27th Sunday Ordinary Year B Mark 10:2-16



The Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, "Is it lawful for a husband to divorce his wife?" They were testing him. He said to them in reply, "What did Moses command you?" They replied, "Moses permitted a husband to write a bill of divorce and dismiss her." But Jesus told them, "Because of the hardness of your hearts he wrote you this commandment. But from beginning of creation, God made them male and female. For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh. So they are no longer two but one flesh. Therefore what God has joined together, no human being must separate." In the house the disciples again questioned Jesus about this. He said to them, "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; and if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery." And people were bringing children to him that he might touch them, but the disciples rebuked them. When Jesus saw this he became indignant and said to them, "Let the children come to me; do not prevent them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. Amen, I say to you, whoever does not accept the kingdom of God like a child will not enter it." Then he embraced them and blessed them, placing his hands on them.

Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches, 27th Sunday Ordinary Time Year B Mark 10:2-16

"Please, for the kids!" Jesus is confronting the issue of broken marriage and divorce from the perspective of the 'helpless ones'-the children. This is the same approach Jesus uses when addressing the health of a society too. The measure of a society's holiness is determined by how the weakest and most vulnerable members are cared for and treated (like the proverb, '*the chain is only as strong as its weakest link*'). As Jesus is tested by the Pharisees and pulled into a debate about divorce, Jesus begins His contribution to this controversy by quoting the first book of the Bible ('God's original intention') and ends with a summary symbolic gesture. He lifts up and embraces a child, saying, "The kingdom of God belongs to such as these" (Mark 10:14). Jesus is putting the vulnerable child at the center of the discussion, and basically says, "Marriage's fruit is children and family life, so we must do all we can to protect marriage and further it to grow." I think we can all understand the hurtful drama in divorce Jesus is trying to prevent.

Like REM sang back in the 1990's 'Everybody Hurts'. But in broken marriages, who hurts the most? The children who are least able to cope and adjust. Are the parents hurt and broken too? Yes, but as adults who have been in this world longer than children, we assume they have more emotional tools/resources to accept hurt and grow from it. Not so with a child. This is why Jesus embraces and places the child's well-being in the center of this discussion. But unfortunately, we hear about the Pharisees' motive in even bringing up this issue, and that motive is to 'test him' (Mark 10:2) so the Pharisees too, are not thinking at all of hurting children. So sad it is, that the Pharisees are exploiting the pain of divorced persons and broken families to score points and make Jesus look bad by pitting Him against Moses. The Pharisees knew the teaching of Moses (Matt 23:2), and knew that Jesus taught a purer, more sacred bond of marriage between husband and wife (our Catholic teaching calls it the 'permanence and indissolubility of valid marriage bond'). Jesus quotes as the authority for His position what God the Creator intended from the beginning, which was the lifelong partnership of man/woman in marriage. This 'two become one' is the fruit of their relations; it is born in the child (each new child is the one). So Jesus was saying, 'protect the unity and exclusivity of marriage' for the sake of the vulnerable child's (its fruit). In a marriage, the child is the most susceptible to hurt from threats/infidelities. This is why Jesus quotes what we call the Book of Genesis, to remind the Pharisees of the Creator's original intention for marriage: One man and one woman in lifelong partnership. Of course, breakdowns in marriage did not begin only in Moses' time (who allowed 'divorce' by a special decree). We find in the Old Testament earlier instances of abuses of the 'exclusive and singular' marriage bond. For example, we can read about 'polygamy-many wives (1 Kings 11:3) or 'physical insemination surrogacy' with Abraham Sarah & Hagar (Genesis 16:1-16) and Jacob Rachel & Bihah (Genesis 30:3) that pulls their marriage and family apart. So, when Jesus quotes the beginning of the Bible and God's original design of human marriage, He was simply calling for a return to a more sacred and exclusive exercise of marriage as between one husband and one wife (for life-permanent). So, following Jesus means that we also work for such protections and support of holy and fruitful marriage.

Yes, the reality we face today is that everyone is affected by the pain and division of divorce. If not our own selves, then maybe a parent, sibling or close friend (or many) are suffering from a fallen-apart marriage and the ongoing struggles with custody and family settlement issues. We all have to pray for and support the healing and restoration of marriage bonds (reconciliation if possible, and healing/recovery for everyone if not). As people of hope, we turn to our compassionate Savior Jesus who 'is our peace, He who made both, one, and broke down the dividing wall of enmity...' (Ephesians 2:14). I take comfort in seeing that Jesus conducted a 'broken marriage ministry' Himself when He embraced and offered forgiveness to the woman dragged before Him for stoning in John 8:11. He called her to personal fidelity to support the marriage bond, and He also confronted the chauvinist and exploitative 'elder or elders' who had used her (regularly!) and wanted Jesus to cover up (with rocks!) their abuse of her (John 8:7, 9). Another wonderful example of Jesus' realistic, yet compassionate concern for the protection of the marriage bond came when he confronted the Woman at the Well's casual approach to marriage. Jesus wished to heal her heart and converting her understanding of marriage from 'comfortable convenience' to 'committed covenant' (John 4:16-18). So, we all have a contribution of supportive prayer and cultivating respect for the most sacred marriage and family bond, as a sign of our society's protection of children and a signal of our level of social trust among us. As always, it comes down to following Jesus! Peace, Fr Brian
