunately only a brief arrangement.

When the Turks captured Constantinople in 1453, he was commissioned to preach a crusade for the defense of Europe. Gaining little response in Bavaria and Austria, he decided to concentrate his efforts in Hungary. He led the army to Belgrade. Under the great General Janos Hunyadi, they gained an overwhelming victory, and the siege of Belgrade was lifted. Worn out by his superhuman efforts, Capistrano was an easy prey to the infection bred by the refuse of battle. He died October 23, 1456.

COMMENT: John Hofer, a biographer of John Capistrano, recalls a Brussels organization named after the saint. Seeking to solve life problems in a fully Christian spirit, its motto was: "Initiative, Organization, Activity." These three words characterized John's life. He was not one to sit around, ever. His deep Christian optimism drove him to battle problems at all levels with the confidence engendered by a deep faith in Christ.

QUOTE: On the saint's tomb in the Croatian town of Ilok, the governor had this message inscribed: "This tomb holds John, by birth of Capistrano, a man worthy of all praise, defender and promoter of the faith, guardian of the church, zealous protector of his Order, an ornament to all the world, lover of truth and religious justice, mirror of life, surest guide in doctrine; praised by countless tongues, he reigns blessed in heaven." That is a fitting epitaph for a real and successful optimist.
