Praise the Lord for His Amazing Victory

The LORD is my strength and my defense; he has become my salvation. He is my God, and I will praise him, my father's God, and I will exalt him. The LORD is a warrior; the LORD is his name. Pharaoh's chariots and his army he has hurled into the sea.

Exodus 15:2-4

There are many times in life when someone might believe that they will never see or feel anything good ever again—someone who has lost a loved one; someone who struggles with an addiction; someone who has lost a job, a friend, or a fortune. A person can begin to believe that there is no hope.

In Exodus 14, the nation of Israel wasn't far from the land God had promised them. But coming after them was a well-trained Egyptian army very eager to destroy them, and right in front of them was a large body of water blocking the way to their freedom. But they learned that just because you can't see how anything good can happen doesn't mean it can't.

In Exodus 15, Moses and the Israelites sing a song of praise to God for opening a way to freedom that they never saw coming. God showed Israel that he was with them, and that he was fighting for them, when he divided the waters of the sea, allowing Israel to walk to safety before bringing the waters together again to destroy the enemy that was pursing them.

You may never be caught between an Egyptian army and a body of water as large as the Red Sea. But the same God who delivered the Israelites has provided a way for you to enter an even greater Promised Land. Through the perfect life, sacrificial death, and resurrection of Jesus, God has guaranteed that your enemies of sin and death will not keep you from the one place where there is no more pain and where every tear is wiped away.

Maybe you have days when it doesn't feel like you're on your way there. But that doesn't mean you aren't. Because of Jesus, you are.

Prayer:

Father in heaven, we praise you for making a way to heaven that we could never find on our own. May our hearts and lips forever praise you for the gift of salvation. Amen.

Pastor Rieke was born and raised in Tomah, Wisconsin. He attended Lutheran elementary school in Tomah and high school at Luther High School in Onalaska. After graduating from Northwestern College in Watertown, he attended Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary.

During his seminary years, he was united in marriage with Sue, a music teacher. They have been blessed with five children: Colin, a pastor in Palos Heights, IL; Erin Pigeon, a nurse in Tucson, AZ; Cara Lukasek, an academic counselor for the Marine Corps in Iwakuni, Japan; Sara, a teacher in Shanghai, China; and Laura, who is completing a masters degree and will teach in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam during the next school year. They have also been blessed with six grandchildren.

After his seminary training, Pastor and Sue were assigned to serve in the WELS mission in Central Africa. After more than twenty years in Zambia and Malawi, they returned to the USA and served Immanuel Lutheran Church in La Crosse, WI for nearly 10 years.

For the last seven years, Pastor and Sue served the WELS sister church in India. Pastor was the field coordinator and head of the worker training program while Sue taught English and administered children's homes and a Lutheran elementary school. Since it is now impossible for them to continue to work in India, they are patiently waiting for a call to serve the Lord in some other location.

Thursdays—After the evening service in the church basement.


Fridays—Before School in the school lobby.


God's Word Works

MEASLES – TO VACCINATE OR NOT?

Measles is a very contagious disease caused by a virus. It spreads through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes. Measles starts with a cough, runny nose, red eyes, and fever. Then a rash of tiny, red spots breaks out. It starts at the head and spreads to the rest of the body.

Measles can be prevented with MMR vaccine. The vaccine protects against three diseases: measles, mumps, and rubella. CDC recommends children get two doses of MMR vaccine, starting with the first dose at 12 through 15 months of age, and the second dose at 4 through 6 years of age. Teens and adults should also be up to date on their MMR vaccination.

The MMR vaccine is very safe and effective. Two doses of MMR vaccine are about 97% effective at preventing measles; one dose is about 93% effective.

Before the measles vaccination program started in 1963, an estimated 3 to 4 million people got measles each year in the United States. Of these, approximately 500,000 cases were reported each year to CDC; of these, 400 to 500 died, 48,000 were hospitalized, and 1,000 developed encephalitis (brain swelling) from measles. Since then, widespread use of measles virus-containing vaccine has led to a greater than 99% reduction in measles cases compared with the pre-vaccine era. However, measles is still common in other countries. Unvaccinated people continue to get measles while abroad and bring the disease into the United States and spread it to others. 

Rally News

At the time of this writing, the LWMS Spring Rally has yet to take place so watch for a brief summary in the next edition of our church's Welcome!

