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FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

My mind is reeling as I begin to write this to you on June 5, 2017. A mere 10 days ago, riders on the MAX were traveling along to a myriad of places. Maybe it was work, school, shopping, visiting friends or family, meeting someone at the airport, off to the Zoo for a fun time??? Who knows for sure. But what we do know for sure is that a tragedy erupted. Lives lost, injuries, both physical and mental that will last a life time. Many of you have already read much about the racist taunts and slurs aimed at two girls, ages 16 and 17, that led to Jeremy Christian stabbing two men to death and gravely wounding another as the three men tried to intervene.

How can anyone make sense of this kind of event? Frankly, we can't. Both of the targeted teenage girls attend David Douglas High School. I am very impressed with the David Douglas Superintendent Ken Richardson and the David Douglas High School Principal, John Bier. As leaders who teach others by example, their actions stand out to me as exemplary. I am often touched by the ways in which teachers, aides, principals, and administrators in our local schools have such a lasting and often lifelong impact on our children. I am just guessing here, but I will bet that the event on the MAX train <u>AND</u> what has happened since will not only be remembered by the general public, but will be a pivotal event for many students.

The East Portland high school is one of the poorest and most diverse in Oregon. There are roughly 3,000 students at David Douglas High School and over 50 different languages spoken in their homes. After just celebrating Pentecost yesterday in worship, I can't help but think about the scripture from the Book of Acts, Chapter 2: 5-6... "People from every nation under heaven were dwelling in Jerusalem. At the loud sound, all the people came together, and they were bewildered because each one could hear what was being said in their own language." It is indeed an amazing thing, to hear what is being said even when the language you speak is not the same. I wish and hope and pray for all of us to have that kind of hearing. The kind of hearing, that we can know the human experience of every one of our brothers and sisters, and always treat them with love and compassion.

"The 16- and 17- year old girls need time and community support to heal", Ken Richardson (DD School Superintendent) said in a letter to the school community. But the trauma, is not theirs alone. "This incident, as well as a rising tide of divisive rhetoric about immigration, race and religion, has sent ripples of fear and anxiety through our community," Richardson wrote in the letter sent to parents in English, Spanish, Russian, Chinese, Vietnamese and Somali.

John Bier, DD High School Principal, sent an email to the school's 170 teachers explaining what happened to the two students. He told teachers to look for signs of other students who many experience anxiety or trauma in the days to come. He said "I told the teachers, 'keep doing the work that you're doing, care about kids. Don't be afraid to talk to them about their emotions and what they're feeling.' He urged families to pull together in the coming days, and said "Our students and staff value and celebrate our diversity and are a true bright spot in our community."

SO WHAT CAN WE DO???

Oregonian Writer Aimee Green: Countering hate. Oregonian 6/ 5/17 (excerpts and paraphrase)

She begins with "police advise members of the public who encounter aggressive or abusive people making hateful comments to immediately leave the area and call 911. But if they can't escape or decide to help the targets, there are techniques to de-escalate a situation, such as giving the aggressor space or trying the change the subject as a distraction."

Speaking Up

Bystanders must decide for themselves if and when to intervene. If it is a verbal attack on someone, you could stand next to the person being attacked. If enough people are available, surround the victim. If possible, help the person leave the area. Strike up a conversation with the target about most anything, the weather, a movie, while you ignore the abuser. While these are good strategies, try to keep safety the priority. There are dangerous and unstable people so focus on safety for yourself and others.

But if you encounter racist comments, jokes, inappropriate treatment of others in the workplace, among friends, in a gathering of people where you feel safe. It is everyone's duty to speak up. (a few examples of "speaking up" from Rev. Amy) "Treating everyone with respect is a value of our country", "I don't have the same opinion, I think kindness is what's important" "loving all people is my priority"

Showing Support

Rather than keeping to yourself in groups or avoiding eye contact, offer a smile, or a simple greeting like "good morning", "hi", "have a good day". It is a small but important way to build community. The people who will keep us safe are the people surrounding us.

Advocacy is an important option. Work for equality of all people. Send the mayor, or other representatives a letter expressing your support for ALL people in our community. Offer to host a neighborhood dessert at your home or on your street. Get to know your neighbors. For us all to have more safety, we must provide community for everyone.

Chalk-Written Messages

Many people have been heartened by the outpouring of community support for the three men who intervened and for the two targeted girls. It is important, anti-hate groups say, to make sure that people with bigoted views know that the community is not on their side. That point gets across on Facebook, GoFundMe accounts, rallies, public memorials and chalk-written messages, like those scrawled across the Hollywood Transit Center in Northeast Portland, where the stabbings occurred on the train.

The goal of course isn't to be violent or aggressive toward them, but to simply stand together and hold up values of kindness, respect and community. And of course, ALL people matter, <u>but now</u> is a time to stand up for people being targeted by hate on a daily basis. And of course, throughout the Gospels, Jesus stood on the side of the outsiders, be it religion, race, gender, sexual orientation, economic status, physical disease, limitation or other.

- Do you have some extra cash on hand and not sure what to do with it? The church budget can always use a few extra dollars



Men's Fellowship

The Men's Group is alive and well with 12 to 15 men gathering each Wednesday at 10am to share our faith, support each other and give to the community. In 2016 we donated a total of \$929.10 to five different causes. We helped sponsor Jim's African mission, purchased and assembled over 50 food packages for our congregation to give to street people, a gift of a table and chair to the nursery, a donation for school supplies and coffee for the church. So far in 2017 we have given to Meals on Wheels and the Community Transitional School.

Hilltop Community Garden

Harvest for the Food Pantry is beginning at the Hilltop Community Garden! Crops are coming on slowly—we expect peas to be ready in the next few weeks. Then will come green beans and cucumbers. As we move into August and September we will have squash, tomatoes, then peppers and tomatilloes. We also clip a small amount of various herbs.

Our harvest needs to be responsive to the Food Pantry Hours. They are open for customers from

3– 8pm on Monday, and from 10am—3pm on Wednesdays and Fridays. We can deliver donations to the pantry beginning at 9am on all 3 days. It is important for us to harvest early enough to have produce on the shelves by the time they open. In general, we will begin picking at 9am on Mondays, and at 8:30am on Wednesdays and Fridays.