Central Africa Medical Mission - Malawi

Greetings to all our brothers and sisters in Christ! You have heard by now about the severe rains, cyclone and flooding in southern Malawi. Please continue to pray for recovery efforts here, as well as in Mozambique and Zimbabwe. One of our staff has family in Nsanje, who were blessed not to lose their home but have nothing to eat as their entire maize and rice crop was destroyed. He says that maize is available in the next district, but the price has increased, and it is difficult to obtain. Our mission here is supporting congregations in the south with the help of Christian Aid and Relief and other local organizations. We are also concerned for those in the midwestern US where farmers are so hard hit by the floods there, and continue to pray for those families.

Here in Lilongwe we have finally had some dry, sunny days, and had no problems getting to our remote clinics this week. We were not as affected by the storms here in the Central Region, other than the initial power outages and nonstop rain. Our patients somehow still make it to clinic, even when muddy roads are so slippery one can barely walk or ride a bike on them! The main effect of the rainy season is an upsurge of malaria cases. With all the rain, there is standing water where the female Anopheles mosquito larvae develop into the insects that transmit the malaria parasite through their bite to a human. The parasite spends part of its life cycle in the liver, then enters red blood cells for another growth phase where the red cell ruptures, releasing the mature parasites to the bloodstream where a mosquito will ingest it with a blood meal. The parasite reproduces within the mosquito, and the tiny immature parasites end up getting injected into another human when they are bitten. The more mosquitos, the more malaria.

How does this affect our patients? Fever, headache, lethargy, body pain, vomiting and diarrhea, and cough can all be present. It's the children who seem to suffer the most. We see them lying on the concrete when we arrive, covered with a chitenje cloth, barely able to stand, often with high fevers. Their mothers carry even older children on their backs to get them to us and arrive exhausted and sweating. Our staff does the rapid test (MRDT) for malaria. Unlike many rural clinics, the Lutheran Mobile Clinic has the oral medication to treat malaria in infants through adults. Malaria can be life-threatening when not treated early as it can cause severe anemia, seizures, and very low blood sugar. We are able to check patients' hemoglobin and blood sugar levels. They are assessed for secondary infections such as pneumonia. We give injectable medication for these severe cases and refer them to the government hospital. In March, our four clinics treated over 800 patients with malaria.

Our nurse-midwives give insecticide treated mosquito nets to pregnant women as well as antimalarial medicines. Our patients are taught about how to prevent malaria and how to recognize symptoms. We are grateful to be able to relieve some of the suffering, and save lives through your prayers and donations. I'm reminded this Lenten season of the eternal life that is theirs through faith in Christ and the urgency of continuing to spread the gospel throughout the world. Have a blessed Easter!

A great idea and one that involved little cost and brought smiles to the recipients. If you are interested in ongoing project ideas, please feel free to contact me.

The season is upon us to once again rejoice in the Savior who won our eternal salvation and victory over death for all believers. On behalf of CAMM, thank you for your love, support and prayers that allow us to share this saving message thru the Christ centered healthcare our clinics are able to carry out because of our gracious God and all of you.

Merging for mission

Three congregations become a multi-site as they work to spread the gospel in South Florida.

It started with three congregations—all with their own unique situation—having the same goal: to find a way to spread the gospel further in South Florida.

Pompano, Pompano Beach, Florida, was struggling to get new members, its church was in disrepair, and its location left much to be desired. Yet it wasn't ready to close, to give up on sharing the gospel message.

Hope, W. Palm Beach, Florida, was pulling in members from all over South Florida and dreamed of daughtering a congregation to extend the gospel's reach, but it didn't have quite enough resources to take the leap.

Divine Savior, Doral, Florida, had just finished adding on to its campus and was blessed financially with an enrollment of more than nine hundred students from PreK-3 to 12th grade. With an outreach focus, they thought they might eventually start another site in the Miami area.

As the only three congregations left in South Florida, they all came to the same conclusion. "We realized we could do more ministry together than we could by ourselves," says John Boggs, pastor in W. Palm Beach.

This led to the formation of a new multi-site ministry under the name of Divine Savior and a new church and school in Delray Beach, Florida. "Satan is trying everything he can to make ministry work as difficult as possible in south Florida, but God is bigger than Satan," says Boggs. "Us joining together is giving us more of an opportunity not only to survive in this ministry down here but to thrive in it and to exponentially grow the ministry of grace God has entrusted to us."

Facing struggles

Started in the 1960s, Ocean Drive Lutheran Church in Pompano Beach worked hard to reach out into its community, even starting an early childhood ministry in the late 1970s. But the school closed in 1993, and membership numbers began declining.

With a name change in the 2000s and a goal to become "Your neighborhood church," Pompano continued to try to make inroads into its community. But with a location offset from the main throughway and in a neighborhood filled with transient residents, outreach was difficult. "No matter what we tried, it was just not yielding the results we were hoping for in terms of bringing in new souls," says Patrick Lockwitz, a member at Pompano.

With membership declining and a church in need of repairs, the congregation began facing financial problems. With the help of a WELS mission counselor, it began conducting demographic studies and collecting data to determine what it should do next. In 2014, it was looking at three options: rent the building out to another ministry, have its pastor become part time, or sell its building and relocate. "It was the reality. Nothing was bringing in people. Work was wearing [members] down. The facility was falling apart. It was a cycle happening over and over again. Something had to change—it was going to take something drastic," says Lockwitz.

Forging partnerships

In its studies, Pompano learned that many areas on South Florida were in need of good education options. The congregation began talking to Divine Savior in Doral, located an hour south, about the process of opening a school—buying land, constructing a building, financing. "We said, 'You have already done this in Doral. Can you help us navigate this in Coral Springs?' " says Lockwitz, referring to a nearby city.

At the same time, Pompano's pastor decided to take a call, and Divine Savior's pastors took on the vacancy. "When you're at the end of the map, you just hang tighter together," says Carlos Leyrer, president of Divine Savior Ministries. "If we didn't do something, we knew how the story ended. We needed a new ministry plan."

That "something" was the start of Divine Savior and Pompano working together—an event that would eventually lead the Pompano congregation to join Divine Savior Ministries. Pompano put its church on the market and started meeting in a hotel room in nearby Coral Springs, a more stable, family-oriented neighborhood primed for Christian education.

Land search for a permanent location began, and when the search turned up options in nearby Palm Beach County, Hope, W. Palm Beach, also joined the discussion, because it had already been looking to start a church in that area.

The three congregations settled on a great location in Delray Beach, Florida, about 20 miles south of W. Palm Beach. With grants and loans from WELS Church Extension Fund, land was purchased, and building began. Pompano members closed their church and along with several families from W. Palm Beach became the core group of this new mission. The South Atlantic District Mission Board called Joel Schulz to plant this new church. On Oct. 29, 2017, the congregations celebrated an official merger under the name of Divine Savior.

Boggs says this was a group effort with each congregation having a role: Pompano provided starting cash from the sale of its old church property; Doral brought in the systems and financial backing; and Hope added a growing, stable, experienced ministry to help the mission church. "We had three different sites, offering three different things," says Boggs. "None of us was going to be able to do this by ourselves but together we were able to start a congregation in an area of South Florida that desperately needed the gospel to be proclaimed."

Moving forward

A little less than a year after the merger, Divine Savior–Delray Beach dedicated its new school building. Although zoning issues and construction delays pushed back its original timeline for the opening of its academy, the congregation is excited to settle into its new home and move forward with its mission. For former Pompano members it had been almost three years of meeting in hotel rooms in Coral Springs and hotels and a movie theater in Delray. "It might take me a couple of years to get used to this being our permanent home," says Lockwitz.

Pompano's cross, altar, and baptismal font adorn the front of the worship space. "It means a lot for them to have that," says Schulz, who spent months after he arrived visiting all the former Pompano members.

But the new congregation isn't focusing on the past. "We're always forging forward," says Lockwitz. He says being part of a multi-site ministry provides the support—both financially and spiritually—to get the work done. "It's not like we're living in our own Delray Beach campus. It's a regional thing. . . . Now we're able to do the mission planning as we think it needs to be done. We

have enough resources and expertise across all the different facets of ministry. It feels like the burden has been lifted off our backs."

With 75 people in worship on Sunday, an excited outreach team, an academy poised for growth, and collaboration with other Divine Savior Ministries sites, the congregation at Delray Beach is ready to put Divine Savior's mission statement into action: "Changing lives with Jesus as we worship, connect, and serve."


